

The Saint Luke Production of "Tolton: From Slave to Priest" was performed live by actor, Jim Coleman, at St. Benedict's Preparatory School in Newark this past September. Sponsored by the African American, African & Caribbean Apostolate, all three performances dramatized the life story of Servant of God Augustus Tolton and the incredible odds that confronted him in his quest to become a priest in the Catholic Church. The audience was presented with a live portrayal of Tolton's life through the presentation of live drama mixed with creative screen imaging. On its nationwide tour, "Tolton: From Slave to Priest" impacted its audience in several ways. The most important message which radiated throughout the performance was that holiness is possible for anyone to achieve as long as one remains faithful to Christ. This was evident in the life of Servant of God Tolton as his cause is currently under consideration before the Congregation for the Causes of Saints.







In recognition of Black Catholic History Month 2018, the Black Catholic Concerns Ministry of St Peter Claver Church in Montclair invited Essex County Prosecutor, Theodore Stephens, to speak on Mass Incarceration. 30TH ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATION OF THE KNIGHTS AND LADIES OF ST. PETER CLAVER

BLACK YOUTH CHRISTMAS RETREAT AND PARTY 2018































On Saturday, December 15, 2018, the Archdiocesan Youth Retreat Center in Kearny was the site for "In His Image", an annual spiritual retreat sponsored by the African American, African and Caribbean Apostolate. All of the youth travelled from various schools and churches within the Archdiocese to participate in a full day of prayer, reflection, fellowship, and fun. Participants were introduced to the new meaning of "Taking a Knee" during a keynote presentation delivered by Rev. Anthony M. Bozeman, SSJ, Pastor of St. Raymond-St. Leo Catholic Church in New Orleans, Louisiana.

Rev. Bozeman's presentation raised specific questions for the youth participants to ponder as they experience the Advent journey. One question posed, "What Are You Looking At?" calls one to look at the history of Christ's Salvation and focus on its true meaning. One must look at Christ and not focus on other distractions. Stressing that Advent is a time of joyful presentation, Rev. Bozeman reassured the young audience that one can be joyful even amidst the "craziness" which surrounds all of us in our daily lives. Servant of God Sr. Thea Bowman, a trailblazing African-American sister who was the first black sister in her white congregation, the first black woman to address the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops, and an inspiration to thousands of people with her words and songs, is another step further toward sainthood.

The U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops voted on Nov. 14th at their general assembly in Baltimore to advance Bowman's cause, opening the way for a diocesan commission to determine whether she lived a life of "extraordinary and heroic virtue." Bowman, who was a Franciscan Sister of Perpetual Adoration, was declared a servant of God on May 15, when her home Diocese of Jackson, Mississippi, requested the bishops endorse opening her cause for sainthood. Bowman died of cancer on March 30,

1990, at age 52. Bowman will be declared venerable, worthy of imitation by the faithful, if the tribunal finds in Bowman's favor and the Congregation for the Causes of Saints in Rome endorses the decision.

Margaret Ellen Dabney was born on January 8, 1937 to Deacon Herman and Alfred Hamilton. Margaret is the proud sister of six siblings. She graduated in 1955 from Alfred E. Beach High School in Savannah Georgia and joined the U.S. Air force.

Margaret was a devoted member of Christ the King Catholic Church of Jersey City where she served as the Eucharistic minister, Advent Prayer Breakfast, Christ the King Hospitality Ministry and founder of the Christ the King Newsletter. Also, she was a member of the advisory committee of the African American, African and Caribbean Apostolate as well as the editor of it's newsletter the Imani.



Margaret served in both the Air Force and the Army. She was selected to attend the 78th Division Army Drill Sergeant Academy. Her outstanding leadership and expert military skills enabled her to advance to the rank of Sergeant First Class (SFC) with the enormous responsibility of shaping civilians into the best soldiers in the world.

Margaret notes: I am a breast cancer survivor who maintains an optimism and zest for life. I have an unwavering dedication to serving my God, Country, family and community.

On Monday, January 21, 2019 Margaret was summoned to her heavenly home.

REST IN PEACE

Several Parishes under the Haitian Apostolate of the Archdiocese of Newark gathered on January 1, 2019, to celebrate the Solemnity of the Blessed Virgin Mary, Mother of God and to celebrate the 215th Anniversary of the Independence of Haiti.
