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Federal court denies motion to dismiss Archdiocese's headstone case

ARLINGTON, VA—A federal judge denied the state's motion to dismiss the Archdiocese of Newark's constitutional challenge to a law that makes it illegal for the archdiocese to sell headstones to its parishioners. On April 30, the court ruled that the archdiocese's case deserves a full hearing.

The Virginia-based Institute for Justice and the archdiocese filed suit last July, arguing that the new law violated the archdiocese's economic liberty because it forbids religious cemeteries from selling headstones and other monuments to parishio-

ners. The State Assembly passed the law at the behest of the Monument Builders Association of New Jersey, the lobbying arm of the tombstone-dealer industry. Gov. Chris Christie signed the bill on March 23, 2015.

"Contrary to the government's view, judges are not just rubber stamps for the legislature," said Greg Reed, an attorney with the Institute for Justice. "We intend to get this anti-competitive law struck down not only for the benefit of the archdiocese, but also to set prece-

dent that will protect entrepreneurs and consumers everywhere from special interests, like the monument builders here."

The court noted that the Arch-diocese of Newark's challenge resembled another case out of the 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals, which struck down a Louisiana law that prevented the monks of Saint Joseph Abbey from selling their caskets to the public because they were not licensed by the state as funeral directors.

"We are grateful for the court's

wisdom and outcome for allowing this to proceed in hopes that we will once again be permitted to offer an option and valuable service that benefits many of the Catholic families we serve," said Andrew Schafer, executive director of Catholic Cemeteries of the Archdiocese of Newark.

The court ordered the parties to create a schedule for gathering and submitting evidence and legal briefs. The archdiocese expects the process to be completed by the end of the year and for the court to make a decision in early 2017.

Immaculate Heart Academy selects new leadership

WASHINGTON TOWNSHIP— Effective July 1, Patricia Molloy, current principal of Immaculate Heart Academy, will assume the role of president, and current Vice Principal Jason Schlereth will assume the role of principal.

The principal, similar to that of a

chief operating officer, is responsible for academic affairs and daily operational management of Immaculate Heart Academy.

Molloy has been a member of the Immaculate Heart faculty for 43 years. She served on the administrative team for 35 of those years, 10 of them as principal.

"Having dedicated my career to Immaculate Heart Academy, I hope to continue to contribute to this outstanding school in a new and challenging role," she said. "My history at Immaculate Heart has provided me with a perspective on the institutional history of the school that is invaluable in mapping its progress forward. The academy is my home, my family, and the focus of my life. My 43 years here have been a blessing."

Schlereth started at the academy as athletic director. He became a member of the administrative team in 2010 and was promoted from assistant principal to vice

principal in 2013.

"It is an honor to be tasked with leading an institution as prestigious at Immaculate Heart Academy," Schlereth said. Archdiocese of Newark actively monitoring water in its schools

NEWARK—Following news reports about high levels of lead in the drinking water in the public schools of Newark and other New Jersey municipalities, Archbishop John J. Myers directed the five Catholic elementary schools and three Catholic high schools in the city of Newark cease using tap water while testing is conducted, and use only bottled water for drinking or cooking. The archdiocese also implemented a monitoring program of the water in those buildings.

Data collected to date on the Newark school sites indicate the level of lead in the water is safe in more than 95 percent of all water spouts tested. Even with this significant positive result, the archdiocese is maintaining caution and requiring the schools and parents continue to use bottled water until all outlets prove to be 100 percent safe. The results of all tests are being provided to parents as part of regular school communications.

In addition, Archbishop My-

ers has directed that monitoring and testing of drinking water be expanded to all of the 67 Catholic elementary schools and 29 Catholic high schools within the four counties of Bergen, Essex, Hudson and Union. The first phase of this expanded monitoring will involve testing of some 10 outlets in each school by a state-certified laboratory. Any positive readings will be remedied immediately.

If all 10 results come back at safe levels, the next sampling will be scheduled to coincide with the time of the next asbestos inspection (within six months) at the schools. The sample records will be archived in a manner similar to the AHERA plan used to document asbestos inspections.

Every archdiocesan school must have the water tested in a systematic fashion using licensed engineers and laboratories certified by the state. While state law and directives are evolving on an almost daily basis, the archdiocese is looking for all of its schools to have some sampling performed prior to reopening in September.

Although the emphasis is the long-term safety of drinking water for students, Archbishop Myers has also encouraged pastors within the archdiocese to consider having the water


checked in parishes, rectories and parish centers.

There are 67 elementary schools and 29 high schools operating within the Archdiocese of Newark. They serve 17,775 students in Pre-kindergarten through Grade 8, and 12,787 students in Grades 9-12.

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Day of Prayer for mariners, people of the sea

WASHINGTON—The National Day of Prayer and Remembrance for mariners and people of the sea will be celebrated May 22. The day is observed in conjunction with National Maritime Day in the U.S., which, since 1933, has recognized merchant mariners and others in the maritime industry.

The Apostleship of the Sea ministry is active in 48 dioceses in the country, including the Archdiocese of Newark. The ministry provides pastoral outreach in nearly 53 maritime ports in 26 states with a network of about 92 chaplains, priests, religious, deacons and lay ministers.

"In this Jubilee Year of Mercy declared by Pope Francis, may we bring the opportunity of encountering the mercy of God to our brothers and sisters who are seafarers, fishermen, and those whose occupations require them to spend most of the year away from their families, on the high seas, and sometimes facing dangerous situations," said Bishop J. Kevin Boland, retired bishop of Savannah, GA, and Apostleship of the Sea promoter. "They too are our brothers and sisters with spiritual needs, may we accompany them in their joys and trials in life,



so they may also grow in faith and understanding of God's love."

Special Masses will be celebrated in observance of the National Day of Prayer on Friday, May 20, at the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops and May 21, at the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception in Washington.

Bishop Boland also encouraged dioceses to mark the national day by remembering the men and women of the sea in homilies and by including special petitions during Mass. When Mass is celebrated May 22, the text for the Votive Mass of the Blessed Virgin Mary, Star of the Sea, is encouraged.

The National Day of Prayer and Remembrance was designated in 2005 to encourage the faithful in the country to support, remember and pray for merchant mariners, fishermen, port personnel and those in the maritime industry.

Ninety percent of the world's goods are transported by water. There are approximately 1.2 million seafarers worldwide in 10,000 commercial ships and other vessels. The Apostleship of the Sea is a world-wide Catholic maritime ministry of spiritual and practical assistance to seafarers, fishermen, their families and all who work and travel by sea and the waterways.

2020 project seeks to advance protection of unborn

n May 2015, the House of Representatives approved HR 36, a bill that would ban abortion at 20 weeks and later in all 50 states. Unfortunately, the bill was blocked by a Senate filibuster this past September. The U.S. is one of only seven countries in which elective, late-term abortions are legal, putting us in the same company as North Korea, China and Vietnam.

Known as the "Pain Capable Unborn Child Protection Act," the proposed bill includes congressional recognition that an unborn child of 20 weeks has developed pain receptors and responds to painful stimuli. This is the first step to banning all abortions and attaining equal rights for all babies in the womb.

If passed, the bill would create exceptions in cases of risk of death or permanent injury of the mother, rape, and incest against a minor. In cases of either rape or incest, it would require that the offense must be reported to law enforcement prior to the abortion. Under these circumstances, a woman who undergoes an abortion could not be prosecuted.

To promote the passage of this important piece of legislation on the state level by the year 2020, members of pro-life groups from across the state including the Respect Life Office of the Archdiocese of Newark, and LIFENET recently established the 2020 Project, a collaborative ongoing effort to ban abortion past 20 weeks, post-fertilization.

The 2020 Project is intended to be a multifaceted approach to advance the protection of babies in the womb including advocacy, community outreach and public education and prayer.

In New Jersey, abortion is legal throughout all three trimesters of pregnancy and, sadly, third trimester abortions are routine. This occurs despite the fact that there is a wealth of anatomical, behavioral and physiological evidence that shows that the developing baby in the womb is capable of experiencing tremendous pain by 20 weeks post-fertilization.

In November 2014, a Quinnipiac University poll found that 60 percent of Americans would support a bill like the "Pain Capable Unborn Child Protection Act."

In the words of Cardinal Sean O'Malley, Chairman of the Pro-Life Secretariat of the United States Bishops' Conference, "the proposed ban on abortion at 20 weeks after fertilization is a place to begin uniting Americans who see themselves as 'pro-life' and as 'pro-choice." It is promising, too, that as we continue to push for a federal ban, a five-month ban on abortion has successfully become law in 13 other states to date.

And now, in New Jersey, the 2020 Project is an effort to educate our fellow citizens about the humanity of the unborn child and the inhumanity of abortion by promoting and passing the Pain Capable Unborn Child Protection Act by 2020.

The New Jersey version of the bill has been introduced in the Assembly, A3452, and was referred to the Assembly Health and Senior Services Committee. An identical bill was introduced in the Senate, S2026.

Bishops support Conscience Protection Act

WASHINGTON—The U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops joined 25 other major pro-life, religious, and health care organizations on April 19 urging the U.S. House of Representatives to pass the Conscience Protection Act of 2016 (H.R. 4828). Signatories include 10 medical groups representing tens of thousands of health care professionals who object to abortion and are seeking legal protection to serve their patients in good conscience.

"Federal laws protecting conscientious objection to abortion have been approved for decades by congresses and presidents of both parties. Even many 'pro-choice' Americans realize that the logic of their position requires them to respect a choice not to be involved

in abortion," they wrote. "Yet it is increasingly clear that the current laws offer far less protection in practice than in theory."

The Conscience Protection Act, introduced on March 22 by Reps. John Fleming, M.D. (R-LA) and Vicky Hartzler (R-MO), addresses what they say are several loopholes in current federal laws. The letter cites a recent California mandate for almost all health plans in the state to pay for elective abortions, and the government's failure to vindicate the rights of New York nurse Cathy DeCarlo after she was pressured to assist at a late-term abortion.

The joint letter said the bill, "would mean almost no change in the substantive policy of Congress" but "would be an enormous step forward in assuring Americans who serve the sick and needy that they can do so without being forced by government to violate their most deeply held convictions on respect for innocent human life."

"Sheep" by Emily Goncalves

SUMMIT-Oak Knoll senior Emily Goncalves recently joined the likes of artist Andy Warhol, author Sylvia Plath and filmmaker Ken Burns, when she was awarded a National Gold Key in the Scholastic Art and Writing Awards Competition.

The annual competition includes 320,000 entries from across the country with only 1 percentroughly 2,400—earning the distinction Goncalves was awarded for her picture "Sheep," which she took while performing with the Ensemble, Oak Knoll's select female vocal group, during its spring break performance trip to Ireland last year.

Goncalves' photo was among nine by Oak Knoll students that were recognized at the regional level of the annual competition in February. The students' work, which was recognized among 19,000 other regional honorees nationwide, were automatically entered into the national round of the competition.

subjects during what was dubbed "the decisive moment" by French humanist photographer Henri Cartier-Bresson.



"This recognition highlights the fact that Oak Knoll has given me the opportunity to enrich myself artistically and academically. Ms. Breitenstein has always challenged me creatively, while encouraging me to enter these types of competitions, so I'm definitely grateful to have her as my teacher," Goncalves said.

"The fact I took this photograph while traveling on Ensemble's singing tour in Ireland further emphasizes the tremendous opportunities that Oak Knoll presents as well as its promotion of the arts," she said.

Goncalves' photo will be on display at the Sheila Johnson Design Center at the Parsons School of Design in New York City from June 2-12. Goncalves and her family have also been invited to the organization's annual national event at Carnegie Hall in New York City on June 2.

hroughout history, the Catholic Church has worked to meet the needs of the less fortunate through feeding the poor, tending the sick and housing the homeless. Examples of these works of mercy are abound and are a testament to the living faith.

Catholic religious orders of men and women built hospitals, schools and orphanages to care for those in need. Where would this country be today without these crusaders? The Church continues to adapt to meet the evolving needs of people and this can be seen across the state.

With creative thinking and partnerships with groups like Build with Purpose, the Church is using its assets to once again educate children, house the sick and provide services to those in need. An example of this is the senior residence at Saint Peter the Apostle in River Edge, located in the convent that once housed the Religious Teachers Filippini who taught in the adjacent school. The large convent was once obsolete and sat vacant.

Build with Purpose, working with the local parish and the Archdiocese of Newark converted the property into supportive housing for seniors. The innovative model provides housing and care to seniors who are too frail to live at home yet allows them independence. The building once housed sisters who educated and cared for children; decades later it is caring for these "children" as they enjoy their golden years.

Pope Francis challenged Catholics to use our assets to care for the poor. Build with Purpose answers this call and works with the Church to reimagine how its assets, in this case real estate, can meet the ever-changing needs of its people.


