

Focus of the Synod on Synodality

How is the Holy Spirit calling us as a Church in the 21st Century?

A Synodal Church, in announcing the Gospel, "journeys together."

The word "synod" traces its roots to the first centuries of the Church. Coming from Greek words meaning the "same road," synod and synodality are expressions of the fundamental mystery of the Church: people who are gathered from every corner of the earth to be "a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, a people of his own, so that you may announce the praises" of him who called you out of darkness into his wonderful light (1 Peter 2,9).

As we begin our listening and sharing, all are invited to consider what the Holy Spirit is calling us to, what paths are being opened, and what our "inner spiritual movements" are: joy or sadness, confidence or anxiety, hope or no hope, or other.

Table Process Suggestions to Help Participants Focus

- Facilitator asks all to reflect silently for five minutes, preparing their thoughts on each question.
- Each person can share his/her ideas for a maximum of three minutes.
- All reflect silently again, then sharing for a few minutes what enlightened or resonated with them.

"The Synodal Process is first and foremost a spiritual process.

It is not a mechanical data-gathering exercise or a series of meetings and debates.

Synodal listening is oriented towards discernment."*

We are being invited to listen to the Holy Spirit in the voices of the faithful.

ATTITUDES TO CULTIVATE

Listening

We are called to listen humbly and to speak courageously; to listen in a manner that invites others to share authentically while we ourselves share our experiences and hopes with mercy and charity.

Newness and Conversion

We are invited to embrace the action of the Holy Spirit, particularly in the ways in which the Spirit inspires us to new views and new ways of being Church.

Allowing God to Lead

We are called to allow the Spirit to direct us. To set aside our own expectations so that we can listen more clearly to what God desires of us.

Focus on others

"The Synodal Process is an opportunity to open up, to look around us, to see things from other points of view, and to move out in missionary outreach to the peripheries".

LEAVE BEHIND

Self-centeredness

We need one another. When we set aside selfcenteredness "we are able to learn from each other, journey together, and be at the service of one another."

Division and Discord

We are challenged to suspend our judgments and ideologies in order to enter into dialogue that promotes mutual understanding and unity.

Fear

"For God did not give us a spirit of cowardice but rather of power and love and self-control." 2 Tim 1-7 We are reminded that change is a necessary part of growth and fear inhibits growth.

Self-doubt

The participation of each person is essential for the synodal process to achieve its objective. You are called by virtue of your Baptism, to listen to the Holy Spirit in your life and to share your experience of God and His Church for the good of all His people.



REFLECT

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





PLEASE read all of the information in this publication as it will help focus your efforts to synthesize and compile all the information you have gathered.

Prior to Compiling Notes - Assemble a Reporting Team

Assemble a small working group of <u>3-5 individuals</u> to help compile the parish report. Avoid creating a very large committee. Keep in mind that writing a report with too many individuals becomes inefficient and unproductive. Members of this working group may include the Synod parish coordinator, the main facilitator(s) of listening session, some members of the parish pastoral council, and/or some table facilitators. As you select this group, think about the skills which might be helpful. Some good skills to have on your reporting team might be:

- Experience gathering data or doing research.
- The ability to see the trends in conversation and make the connections to the "big picture"
- Good writing skills

If you would like input from a broader group of people, the committee can always draft the report and circulate it seeking comments before it is submitted to the Archdiocese. You may select to share the draft with the rest of the parish council, parish staff, etc. for additional feedback prior to finalizing the report.

The Archdiocesan Synod Team encourages the parish to share its final report with the entire parish community.

STEPS for Synthesizing Feedback from Listening Sessions

Some parishioners or parish staff may have previous experience in gathering data and writing reports. However, here are some suggestions.

BEFORE Meeting as a Reporting Team

Step 1 – Collect the Notes:

Collect the notes from all the table scribes from every parish listening session. Share copies of the notes with the team. Please keep in mind that we are asking for one report from each parish or organization. If your parish hosted more than one session, please compile everything into one report.

Step 2 – Individual Preparation of Team Members:

It is important that team members prepare ahead of time by reading through all the notes in order to become familiar with them and to begin to discern common themes, etc.. Your time together will be better spent reaching consensus rather than reading the notes in detail.

GATHER as a Reporting Team

Step 3 – Begin with Prayer:

Since the Synodal journey is designed to be one of prayerful experiences, open your Reporting Team's working session with prayer. The Synod Prayer is a good option. See www.rcan.org/prayer-resources

Step 4 – Review the Goals:

Review the Synod goals with your Reporting Team and use it as a guide to focus as you compile everything. The Goals are to:

- To <u>engage as many people</u> as possible in conversation and discernment on what the Holy Spirit is asking of the Church of the 21st Century.
- To discern and provide prayerful response to the pastoral concerns of the Church today.

Ultimately, you want to identify:

- What did we learn from these sessions?
- What do we hope will be the impact on our parish community, the local Archdiocesan Church as well as the Universal Church?

Step 5: Collate all the demographics:

It is important to understand who was present at your sessions and, perhaps more importantly, who was not present. There is a worksheet to help you compile the data. (See **Synod Listening Session Worksheet 1**)

Teams can compile the data from all the parish listening sessions. That information is then entered into the online Parish Report Form that will be submitted to the Archdiocese.

Step 6: Review and Organize the notes:

Team members should have already read through the notes from all the parish scribes/groups.

- Together, you can reread the notes from each table, being attentive to the patterns that begin to emerge.
- You will begin to notice common trends. You want to focus on recurring themes or commonalities, not one-off comments. Which ideas and topics kept surfacing?
- Use the "Synod Listening Session Worksheet 2" at the end of these instructions to help you organize the information. You can write the common themes and quantify how many tables talked about that same theme.
- You can also begin to prioritize the topics accordingly.

Beware of "Confirmation Bias" - It is paramount to keep an open mind during synthesis. While you and/or members of your Reporting Team may have a desired outcome, remember to take time to reflect and listen to the Holy Spirit as you all review the notes.

"Confirmation Bias" is the tendency to search for or favor information in a way that confirms one's preexisting ideas or beliefs. Be attentive to the perspective you and the members of your Reporting Team bring to this process. We sometimes presume we know the answer before we even ask the question and so we look to confirm what we think we know! We might like to think we have an open mind, but in fact, based on our life experiences, we all have biases. Ask the Holy Spirit to help you and your Reporting Team see more clearly and to consider other perspectives without bias.

WRITING and SUBMITTING THE REPORT

Step 7: Use the parish report form provided by the Archdiocesan to submit your report.

The form is online and may be accessed through the Synod webpage.

With great cultural diversity, over 200 parishes in our Archdiocese, in addition to schools, religious communities and many other Catholic organizations, the Archdiocese will be collecting a vast amount of information from Listening Sessions. In order to make sure all voices from your parish are heard, we ask you to use the form provided. We also ask you to be as concise as possible in your answers. Each parish should provide one report, not one report for each session hosted. However, if you conducted a session with youth or a school, there are separate forms where you may share detailed information about those sessions. In your parish report you may also wish to reflect some of what was heard in those sessions, but it should be an overview of what was discussed. We are grateful for your cooperation in this.

Step 8: Offer an Overview of the Listening Sessions:

In <u>no more than</u> two paragraphs share with us how the session(s) at your parish went? Share any and all feedback possible about what this experience was like for your parish.

These questions may help you reflect on your experience:

- What blessing did you find in this synodal experience?
- What joy did you find in coming together to listen?
- What was challenging about listening?
- Were the questions stated clearly enough or did you need to explain them more fully?
- Was your time together an uplifting and positive experience, or was it simply a time to complain without helpful suggestions? (The first step is often just facing an unpleasant reality before later moving to action.)

Step 9: Enter the Summarized Information and Submit:

By now, you have identified, sorted, and prioritized the insights from your listening sessions and most of the information should be summarized in the "Synod Listening Session Worksheet 2". In your parish report you do not need to tell us everything from the sessions. Rather, set about your key findings. Highlight the main takeaways. We ask you to share perhaps the top three themes or the top three answers to each question.

This is not merely about majority rules. You may find some pivotal ideas or perspectives which might be mentioned only a few times but are really incredible insights which are worth sharing. We encourage you to include these in your reports. If some of the themes are unclear, the parish may want to conduct additional research later. At the end of these instructions, we offer some suggestions that may help you to continue this conversation at the parish level.

For Further Parish Reflection by Parish Staff and Parish Pastoral Council

Listening, and gathering insights from this synodal process will help our parishes, schools and Catholic organizations to understand the needs in their community. We expect that this time of reflection, prayer, and listening will inspire fruitful action in each community.

While the Archdiocese would like a summary of your key take-aways from the listening sessions, your pastor, parish/school staff, and parish pastoral council might want more detailed findings with compelling quotes, and examples for future pastoral planning.

You may want to begin by examining the demographic data collected. (See Worksheet 1) Whose voices were we hearing in these summary notes? Who was missing from the discussion? Given the timeline and concerns about the rise of COVID cases, it may not have been possible to reach out to all the groups in your local neighborhoods. Are there additional opportunities for the parish to engage people in conversation?

In particular, there were some questions discussed at the tables that are important questions for the parish community but not necessary to report to Archdiocese. Some of the questions critical for your parish pastoral planning include:

- Were we talking to a broad group of people? Did we have a large enough group of people?
- What other questions might we want to ask as a follow-up?
- Do we as a parish, reach out to those who are no longer participating in church?
- What are some ways to find out why they are not participating?
- What do we have to offer and attract those who are not participating?
- What are three steps we can take in our parish to grow in "walking together"?
- By our deep listening, what actions do you hear the Holy Spirit asking our parish to take?



Facilitators' Guide for Listening Sessions

Thank you for being a facilitator!

The role of the facilitator is essential to lead a group and to ensure full participation of all in attendance. We offer these suggestions to help you facilitate your listening sessions whether in a parish, campus ministry, religious congregation, youth setting or other ways that you are gathering people to join in the Synod on Synodality listening process.

Each Listening Session needs two types of facilitators and a scribe:

1. MAIN FACILITATOR or CO-FACILITATORS

to guide the entire group in the prayer, reflection and conversations that will be summarized and sent to the Bishops' Conference (USCCB) and eventually to the Vatican synod coordinators. These facilitators should be experienced in running meetings such as these which require feedback and synthesizing collected answers.

2. SMALL GROUP FACILITATOR

Each discussion group needs a facilitator. The facilitator's role is simple: to ensure that the group has what it needs to pray and reflect during the Listening Session. The facilitator does not need to be the expert in the group, but rather one who keeps the group focused and moving. At the same time, the facilitator is a participant but must take care to engage people in conversation, not dominate.

3. TABLE SCRIBE

The tables scribe will take notes on the conversations and work with the participants to present a synthesized list of the key points of the discussion on the questions. Following the Listening Sessions, the scribes will work with the Listening Session coordinators to present a common document that will be sent to the Archdiocese of Newark coordinating team.

Inviting Facilitators

Facilitating is a great opportunity to invite people to lead others in these synodal conversations and discernment. It is important to invite facilitators ahead of time so that they have an idea about the goals of the Listening Sessions. The qualities you want to look for in a facilitator are:

- creates a welcoming and prayerful atmosphere
- leads a group without dominating
- has the ability to draw out others
- keeps people on the topic
- possesses a genuine concern to build community among the members

Background - Being a Synodal Church

Pope Francis has asked the whole world to engage in prayer, attentive listening and reflection, and conversation on how the Holy Spirit is calling the Church of the 21st Century to proclaim the Gospel and mission of Jesus in today's world. He believes that this can be a way to be creative and renewed through this Synod on Synodality, just as the Church has done over the centuries.

Synod is a combination of two Greek words meaning, walking or journeying the same road together. We know from experience in our families, ministries, religious communities, businesses, etc., that if we are not walking together, we don't achieve harmony, creativity, and the goals we set out to accomplish.

To Pope Francis, the practice of living as a synodal Church means three things:

Communion

Prayer, attentive listening and reflection, and conversation lead to conversion to Christ and commitment to active participation as disciples in the mission of Christ.

Participation

The people of God speak with one another and listen to one another about questions and experiences that matter in their living as disciples in the Church – and sometimes the conversations can be affirming and sometimes difficult.

Mission

The communion of Jesus exists for a common purpose. Mission flows naturally from the experience of communion through collaborative ministry, recognizing our baptismal call as disciples of Christ.

Through these listening sessions, Pope Francis hopes that we will take a "long, loving, look" at our reality in the Universal Church, our parishes, religious congregations, ministries, among the young, the voices and needs of those on the margins and socially excluded – all of God's people. The focus is on renewal and outreach to all. But first we must confront the difficult topics. Some of those topics may be parish leadership, roles of women, outreach to the poor and the marginalized, inward looking rather than outward looking, clericalism, the role of the Church in contemporary society, the divorced and remarried, persons with disabilities, and more. We are to be a listening Church – to each other and the Holy Spirit at work in our world to meet the needs of our time.

That is why this Synod on Synodality is so important today. It is the opportunity for all people to speak frankly and listen carefully to each other and to what the Holy Spirt is asking of us. A tall order and a wonderful opportunity!

Goals of the Synod on Synodality

The Goals of the synod:

- To engage as many people as possible in conversation and discernment on what the Holy Spirit is asking of the Church of the 21st Century.
- To give prayerful input on the needs of the Church today and the way to speak about the mission of Christ to all people in the world we live in today.

Practical Arrangements

Room Preparation by the parish, ministry, or organization

- If possible, the meeting room should be set with tables for 5-6 (including table facilitator and scribe.)
- On tables, please have pens and the listening sessions questions. They can also be projected on a screen with PowerPoint.

- Set a liturgical focus in the front of the room such as a tablecloth, candle, bible, seasonal flowers or other decoration.
- If possible, choose table facilitators and scribes ahead of time and meet with them for 30 minutes before the sessions to brief them on their task.

Choosing Facilitators

Good facilitation has participants engaging with one another in meaningful dialogue on the given topic or question. The facilitator is not the center of conversation but rather a guide for the conversation. It is important to select and train excellent facilitators for this listening process. Strong facilitators are people who:

- Are at home with their Catholic faith
- Are prayerful and reflective
- Have strong interpersonal skills
- Have effective communication skills
- Are willing participants in the synodal process
- Are able to maintain a big picture view without injecting their personal agenda
- Can focus a conversation
- Can connect participants with each other without becoming the center of the conversation.

Dialogue, Discussion and Discernment for Facilitators

Dialogue is the foundation of all synodal consultations. Dialogue does not happen when there is arguing or diatribe. However, conflicting perspectives may be presented. We may not all agree upon what is discussed in the synodal consultation, but we all acknowledge that what we discern through this process has the potential to be the will of God for the Church in the future. It is helpful to distinguish between the different types of exchanges:

Dialogue is two way, cooperative, and its purpose is to build relationship and exchange perspectives between participants

Discussion is a process of talking about something, in order to reach a decision or to exchange ideas

Debate is two way and competitive, where the purpose is to convince another

Diatribe is one way, and its purpose is to browbeat, inspire, shame, or emote

- Dialogue comes before discussion in synodal exchanges. These two activities can lead to true discernment of what the Holy Spirit is saying and leading.
- Dialogue expands possibilities and insight into possibilities
- Discussion holds those possibilities against one another, helping to reflect upon them, and narrowing toward realistic, doable solutions, and steps forward

Table Discussion Set-Up

Participants should be assigned to diverse small groups of approximately five to six members using a random method. Each group should have an assigned table facilitator and scribe who are also invited to enter the discussion. If possible, the group should be seated at a table together for the small group facilitated conversation.

At the Meeting

Welcome Participants by Parish Volunteers

- Have registration hosts who will welcome and check people in
- Provide name tags for participants
- If feasible, assign people to groups to allow for more people to get to know each other
- Ask participants to turn off and put away cell phones in order to fully concentrate on the synodal process
- Provide simple refreshments in case people are coming directly from work

Main Facilitator(s) for Listening Sessions

For each listening session there should be a main facilitator or co-facilitators. The facilitator will explain each step of the process and make groups aware of the length of discussion time. The facilitator will give a five-minute warning as the groups move toward the next steps.

Welcome by Pastor or Leader

The pastor or pastoral leader welcomes the participants and introduces the main facilitator(s).

The main facilitator gives a welcome to the whole group and asks the table facilitators and scribes to introduce themselves and then have table members introduce themselves.

Gathering Prayer

- Choose a prayer leader and a reader for the scripture
- After the prayer, state the faith sharing questions
- Allow 5 minutes for sharing by twos or threes at the tables
- After the final prayer, lead the participants into the listening session

Facilitating a Synodal Consultation

As facilitator you will be asked to:

- Encourage, affirm, support, challenge. Create an open atmosphere where the Lord's presence can be felt.
- Establish clear boundaries of time for each topic and discussion for table sharing.
- Gently interrupt a speaker who talks disproportionately more than others, for example, "You've really thought about that let's hear what others have to add..."
- Keep the members on the topic. Gently re-focus a speaker who is preoccupied with an issue that is not pertinent to the topic or inhibits the participation of others in the group:

 "Let's look at the question (or topic) again to see if we are really getting to the heart of the matter."

• The table facilitator and scribe are participants as well as group leaders. You might need to lead off with input to a question but do not dominate and make sure that all have the opportunity to speak.

Practical Suggestions for Successful Facilitation

- 1. It helps to set ground rules and expectations at the start of the listening session by emphasizing the need for participation of all and that this is a safe place to speak.
- 2. A facilitator can help stimulate discussion by offering to synthesize the comments made from time to time, when participants are not quite sure of the question, or when the flow of conversation seems to be stalled.
- 3. If it is necessary to interrupt a speaker, it helps to acknowledge their contribution by providing a brief synthesis of what you heard them say, thank them for their contribution and move on through the discussion.

Ground Rules for Synodal Consultations – Group Etiquette

- 1. Discernment is a key part of the process. Discernment means speaking, listening, and prayerfully reflecting, so pausing in silence between speakers to consider what is said is helpful.
- 2. This consultation is a safe place to talk we will treat each other and what anyone says with reverence and respect.
- 3. One person speaks at a time and each person limits how long he/she speaks so that everyone has time to share.
- 4. We all will listen with an open mind listening for understanding rather than listening to make a response.
- 5. We may pause the conversation at certain intervals to reflect and pray.
- 6. Our primary mode is dialogue: When we speak, our purpose is to have a robust conversation that leads to ways to move forward.
- 7. Avoid arguing or comments that seek to advance a personal agenda.
- 8. We only speak once until everyone has had an opportunity to share.
- 9. We will be reporting our themes and discussion to the Archdiocese, who will forward to the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB).
- 10. No names of individual participants or groups will be shared in a document.
- 11. As participants, when we tell others of our experience of the consultation, we will not attribute anything we share to particular people or groups.

Synthesizing the Discussion

Table facilitators and scribes, along with the participants, identify the major themes which arose from the discussion questions. Topics need to be categorized under the two core questions from the Synod:

- 1. How is this "journeying together" happening today in your parish community, campus ministry, university, school, youth group, religious congregation or other?
- 2. How are we "walking together" as a Church, and what steps does the Holy Spirit invite us to take in order to grow in our journeying together?

Some examples of topics may be youth and young adults, faith formation, need for more participation in parish life, roles of women in leadership and governance of parish and larger church, ability to give input

in parish planning, caring for and inclusion of the poor and marginalized, the elderly, etc. The synthesis from each table will be given to the Synod Committee to further synthesize, collate and send to the Archdiocesan Synod coordinating team via an electronic document.

Using the Recalling of Our Experiences Approach

The main facilitator can give the instruction to recall the key points of the discussion at each table. The table facilitator and scribe will focus the recalling. The following questions may serve as a guide:

- What are our experiences of journeying together in communion, participation, mission (Synodality) in our local Church?
- What joys did those experiences bring?
- What difficulties and obstacles have we encountered?
- What wounds did those experiences reveal?
- What insights have those experiences elicited?

Gather the key topics the table participants want to share:

- What paths forward are opening up for our local Church?
- Where in these experiences does the voice of the Holy Spirit resound?
- What are the areas for change for our Church and what steps can be taken?

After the Synodal Consultation

Reporting the fruits of your synodal consultations

Reporting is both horizontal reporting to the participants and community and vertical reporting to the diocese, the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops and to the Holy Father and Synod of Bishops in Rome. It would be helpful if the main facilitator could work with others to pull out some themes from the consultation and report that information back to participants, pastoral councils, pastoral staff, and the faith community as a whole. Table reporting is sent to the diocese for inclusion in the diocesan report using a standardized format or template provided by the diocese.


A reading from the Acts of the Apostles

Focus of the Synod on Synodality

How is the Holy Spirit calling us as a Church in the 21st Century?

A Synodal Church, in announcing the Gospel, "journeys together."

The word "synod" traces its roots to the first centuries of the Church. Coming from Greek words meaning the "same road," synod and synodality are expressions of the fundamental mystery of the Church: people who are gathered from every corner of the earth to be "a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, a people of his own, so that you may announce the praises" of him who called you out of darkness into his wonderful light (1 Peter 2,9).

As we begin our listening and sharing, all are invited to consider what the Holy Spirit is calling us to, what paths are being opened, and what our "inner spiritual movements" are: joy or sadness, confidence or anxiety, hope or no hope, or other.

Table Process Suggestions to Help Participants Focus

- Facilitator asks all to reflect silently for five minutes, preparing their thoughts on each question.
- Each person can share his/her ideas for a maximum of three minutes.
- All reflect silently again, then sharing for a few minutes what enlightened or resonated with them.

Pope Francis talks about "journeying together" or "walking together" down the same road. This means that we collaborate together and share responsibility for the building up of the whole Church and our parish or other ministry through evangelization, participation in worship, social justice, councils, and governance. As you reflect on the questions below, describe about how you have or have not experienced "walking together."

- Share a few examples of ways that you have experienced this "walking together" in your parish. What is challenging about participating fully in your parish? For example:
 - How are authority or governance, teamwork and co-responsibility put into practice in your local parish?
 - How do you as a parish use the methods of listening and speaking (consultation) to make decisions about pastoral and financial needs?
 - In what ways do you as a parish invite all baptized Catholics. All the baptized include ethnic and cultural communities, youth, families, persons with disabilities and their families, those living in poverty or social exclusion, and more into the active life of the parish, especially Sunday Mass?
- What prevents us from "walking together?" What hinders you from being a part of the parish and/or speaking up courageously, candidly, and responsibly?
- Pope Francis encourages us to reach out beyond our active parish community and observe who is in our local area. It is essential to look at who "used to be at our parish," and who is not here, and those who might feel left out or on the margins.
 - Do we as a parish, reach out collectively or individually to those who are no longer participating in church? What helps or hinders us?
 - What are some ways to find out why they are not participating?
 - What do we have to offer and attract those who are not participating?



May we cherish this opportunity to pray, listen, and discern so that we may continue the mission of Christ as missionary disciples.


