Thousands of men and women gather to grow in faith

ore than 3,000 men and women throughout the Archdiocese of Newark gathered at Seton Hall University over two Saturdays for the annual men's and women's conferences. Both events provided the opportunity to listen to inspirational speakers and music, experience fellowship and join in prayer and worship, including Holy Hour and confession.

Close to 1,500 women attended the Women's Commission Day of Reflection on Mar. 11.

Preparing to receive the sacraments

he Archdiocese of Newark will welcome nearly 1,200 new Catholics this Easter season. Among them are the 499 catechumens who will be baptized. They celebrated the Rite of Election with Cardinal Joseph W. Tobin, C.Ss.R., on Mar. 5 at the Cathedral Basilica of the Sacred Heart.

During this ceremony, held annually on the First Sunday of Lent, catechumens supported by their sponsors, RCIA directors and family members, publicly declared their desire to receive the sacraments. The bilingual celebration consisted of a Liturgy of the Word and a homily by the cardinal.

"Jesus has touched your hearts and has sown within them a hunger and longing for participation in his special presence within his church in the sacraments of Christian initiation, especially, the Eucharist," Cardinal Tobin said.

Afterward, the celebration of election began. Father Armand Mantia, the archdiocesan director of the RCIA, called each catechumen by name, which included both adults and children. Cardinal Tobin then asked questions of the godparents, the assembly and the catechumens.

"Therefore, do you wish to enter fully into the life of the church through the sacraments of baptism, confirmation and the Eucharist," Cardinal Tobin asked the catechumens, to which they replied, "We do."

The RCIA coordinators, holding the Book of the Elect in front of them, led the catechumens and their godparents to the altars along the side aisles of the cathedral where each individual signed their names into the book. The coordinators then led the catechumens down the center aisle to the sanctuary.

The cardinal addressed those standing before him saying, "I now declare you to be members of the elect, to be initiated into the sacred mysteries at the next Easter Vigil."

The sponsors placed their right hands on the shoulders of the elect as a sign that they are taking them under their care.


Once everyone returned to their seat, Cardinal Tobin offered a final prayer before blessing the

"(It's) a new beginning, a community, a family," said elect Jennifer Tamagnini of Saint John the Apostle in Linden.

"I was not raised with any religion really and I got to a point later in my life where I just wanted to develop a relationship with God," said Joe LoCascio of Our Lady of Mount Carmel in Nutley. "This is the last hurdle before the Easter Vigil. It's been a long time, but I'm very excited about it."

"It's a very important day for him because he's going to receive all the sacraments so he can become a Catholic. To him that's very important," said the teacher and translator for Jesus Estrada of Saint Joseph of the Palisades in West New York.

The previous day, the Call to Continuing Conversion was held at the cathedral with 693 candidates. Most were Catholics who will complete their sacraments of initiation; others were baptized in another Christian tradition that is recognized by the Catholic Church. They will be confirmed and receive first Communion during the Easter season.

Mother Olga of the Sacred Heart gave the first keynote address. Founder and mother servant of Daughters of Mary of Nazareth, she was born and raised in Iraq. In 1993, as a young laywoman, she started a movement called Love Your Neighbor. She invited young men and women from Christian and Muslim communities to serve the needs of the poor in Iraq. In 1995, Mother Olga established the order of Marth Maryam Sisters-Missionaries of the Virgin Mary, the first order for religious sisters in the Assyrian Church of the East in 700 years.

Mother Olga came to the United States in 2001 and earned a master's degree in pastoral ministry from Boston College. From 2002 to 2011, she was involved in the campus ministry at Boston University. In April 2011, Archbishop of Boston Cardinal Seán Patrick O'Malley, O.F.M.Cap., entrusted her to establish Daughters of Mary of Nazareth in the archdiocese.

"Sometimes I think I am living the life of somebody else," she said. "I am living a life driven by the power of the Holy Spirit. We are only his instruments."

Mother Olga explored the Day of Reflection's theme "Alive in Christ as Missionary Disciples."

"The Lord counts on each of us to continue his mission and his Gospel," she explained. "Grace comes to us every day through the sacraments and a life of prayer. It does not happen once; it is a daily commitment. It is only through that grace that I can rise and serve him; it is a daily conversion."

Through her hardships, Mother Olga said she has always counted on Christ.

"I asked him to lead and guide me. The call is different for each one of us. We are all daughters of God and servants of Christ," she said. "If we allow his grace to the bestselling author of the Chime Travelers children's fiction series, gave the second keynote address. She talked about finding balance between faith and family.

Joan Shaw, a parishioner at Saint Andrew in Bayonne, said Hendey's message resonated with her.

"As busy moms, we have to

touch us, and converse with him in daily prayer, we will go to our own families and neighbors and be missionaries. We must be a vessel for the Holy Spirit. We carry his heavenly treasure in this earthly vessel."

Susan Pensoy, a parishioner at Saint Aedan in Jersey City, found Mother Olga's presentation "inspiring and energizing."

"I feel it is our duty and obligation as Catholic women to be here," said Pensoy, who attended the Day of Reflection for her third time

"I think the Day of Reflection is a great way to begin the season (of Lent) by spending time with the Lord," said Yolette Bateau of Saint Aloysius Parish in Jersey City. "Mother Olga really got my attention. She faced so many difficulties in her life and never gave up."

Lisa Hendey, the founder and editor of CatholicMom.com and

find a way to fit more God into our everyday lives. Our faith has to be more than just Sunday Mass," she said.

The previous week, on Mar. 4, about 1,600 faithful men attended the Catholic Men's Conference.

Cardinal O'Malley gave the keynote address. His talk focused on the importance of faith and vocations, explaining that faith in God is what will truly guide people to discover their calling in life.

"God is still calling people to religious life, marriage, and single life," he said. "But in this secularized society, it is easy to become distracted. We need to make time for prayer and have faith that God will show us where we need to go."

The theme for the Men's Conference was "Be Not Afraid: Becoming Missionary Disciples."

"God will never close the door on those who ask for it to remain open," the cardinal added. "If we make time during our day for God, we will understand why he loves us."

Presentations were also given by Dr. Scott Sullivan, a doctor in philosophy, and Jeff Feagles, a former punter for the New York Giants.

Both events featured Spanish-language presentations and concluded with Cardinal Joseph W. Tobin, C.Ss.R, celebrating Mass.

Child killed, church damaged in Union City fire

UNION CITY— A fast-moving fire that started in an apartment building claimed the life of 2-year-old Eddie Gonzalez Jr. and severely damaged nearby Saints Joseph and Michael Parish.

Officials said the fire was believed to have started inside the three-story building at 1404 Summit Ave. in the early morning hours on March 4. The fire quickly spread to nearby buildings, leaving 15 apartments damaged or destroyed. Officials said the Red Cross is providing hotel rooms for the 40 residents who lost their homes.

Saints Joseph and Michael Parish is located roughly 100 yards from the start of the fire, but 30-45 mph winds carried burning embers to the church, quickly igniting the roof and steeple. Thousands of gallons of water were used to continuously fight the flames for more than nine hours.

The church rectory, located across the street on Central Ave., was not damaged.

In a statement, Cardinal Joseph W. Tobin, C.Ss.R., expressed condo-

lences on behalf of the Archdiocese of Newark to the Gonzalez family and all those who were injured.

"We also are thankful for the efforts of the fire and public safety workers who battled the blazes on such a frigid and icy night and day, as well as Union City Mayor Brian Stack as we have sought to maintain a sense of parish life at this time," Cardinal Tobin said.

In a letter to his parishioners,

Father Aro Nathan thanked the community for their support and prayers: "The Lord is with us. We are in His hands. We are sure that, being united, after these moments of trial we will see better days. For now, I ask for your understanding and your patience."

Executive Director of Property Management for the archdiocese Steve Belloise was on the scene of the fire early Saturday morning. The church's steeple and roof collapsed, destroying the floor and pews. The building also has significant water damage and structural problems.

"Right now we are trying to determine where the emergency construction ends and the renovation begins. We want to make the venerable parish seem whole again without compromising the aesthetics," he explained.


