

Pope Francis has called the People of God to discern the voice of the Holy Spirit in the Church today, with a view to the future.

He desires that we listen to the experiences and longings of the entire Body of Christ, and this includes the young church.

St. Benedict emphasizes how "the Lord often reveals the most prudent course to be followed" to those who do not occupy important positions in the community (in that case, the youngest); thus, the Bishops should take care to reach out to everyone, so that, in the orderly unfolding of the synodal journey, what the apostle Paul recommends to the communities may be realized:

"Do not quench the Spirit. Do not despise prophetic utterances.

Test everything; retain what is good" (1 Thess 5:19-21).



CATECHETICAL RESOURCES

The Synod on Synodality has created a two-fold opportunity for catechetical leaders and catechists.

First, to engage young people and their families in meaningful conversation about the role of the Holy Spirit in the Church, our call as baptized Catholics to participate fully in the mission of the Church, and living synodality could look like going forward.

Second, the synod has created an opportunity for catechesis and formation aimed at helping all the faithful to better understand and assimilated the idea of synodality.

This resource is intended to be used by Parish Catechists and Catholic School Teachers in order help the young Church to make the most of these unique opportunities. It is designed to be a "menu" of activities that parish leaders, catechists and Catholic school teachers can choose from. A variety of options are offered so that the activities can be easily implemented according to the needs and the resources of each individual parish/school.

We hope this tool assists leaders in the engagement and formation of the children and young people in our parishes and Catholic schools.

Holy Spirit, we come together in your Name,

Synod Prayer - History

This prayer was written by St. Isadore of Seville almost 1,500 years ago. Since then, the Church prays this special prayer whenever the Bishops gather for a meeting - a Synod. This year, Pope Francis invited all people around the world to the biggest meeting ever in the history of the Church. We will all pray that we can listen to the Holy Spirit during this time. Every time we pray this prayer, we are part of history!



Understanding the Synod Prayer

Slowly read a section of the prayer. Each section is a different color. For each section:

• Ask the children what words they heard. Ask if they know what all the words mean. Then ask what word they feel is their favorite or most important word. Ask them why.

Follow up questions for each section: (You may want to have images available to help the children (e.g. families, Church, nature, etc.)

- **Section 1:** What do you think it feels like when God comes into your heart? How does God guide you? (e.g. family, Church, etc.)
- **Section 2:** Why is it sometimes hard to making loving choices? What are some things we can do to show people we love them?
- Section 3: When do you feel close to God?
- **Section 4:** Where are some places that you see God? When have you felt God's love and care for you?

• You can also invite the children to draw a picture to give an example of some of their answers above.





SYNOD LOGO AND COLORING PAGE

A great deal of thought and time went into the development of the Synod logo. It was designed to visually express the meaning of the Synod on Synodality. This activity includes:

- Looking at the Logo and discussing what it might mean.
- Learning about its significance as it was intended by the designer, Isabelle de Senilhes
- Coloring the logo

Parish catechetical programs and Catholic schools are encouraged to print posters with the Synod logo and to place them around their facilities as a visual reminder that the Church is currently engaged and praying for the Synod.

Questions to help the children explore the meaning of the logo.

Ask the children about each section of the logo.

- What does the large orange circle look like? What does it remind you of?
- What do the large orange brush strokes look like? What do they remind you of?
- What do the circle and brush strokes remind you of when you look at them together?
- What kinds of people do you see in the picture? What does it look like they are doing?
- Why do you think they are all in different colors?

Synod Logo - Explanation

It is a big and strong tree, full of knowledge and light that reaches the sky. It is a sign of life and looks like it is moving. It also reminds us of the cross of Jesus. The Eucharist shines like the sun. The branches also look like open hands and like the wings of the Holy Spirit. God's people are walking together under the shadow of the tree of life. There are 15 different types of people that symbolize all the people in the world. The bright colors give us joy. They are all together and everyone is equal. God loves everyone!

FOUNDATIONAL TOPICS

In order to better help the children understand the concept of the Synod, it will be helpful to introduce some basic concepts.

- Below is a list of topics that can help to support the other Synod activities.
- Consider that young children need as many concrete, hands on, and visuals examples in order to help them understand these concepts.
- The major Catholic publishers have materials that can help you plan lessons that will introduce the children to these topics. We encourage parishes and Catholic schools to utilize their current catechetical materials for this purpose. Throughout the year, as these topics are addressed catechists can make connections with the Synod.

Who is the Holy Spirit?

- Teach children the Sign of the Cross.
- Use the lessons and activities in your book that teach about the Trinity
- Use the different symbols used for the Holy Spirit (e.g. use images/coloring pages of doves, fire, etc.)





What is the Church?

- Talk about the meaning of the word "Catholic".
- Use a world map to emphasize the Church's presence throughout the world. Ask the children what countries they and/or their families are from.
- Ask the children to draw a picture of what they think
 "Church" means. (You may get lots of church buildings.)
- Show images of people gathered in churches. Show images of people engaged in works of mercy as a way of explaining the Church in action and on mission.

Who is the Pope, the Archbishop of Newark, Parish priests, laity?

- Use images of Pope Francis. Use the Pope Francis coloring page (Appendix A)
- Visit the Archdiocese of Newark website to find pictures of Cardinal Tobin, Archbishop of Newark, and to find pictures of the Auxiliary Bishops.
- Invite the pastor and parish priests to visit the children during a Faith Formation session.
- Invite some lay leaders in your parish to speak with the children about how they serve and lead in the Church.





FOUNDATIONAL TOPICS

How can we love one another better?

- Ask the children to name movies they've seen where people have helped one another and/or been kind to one another.
- Ask the children what they can do in the coming weeks to show someone they love them.
- Invite the children to draw a picture or make a card for someone they love.



ADDRESSING THE SYNOD QUESTION!

OPTIONAL ACTIVITIES:

- 1) Ask the children what they like most about God and about the Church.
 - Invite them to draw a picture.
- 2) Ask the children what is happening in the world that makes them sad. Ask them how they think Jesus and the Church can help the world be a better place.
 - Invite them to draw a picture of Jesus and or people in their church helping those who need it.

journey together to eternal life



Synod Prayer - History

This prayer was written by St. Isadore of Seville almost 1,500 years ago. Since then, the Church prays this special prayer whenever the Bishops gather for a meeting - a Synod. Until now, only Bishops gathered for a Synod. But, this year, Pope Francis invited all people around the world to participate in the Synod for the first time ever. That mean that over one billion people will participate! We will all pray that the entire Church can listen to the Holy Spirit during this time. Every time we pray this prayer, we are part of history!



LEARN MORE ABOUT ST. ISADORE OF SEVILLE

Understanding the Synod Prayer

Slowly read the prayer.

• Ask the children if they know what all the words mean and explain if necessary. Then ask what section of the prayer is their favorite or what section they feel is most important. Ask them why. (Each section is a different color.)

Follow up questions for each section:

- **Section 1:** What are some ways you know that God lives in your heart? What are some ways that God guides you? (e.g. family, Church, etc.)
- **Section 2:** Why is it sometimes hard to making loving choices? What are some things we can do to show people we love them? What are some things we need to avoid in order to not hurt others?
- Section 3: When do you feel close to God? How do you know God is close to you?
- **Section 4:** What are the people and places where you see God? When have you felt God's love and care for you?

For any of the above sections - Break the children up into small groups and select an activity:

- 1. Re-write a section of the prayer in their own words.
- 2. Make a poster that explains the section.
- 3. Think of an example that illustrates the meaning of the section and act it out in a skit.



FOUNDATIONAL TOPICS

How can we include and love everyone the way Jesus does?

Check your catechetical materials for the following topics:

- Commandments
- Beatitudes
- Christian Service
- Forgiveness / The Sacrament of Reconciliation / Peace

Other Optional Activities:

- Ask the children where they have recently experienced love and kindness recently.
- Ask the children what they can do in the coming weeks to show someone they love them, in particular perhaps someone who they feel is left out of things or lonely.
 - Consider following up at a later time to ask the children how they felt after reaching out to someone.

Listening

Listening is an essential part of the Synod. Following are some activities and questions to help children explore why listening is so important.

Discuss the following:

- How do you know when someone is listening to you? How can you tell when someone is not listening to you?
- How does it feel when someone listens to you? How does it feel when they don't listen to you?
- Why do you think that sometimes it is difficult to listen to others?
- What are some things you think you can do to be a better listener?

Listening Activities:

- Play "Telephone": Play a fun and simple game of "Telephone" to illustrate the importance of listening carefully.
- **Tell a story:** Ask the children to think about their favorite day or to recall a story about something funny that happened to them.
 - Pair each child with a partner and ask one child to tell the other one all about his/her favorite day.
 - Ask the child who listened to then retell the story.
 - Then they can switch roles so that each child has the opportunity to practice listening.



THE SYNOD QUESTIONS I THE SYNOD GAME

The Synod game has been designed in order to encourage children to share their responses to questions addressing many of the issues that will be discussed at the larger parish sessions in an age

appropriate manner.



A full size game board, complete instructions, place markers and questions are found in Appendix B.

Game Overview

- Players begin at the space that says "START". Players advance as many spaces as the dice indicate. Each time they land on a space they follow the instructions on the space.
- The player to reach the "END" first wins the game. If there is not enough time to finish the game during the session, the player who is farthest ahead wins.
- Spaces with questions marks indicate the player must share his/her response to a synod related question.
- More detailed instructions can be found in Appendix B.

CATEGORY	QUESTIONS
Listening	What are three things you think the church should do to improve? If you had the opportunity, what three things about the Church would you say to the Pope? How would you feel if you were asked to share your opinion with your parish priest, Bishop or the Pope?
	Who do you talk to when you have a problem? Is there someone in the parish/church who you think would listen to you if you need to talk about a problem or something that worries you?
	Do you ever talk about Jesus with your friends? Do you ever talk about Jesus with your friends? When you talk about Jesus, how do other people respond?
	Who in your life talks to you about Jesus? Where are these people? Do they listen to you when you want talk to them about religion?
Options	Would you rather Eat donuts or candy? Would you rather Have an extra finger or an extra toe? Would you rather Only be able to crawl or only be able to walk backwards? Would you rather Be a famous singer or a famous actor?

Synod Prayer - History

This prayer was written by St. Isadore of Seville (560 – 4 April 636) almost 1,500 years ago. Since then, the Church prays this prayer whenever the Bishops gather for a meeting - a Synod. Until now, only Bishops gathered for a Synod. But, this year, Pope Francis has invited all people around the world to participate in the "Synod on Synodality". It is the first time the laity all throughout the world will officially have a voice in this process. That means over one billion people will participate! Besides contributing to the Synod conversations, we can also participate by praying. We are all called to pray that the entire Church can listen to the Holy Spirit during this time. Every time we pray this prayer, we are making history!

Understanding the Synod Prayer

Slowly read the prayer.

• Ask the teens if they know what all the words mean and explain if necessary. Then ask what section of the prayer is their favorite or what section they feel is most important. Ask them why. (Each section is a different color.)

Follow up questions for each section:

- **Section 1:** What are some ways you know that God lives in your heart? What are some ways that God guides you? (e.g. family, Church, etc.)
- **Section 2:** Why is it sometimes hard to do the right things and to avoid sin? What are some ways we show others that we really care about them and that they are important? What are some sins (individually and as a society) that we need to avoid in order to not hurt others?
- Section 3: When do you feel closest to God? How do you know God is close to you?
- **Section 4:** Where do you see God acting in the world today? When have you witnessed God's love and care for people around you? When have you felt God's love and care for you?

For any of the above sections - Break the teens up into small groups and select an activity:

- 1. Re-write a section of the prayer in their own words.
- 2. Make a poster that explains the section.
- 3. Think of an example that illustrates the meaning of the section and act it out in a skit.

- Visit the <u>Archdiocese of Newark</u> website to find pictures of Cardinal Tobin, Archbishop of Newark, and to find pictures of the Auxiliary Bishops. Their biographies are also available and can be easily simplified.
- · Working individually or in groups:
 - Ask the teens to draw their image of the Church. How they see the Church right now.
 - Read 1 Corinthians 12: 12-27 (One Body, Many Parts).
 - Ask the teens what image of Church does St. Paul give us?
 - Ask the teens to draw a representation of what they feel Jesus wants the Church to be.
 - The young people can then present their drawings and explain their interpretation of the reading.



FOUNDATIONAL TOPICS

How can we include and love everyone the way Jesus does?

Check your catechetical materials for the following topics:

- Commandments
- Beatitudes
- · Life in Christ
- Catholic Social Teaching / Social Justice / Service
- · Corporal and Spiritual Works of Mercy

Other Optional Activities:

- · Ask the teens where they have recently experienced love and kindness.
- Ask the teens to identify a person or a group of people who need some kind of care. Think of ways in which they can do something to make a difference for that person / group. If this is a Confirmation class connections to their service projects/activity can be made.
 - Consider following through with carrying out a project that can help the young people to put their faith in action and to "be the Church" in the world.

Listening

Listening is an essential part of the Synod. Following are some activities and questions to help teens explore why listening is so important.

· Discuss the following:

- How do you know when someone is listening to you? How can you tell when someone is not listening to you?
- How does it feel when someone listens to you? How does it feel when they don't listen to you?
- What is your favorite way to communicate? (e.g. text, phone, in person, etc.) What do you think
 is the BEST way to communicate when you really need to have a serious conversation?
- Why do you think that sometimes it is difficult to listen to others? What are some things you think you can do to be a better listener?

• Listening Activities:

- Play a fun and simple game of "Telephone" to illustrate the importance of listening carefully.
- Play a game of "Simon Says". Although this is typically a game for younger children, it can be adapted to older kids by incorporating more complex or silly directives. For example, "Simon says repeatedly high five your neighbor."*

THE SYNOD QUESTIONS I WHATSAPP

Pope Francis is inviting all the people of God to share from their heart during this Synod. This includes our young people. Here is an activity that may be used to facilitate reflection and conversation with middle school age teens.

Whatsapp Activity

- 1. Begin by having the teens complete an individual activity. (See appendix D)
- 2. Divide the young people into small groups and assign one color section/category to each group.
- 3. Ask each group to share their responses and the reasons for their responses to the questions in their assigned category. Ask them to summarize their responses to share with the large group.

Collecting the responses is not as important as opening a space for dialogue and conversation and allowing for free expression.

- 4. Then either divide the group into different groups or keep the young people in the same group.
- 5. Recalling their own responses to the survey as well as the sharing from all the groups, ask each group to discuss the following questions:

What positive and valuable contributions does the Church make to the world today?

What do you think should be changed and what issues do you think the Church should pay more attention to?

6.Ask the young people to share a summary of their responses by creating a "Whatsapp" message to Pope Francis with their opinions and suggestions.







THE SYNOD QUESTIONS I THE SYNOD GAME

The Synod game has been designed in order to encourage children and teens to share their responses to questions addressing many of the issues that will be discussed at the larger parish sessions in an age appropriate manner.



A full size game board, complete instructions, place markers and questions are found in Appendix B. For additional questions for Middle School see the survey in Appendix D.

Game Overview

- Players begin at the space that says "START". Players advance as many spaces as the dice indicate. Each time they land in a space they follow the instructions on the space.
- The player to reach the "END" first wins the game. If there is not enough time to finish the game during the session, the player who is farthest ahead wins.
- Spaces with questions marks indicate the player must share his/her response to a synod related question.
- More details instructions can be found in Appendix B.
- <u>MIDDLE SCHOOL:</u> Prior to playing the game, catechists/facilitators can invite the teens to complete the individual activity in Appendix D. This may help the teens prepare to better respond to the game questions.






- Create a Family Mission Statement!


