Archbishop Myers, a 'caring and open' shepherd

hen you are asked to write about someone you've known over a period of 15 years, you never can tell a complete story, even when you write about someone you respect and admire.

Problem is, much of what's been reported elsewhere has been wrong, slanted or politically-driven (by political, I include perceptions about "liberal" or "conservative" Catholicism, a topic about which neither Jesus nor the Apostles spoke). That surely can make it difficult to paint a true and accurate picture of someone whom others have tried to define for their own self-interests.

But here goes.

I met Archbishop Myers on the

day before the announcement of his appointment as shepherd of this local Church of Newark. He was soft-spoken and friendly, but quiet, like many people from the Midwest I've worked with or come to know over the years. Those of us from New York and New Jersey sometimes misread "quiet" as "aloof." Quiet is not generally part of the tristate DNA.

But in the days after Sept. 11, people quickly began to find out just how caring and open Archbishop Myers can be. Even though travel restrictions kept him away from Newark, he was on the phone continually with then-Auxiliary Bishop Paul Bootkoski and staff here to learn about how the people of the archdiocese were faring following the terrorist attack, and what we were doing to help those in need.

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Requiescat in Pace—Archbishop Peter Leo Gerety

fter being remembered as a profoundly spiritual pastor, Peter Leo Gerety was entombed in the cathedral basilica he called home for the 12 years he was Archbishop of Newark, following a funeral Mass that drew hundreds of the faithful consecrated religious and clergy who came to honor his 77 years of ordained ministry.

Archbishop Gerety's death Sept. 20 at 104 brought to an end a retirement his former priest secretary said constituted a third period of priestly service that lasted twice

as long as his tenure as chief shepherd of Newark.

"As assistant and support to his two successors and to fellow Christians on the pilgrimage, freed from administration, Archbishop Gerety remained pastorally present to us more actively than before," Rev. Msgr. John E. Doran said in his homily.

"Priest funerals and visits to the sick remained a priority (as did) accepting all invitations to parishes, diocesan events and the national and global church as the calendar would accept."

At his death, Archbishop Gerety was the oldest archbishop in the world, having lived through 10 papal elections and championing

the teachings of Vatican Council II, which ended in 1965, the year before he was ordained a bishop.

At the Sept. 26 Mass, the first reading from Genesis 5 told of patriarchs before the Flood who each lived for centuries, including Enoch, who "walked with God." Msgr. Doran said such longevity was considered a divine reward for righteousness that enabled the men to share their wisdom across generations.

'Archbishop Gerety's longevity of 104 years spanned the 20th and 21st centuries, walking with God and walking with us and shepherding us in righteousness and wisdom."

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US Bishops release refugee report ahead of United Nations summit

WASHINGTON— The United Nations General Assembly and the U.S. co-sponsored Leaders' Refugee Summit took place Sept. 19-20 in New York City. Ahead of the summit, the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops' Migration and Refugee Services released a report assessing the refugee crisis in Southeast Asia.

The report and the summit focused on the need for shared responsibility by the international community to address this unprecedented crisis and the hope for all refugees to someday return to their homelands.

While the Syrian and Central American migration situations have recently been in the spotlight, Burma /Myanmar's decades-long refugee crisis prompted a trip to the region also including Thailand, Malaysia, Indonesia and Australia. The Migration and Refugee Services delegation met with unaccompanied children, refugees, victims of human trafficking, local governments, Catholic and faith-based non-governmental organizations, and community leaders to better understand the humanitarian crisis and what can be done.


Bishop Eusebio Elizondo, auxiliary bishop of Seattle and chairman of the Committee on Migration, who led the delegation said, "This trip was eye-opening for me. I join my brother bishops in the Burma region and elsewhere to pray for peace and continued reform and rebuilding in the country. I pray for continued protection, humanitarian assistance, and pursuit of durable solutions for all those who are displaced."

The report comes at an important time for Burma. After six decades of being ruled by a military regime, Burma now has a democratically elected government. Some of the findings

throughout the region include:

- A special focus is needed on the Rohingya refugees challenge. Most of them suffer the vulnerabilities of being forcibly displaced, being stateless and thus targets of human rights violations and discrimination, and being victims of human smuggling or trafficking. Yet their plight is not addressed by either the national election or by the ethnic negotiations with the government.
- There is a disturbing pattern of human trafficking of refugees and migrant workers throughout the region. In the last three years, according to the Office of the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees, over 170,000 people—Bangladeshis and Rakhine State Muslims from Bangladesh and Myanmar—have resorted to dangerous sea journeys across the Bay of Bengal and Andaman Sea at the hands of human smugglers and traffickers.
- Increased numbers of Pakistani Christians seeking refuge in Thailand and Malaysia, who now constitute some 40 percent of all refugees in Bangkok, are also in dire need of protection and durable solutions, as are Montagnard Christians from Vietnam who have fled to Thailand. Syrians, Iragis, and Iranians who have fled to Malaysia are additionally experiencing difficulty finding protection and building new lives.
- Indonesia has become a collection area for refugees who were turned away from seeking refuge in Australia.


atholics have the same freedom as other citizens in making choices. They also have the duty to follow a well-formed conscience, a conscience formed not by fad or personal convenience, but by Catholic teaching. Catholic faith and teaching have condemned abortion since the earliest days of the Church. Every unique human life begins at conception. Every unborn human being shares with every other member of the human family a basic moral right to life.

Through pregnancy help centers and other programs, the Catholic Church brings love and mercy and caring to mothers and children according to the call of the Gospel. And with equal love and mercy and caring, the Church works to heal the wounds of every woman or man who has struggled with

the emotional and spiritual pain of an abortion.

Sadly, there are those who purport to be Catholic who believe that they can condone abortion. But abortion is radically inconsistent with the Catholic faith. Anyone who helps to make abortion more widely available commits a grave injustice against the most vulnerable members of the human family. Those who openly commit such instances while purporting to espouse Catholic faith not only undermine the teaching of the Church, but also seriously weaken their own relationship with the Church, the Body of Christ.

To make sure everyone understands how misguided the Catholics for Choice effort is, read these few words from Pope Francis: "Abortion is without a doubt one of the greatest moral evils within modernity."

Caldwell University professor founds new Catholic poetry journal

CALDWELL—English professor Mary Ann B. Miller is the editor of a new professional, Catholic poetry journal that is affiliated with the English Department at Caldwell University.

Presence: A Journal of Catholic Poetry is an independent journal planned for annual publication each spring. It is a venue for poetry written by authors whose work is informed by the Catholic faith.

"I am starting this journal because currently there are Catholic periodicals that print both fiction and poetry as well as those that publish articles on Catholic culture, but none that are devoted exclusively to poetry," Miller said.

To debut next spring, the journal will publish poems, "informed by the Catholic faith on the basis of their artistic excellence, rather than on the basis of the author's professed creed or because the subject

matter is explicitly Catholic," Miller said.

"On the other hand," she added, "poems that do contain overt references to Catholic concepts, such as the saints, priests, nuns, the mysteries of the rosary, just to name a few, are welcome. Many poets have told me over the years that they don't believe their poems that contain these kinds of references have been taken seriously by most journals. My hope is that *Presence* will provide a venue for these poems because artistic merit and references to Catholic images are not mutually exclusive."

What makes a poem Catholic is that it contains underlying theological assumptions, "the chief of which is the operation of God's grace in the world." As *Presence's* mission statement further explains: "The poems in this journal convey God's presence in any num-

ber of ways—by exploring the intersection of matter and spirit, by depicting the struggle between belief and doubt, by questioning the faith, being surprised by it, taking joy in it, even finding humor in it."

Miller added that "despite some important differences among the various Christian denominations, there is a great deal of common ground that exists among them, and so the journal will necessarily take on an ecumenical flavor. For example, we welcome poems that contain a kind of dialogue between Jewish and Christian or even atheist and Christian voices."

Miller has created a journal editing course in which students read poems submitted for possible publication and write reviews of individual collections of poetry by contemporary authors. The class is running for the first time this fall.

Two Catholic elementary schools awarded Blue Ribbon

U.S. Secretary of Education John B. King Jr. recently announced the 329 National Blue Ribbon Schools for 2016. Among those schools are Saint Cassian School in Upper Montclair and Academy of the Most Blessed Sacrament in Franklin Lakes. The award is based on overall academic excellence. The schools in the Archdiocese of Newark have been recognized as "Exemplary High Performing Schools."

The schools join the other 17 schools in the archdiocese which have received the distinction since 2011. To date, 27 percent of archdiocesan Catholic elementary schools have been recognized.

"National Blue Ribbon Schools are proof that we can prepare every child for college and meaningful careers," King said. "Your schools are on the cutting edge, pioneering innovative educational practices—professional learning communities, project-based learning, social and emotional learning, positive behavior systems—making you shining examples for your communities, your state and the nation."

The National Blue Ribbon Schools Program honors public and private elementary, middle, and high schools where students achieve very high learning standards or are making notable improvements in closing the achievement gap. The award affirms the hard work of students, educators, families and communities in creating safe and welcoming schools where students master challenging content. The National Blue Ribbon Schools flag gracing a school's building is a widely recognized symbol of exemplary teaching and learning.

Now in its 34th year, the program has given the award to about 8,500 schools. On Nov. 7 and 8, the Department of Education will formally recognize the 279 public and 50 private schools at an awards ceremony in Washington, D.C.





Mother Seton launches engineering programs

CLARK—Mother Seton High School hopes to inspire future engineers by initiating two new programsr. In the courses, students will enjoy hands-on exposure in the soon-to-be dedicated Sister Regina Martin Engineering Center.

"Engineering Design Process," students will encourage students to develop 21st century skills necessary to create, design, and innovate real-world challenges and solutions. Mother Seton is one of 11 schools in the archdiocese to offer this new course as part of its curriculum. At Mother Seton, a group of 20 juniors and seniors will be the first participants.

The school did not have to look far to find the right teacher to begin its engineering program. Katherine Sullivan has taught physics at the school since 1994. Prior to that, she spent eight years as an engineer for New Jersey Bell. Sullivan, who has an undergraduate degree in mechanical engineering and a master's in engineering management from NJIT, brings real experience to the classroom.

"I am excited about this pro-

gram," said Sullivan. "The girls will be learning to think outside the box. They will study the science behind things and use their creativity. They will be exposed to what real engineers do on a daily basis." She believes combining their existing science and mathematics skills with their imagination, students will create the future.

In the first quarter, students will design new modes of air, sea, and land transportation. In cooperative learning groups, students will brainstorm, build prototypes, and test-run their creations.

In the second course, "Exploring Engineering," students will focus on computer programming and electronics. The class will be taught by Louella Estillero, a 2010 graduate of Mother Seton High School. Estillero earned a bachelor's degree in mathematics from Northeastern University and is currently a math teacher at the high school.

Her love for programming started in college and was fueled this summer when she participated in an intensive training program

for teachers. Estillero wrote programs in a variety of computer languages, built and tested circuits, and programmed electronics to perform different tasks.

"Exploring Engineering" is a

two-year program. The first is dedicated to coding, and the second is spent working with electronics. Mother Seton is one of four schools in the Archdiocese of Newark offering the course.

The 'Culture of Life' begins in our hearts and our hands

ach October we observe Respect Life Month in dioceses throughout the United States. Although ending abortion remains a priority of the utmost importance, threats to the disabled and those at the end of life deserve our attention as well. The legalization of medically assisted suicide in Canada in June should serve as a wake-up call compelling us to reach out in solidarity to our most vulnerable brothers and sisters.

Like abortion, the operative words in the campaign for physician assisted suicide are "personal choice," "autonomy" and "control." Compassion and Choices, the leading pro-assisted suicide organization in our country, cites a 2015 Gallup survey claiming that seven in 10 Americans believe that doctors should be able to help terminally ill individuals end their lives "on their own terms... by some painless

means." The organization's Web site talks about ensuring that "you get what you want—and avoid enduring anything you don't" in relation to end-of-life care.

These sentiments strike me as particularly sad. I believe that they are based on two troubling attitudes in society: a loss of the sense of God -which leads to the mistaken idea that we are the masters of our own lives-and a corrupt idea of compassion. Our culture has taken this beautiful word—compassion—and turned it upside down. Compassion literally means "to suffer with." Compassion happens when you are confronted with another's suffering and feel motivated to relieve it. It is not pity; nor does it entail ending suffering by eliminating the person who suffers.

In a speech to Latin American medical associations this past summer, Pope Francis discussed the profound meaning of this virtue. "True compassion is undertaking to

bear the burden... This would mean the triumph over selfishness, of that 'throw-away culture' which rejects and scorns people who do not fulfill certain criteria of health, beauty and usefulness ... Compassion, this suffering-with, is the appropriate response to the immense value of the sick person, a response made out of respect, understanding and tenderness, because the sacred value of the life of the sick does not disappear nor is it ever darkened, but rather it shines brighter precisely in their suffering and vulnerability.'

Pope Francis summed up his message to health professionals by quoting the counsel of Saint Camillus de Lellis, the patron of nurses and the sick: "Put more heart in those hands!" This is excellent advice for all of us. If we wish to see a society that appreciates the inviolable dignity of human life and knows how to practice true compassion, we could have no better prayer than to ask God to "put more heart in our hands."



With more heart in our hands, may we bring a home-cooked meal to a shut-in, take a long walk with a grandfather suffering from Alzheimer's or offer an elderly neighbor a ride to church.

With more heart in our hands, may we have the compassion and courage to stand with a dying loved one to the very end, embracing them in a way that lets them know they are still worthy of our attention and care, and that they are awaited by a God who loves them even more than they can imagine.

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Trinitas announces new lung screening program

ELIZABETH—Trinitas
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begins with a low-dose non-invasive computerized tomography (CT) scan, that takes about
30 seconds to complete.

The test is reviewed by a board certified radiologist, a report is written and the results sent to the individual's doctor. Those whose test results are "positive," will be assigned to work with a patient navigator who will assist and guide the participant through any additional testing or appointments.

"The new lung screening program provides an extra step in patient care that helps guide them through the pro-

cess with the assistance of a patient navigator," explained Gary S. Horan, President & CEO. "This screening could potentially save lives and we encourage qualifying patients to take advantage of this program."

According to Horan, more people die of lung cancer than breast, colon and prostate cancers together, making early detection critical. Major research centers show survival rates improving from 15 percent to 80 percent with new scan protocols offered by programs such as the one at Trinitas. With the scan, small tumors, which are not visible on conventional chest x-rays, can be seen at an earlier, more curable stage.

Although the new screening process requires the use of radiation to take images of the

lungs, the amount used during the CT screening is low, about a quarter of the dose of a regular scan of the chest.

The program is recommended for those between the ages of 55-77 who have a smoking history of 30 "pack years" or more and are current smokers, or have quit in the

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past 15 years. Lung cancer screening is covered by Medicare and some insurance plans. Potential participants should contact their physician for an appointment to determine if they qualify for the program.

Archbishop John J. Myers presided at the liturgy flanked in the sanctuary by his predecessor Cardinal Theodore McCarrick and some 20 bishops while about 800 priests, deacons, consecrated religious and laity prayed and sang in the nave of the great gothic cathedral.

Places of honor with the archbishop's nieces, nephews and their children were reserved for Missionaries of Charity and Little Sisters of the Poor. The archbishop personally requested now-Saint Teresa of Kolkata to establish a house in Newark in 1981 and the Little Sisters cared for him during his final years at their Saint Joseph Home for the Elderly in Totowa. Also singled out for their long-time service to the prelate were his administrative assistant Paula Flynn and Rev. Msgr. Francis Seymour.

Msgr. Doran recalled that the archbishop would frequently be found praying before the tabernacle in the cathedral for which he had a special fondness because it reminded him of Notre Dame in Paris where the Shelton, CT native was ordained a priest in 1939.

His wood casket was entombed in the crypt across from four of his predecessors: Archbishops Thomas A. Boland and Thomas J. Walsh and Bishops John J. O'Connor and Winand M. Wigger.

Archbishop Gerety was appointed to succeed Archbishop Boland in 1974 by Blessed Paul VI, who had named him coadjutor bishop of Portland, ME in 1966. He succeeded to the see in 1969.

Before that, he served for 27 years as a priest in the Archdiocese of Hartford, CT, for which he was ordained. Most of his ministry was spent in New Haven, where Father Gerety devoted much time to the social and spiritual needs of the black Catholic community.

He founded an interracial social and religious center, the Saint Martin de Porres Center, which became Saint Martin de Porres Parish in 1956 with Father Gerety as its first pastor. A champion of the Civil Rights movement in the 1960s, he founded the New Haven chapter of the Urban League and was a member of the Connecticut State Committee on Race and Religion and the National Catholic Conference on Interracial Justice.



Bishop Gerety was active in pro-life and social justice causes, led campaigns to protest state legislative efforts to legalize abortion, and defended the rights of conscientious objectors during the Vietnam War.

In Newark, Archbishop Gerety continued to build and strengthen outreach to Latin American and black Catholic communities in northern New Jersey. He also sought to strengthen adult faith formation in parishes. Included was the establishment of Renew International, a resource for parish-based programs aimed at invigorating Catholic women and men to act on their faith through works of charity and justice.

During the 1970s, Archbishop Gerety addressed a grim financial picture through collaboration and cooperation with a group of business leaders who succeeded in eliminating millions of dollars in debt and bringing the archdiocese back to a sound financial footing. During this time the seminary property at Darlington in Mahwah was sold and the school moved to the campus of Seton Hall University.

Under his stewardship, the archdiocese also instituted a formal parish-based, annual appeal to provide long-term support of vital parish, social service and school ministries.


Yet, as busy as Archbishop Gerety was, he maintained a routine of visiting hospitals and nursing homes and bringing Holy Communion on Christmas to homebound cathedral parishioners, Msgr. Doran said. It was all in keeping with the archbishop's favorite saying from Saint Augustine of Hippo: "I am a bishop for you; I am a Christian like you."

Fellow priests celebrate legacy of Archbishop Gerety

his over 104 years in this world, Archbishop Gerety spent 42 of them here in the Archdiocese of Newark: 12 as our archbishop and 30 in retirement, which could be well argued was hardly a retirement. While the longevity of his time with us would seal a life and legacy, in and of itself, his impact goes well beyond the mere measurement of time, as significant as that is.



All of these realities contribute immeasurably to the legacy that Archbishop Gerety leaves for us, all of which were imbued with the vision of the Second Vatican Council. As with most lives and legacies, it can sometimes be hard to isolate the realities that are here today that would not or might not have been had someone not been here. But it would be most safe to say that he has left an immeasurable legacy in the archdiocese, moving us in a direction that will last well beyond the years of his life here.

tinued to frown in my direction, so this time I filled his glass to the top and he gave me a big smile. That evening when I was driving home, I realized that I had discovered the secret to Archbishop Gerety's 104 years: he filled the cup of life to the brim and he drank it to the end.

Archbishan Peter Leo Gerety ordained me to the priesthood. He assigned me as parochial vicar to Sacred Heart Cathedral. So, I had the privilege of living with him in the cathedral rectory and getting to know him as a great leader and a caring shepherd.

He was bigger than life. There was always something new and exciting going on in the Archdiocese of Newark during his time here as archbishop. Yet, through it all, he was a man of deep faith and prayer. He was always close to the Lord and devoted to the Blessed

While he was not of the world, he knew the importance of being in the world. So, he was always reading a new book and keeping up with the news and the times. I think he saw this as a way to be better able to serve the people, especially the poor and the suffering.

Although he was an archbishop, he always had a priestly heart. He anointed my mother when she was ill, and for this, I will always be so grateful to him. May he rest in peace!



Once he could arrive in Newark, he visited Ground Zero and met with the men and women working in the temporary crisis operations center of the Port Authority of New York and New Jersey. A woman there asked him for help—she said she had lost the ability to pray. Archbishop Myers gave her his rosary and told her not to worry, that even the idea that she was seeking a way to pray was itself a prayer.

In the weeks and months that followed he visited many Catholic Charities facilities—homeless shelters, homes for AIDS patients, work training centers—schools, parishes and Catholic hospitals. Mostly, he visited to meet the people who represent the Church and to learn from those whom they serve.

From those early visits has come a solid commitment by the archbishop that continues today to fund the critical work of the Church's network of social outreach agencies, as well as a similar commitment to ensure that there will be Catholic schools for every child wishing to attend. I generally accompany him on school visits—sometimes we go physically, and sometimes through Skype. He encourages the young people in our Catholic schools to ask honest and direct questions about faith, and he answers every

In my more than 40 years in the communications field, I have worked with many decision-makers. I can say definitively that Archbishop Myers eagerly seeks input and participation on the important issues affecting the Church and her people. He says he is able to exercise his ministry as chief teacher of faith and shepherd of this local Church because of the collaboration and cooperation of the priests, consecrated religious and lay people who work for and volunteer in the archdiocese. The decisions are his, but he actively seeks all views before making the necessary and sometimes difficult choices he must for the good of the archdiocese and her people.

There have been countless moments when Archbishop Myers reaches out personally to help someone in need, to be the face of Jesus when He is most needed. He prefers not to speak about this generally—something about not letting "the left hand know what your right hand is doing." However, let me share with you three specific moments of which you have probably never heard.

A young Newark girl, who desperately needed eye surgery to avoid becoming blind, was able to travel across the country for essential medical attention.

A young man from a very large family who couldn't afford to travel to Poland for World Youth Day was able to make the trip and experience a deepening of faith—both for him and for his family. That strengthening of faith has been especially helpful recently, after the young man suffered severe injuries following a car accident.

In cooperation with a local hospital's social service staff, a very needy area family was able to have a Christmas celebration at a time when the mother was suffering from an incurable disease. Shortly after that Christmas, the mother died and Archbishop Myers again stepped in, with the help of a local funeral director, to arrange for her funeral and burial.

As I said, I can never tell a complete story of the past 15 years with Archbishop Myers. This is only a small part of what I have witnessed. What I will say, however, is that it has been, and continues to be, a privilege to help him in his ministry as Archbishop of Newark.



Although the Catholic Church is against embryonic stem cell research, which results in the destruction of a human embryo, stem cells collected from the umbilical cord of a newborn do no harm to the child. Archbishop Myers deemed the initiative "a model in the state and throughout the country" for adult stem cell research. "Efforts like this partnership among the Catholic hospitals in New Jersey...will truly advance the goal of finding cures for diseases without sacrificing human life," Archbishop Myers said.



Coat of arms offers insight into life, traditions of Archbishop Myers

MYSTERIUM ECCLESIAE LUCEAT

he motto on Archbishop John J. Myers' coat of arms reads: *Mysteri*um Ecclesiae Luceat ("Let the mystery of the Church shine forth"). The motto offers a summary of the central theme of the Second Vatican Council's (1962-66) Dogmatic Constitution of the Church, known as *Lumen Gentium* ("Light of the Nations").

The first chapter of Lumen Gentium is entitled: "The Mystery of the Church" and begins with the proclamation that Jesus Christ is the light of

The first encyclical of Pope Paul VI, Ecclesiam Suam ("His Church"), which was promulgated Aug. 6, 1964, states the Church "is a storehouse of God's hidden counsels, which the Church must bring to light." Pope John Paul II, in his first encyclical Redemptor Hominis ("The Redeemer of Man"), promulgated March 4, 1979, declared "the Church's fundamental function in every age and particularly ours is to direct man's gaze, to point the awareness and experience of the whole humanity towards the mystery of God." These papal encyclicals inspired Archbishop Myers' choice of a motto.

The personal coat of arms, represented by the right side of the shield, consists of a green background on which there is an eagle's head enhaloed and tinctured in gold. In the upper portion of the shield are two silver crescents and in the base is a silver roundel or circle.

The eagle's head is the traditional symbol of Saint John the Evangelist, honoring the baptismal patron of the archbishop's late father, Melvin Wayne (Jack) Myers as well as Archbishop Myers. The eagle represents the higher vision that faith brings to life and the hope that Christians should have in the face of difficulty.

The silver roundel in the base is a symbol of the Gospels, the "pearl of great price," and the striving for the Kingdom of Heaven as recorded in the Gospel of Saint Matthew (12:45-46). As the eagle's head honors the archbishop's father, the pearl honors the archbishop's late mother, Margaret, whose name means "pearl."

The two silver crescents in the chief, or upper section of the shield, honors the Blessed Virgin Mary under the title of the Immaculate Conception. She is the patroness of the North American College of Rome, where Archbishop Myers prepared for his ordination, and the Catholic University of

> America in Washington DC, where he earned his doctorate in Canon Law.

These crescents, which honor the Blessed Virgin Mary, memorialize the archbishop's devotion to Mary, Mother of God and Mother of the Church. This ancient symbol of Mary is derived from the Book of Revelations 12:1: "And a great sign appeared in the heaven; a woman clothed with the sun, and the moon under her feet, and on her head a crown of 12 stars."

The green surface of the shield recalls the verdant fields of the archbishop's birthplace and his Irish heritage. The external ornaments of the coat of arms are composed of the green pontifical hat, with its 10 tassels on each side, disposed in four rows and a gold processional cross.

The left side of the shield displays the jurisdictional arms of the Archdiocese of Newark, based on the coat of arms of Newark, Nottinghamshire, England, to reflect the origins of the name of the See city. The upper portion

of the coat of arms of the archdiocese includes a silver crescent between two silver trefoils (heraldic shamrocks).

The two shamrocks are a tribute to Saint Patrick, titular patron of Newark's Pro-Cathedral. The red background of the chief is to signify the blood coming forth from Christ's Sacred Heart, which reflects the title of the Cathedral Basilica of Newark.
