RENEW jubilarian a 'visionary and pioneer'

hen Rev. Msgr. Thomas Kleissler published his memoir in 2014, he called it "Beyond My Wildest Dreams." The title refers to a ministry he co-founded in the Archdiocese of Newark that, un-

the Archdiocese of Newark that, under his leadership, became a worldwide phenomenon.

Since 1978, RENEW International has touched the lives of more than 25 million people in the United States and 23 other countries—far beyond the dreams of a young priest. Father Tom, as he is widely known, was born on June 12, 1931 and grew up in the Vailsburg neighborhood in Newark. As a kid, he loved sports, especially Seton Hall basketball and Giants football.

He entered the seminary as a high school freshman and was ordained to the priesthood 12 years later in 1957. This year, he is celebrating 60 years as a priest.

His first assignment was Our Lady of Mercy Church in Park Ridge where he began his ministry by visiting every home in the parish. He also encouraged more than Continued on page 35

'l am Joseph, your brother' Cardinal begins pilgrimage of discovering archdiocese

ince early March, Cardinal Joseph W. Tobin, C.Ss.R., has undertaken a series of visits to the deaneries within the archdiocese to meet the people. Through these visits, he learns from parishioners about the many gifts that exist in the Archdiocese of Newark.

At each of the meetings held to date—some 15 in all as of June—the cardinal has dined with the priests in the deanery, celebrated Mass with the people and conducted a town hall-style meeting following Mass. And as the cardinal is beginning to get to know his people, they are starting to get to know their new shepherd.

"People ask me what my vision for the archdiocese is. I have no vision ... yet," he explained. He said he wants to listen to the people and ask them: "If you were in my shoes, what do you see as the needs and the gifts of the archdiocese?"

Parishioners are expressing their love and appreciation for the priests in their parishes, and for the joy of being able to worship and receive the sacraments. They also are discussing quite plainly their concerns for issues very close to their hearts. Catholic schools, adult and youth continuing faith formation, outreach Continued on page 13

Diocesan communicators honor Cardinal Tobin

imple acts of accompaniment communicate the Christian message of hope, said Cardinal Joseph W. Tobin, C.Ss.R. The Archbishop of Newark gave the keynote address at DeSales Media's celebration of World Communications Day in Brooklyn May 17.

Held at BRIC House in the downtown area, the day-long conference brought together about 250 people involved in both the religious and secular media as well as interested parishioners.

Cardinal Tobin was presented with the Brooklyn Diocese's Distinguished Communicator Award.

To illustrate his point, Cardinal Tobin used a well-publicized incident when he accompanied a poor Mexican immigrant who was threatened with deportation to the federal courthouse in Newark. He prayed with members of other faiths alongside Catalino Guerrero, a 59-year-old grandfather who had never been charged with any crimes and who suffered from diabetes and heart disease.

"This act of accompaniment was simply a singular act of trying to make a difference in the face of vast hopelessness," Cardinal Tobin said. "As Christians we have no alternative but to communicate hope and we do that when we put a face on those who have been frequently demonized into being something they are not."

He said this "facelessness" of the poor and the downtrodden is "aided and abetted by political rhetoric and also by a complicit news media."

The cardinal said he doesn't want to make the media into a punching bag, but added there are some glaring deficiencies in the news industry that demand attention.

The media "doesn't always report the facts straight forwardly," instead opting for the spectacular "if-it-bleeds-it-leads" approach he stated.

Cardinal Tobin said he once was out of the country for five years and when he returned, he wondered, "Where can I get the news?"

He also pointed to the "fearbased" coverage of events that causes hysteria and stirs controversy rather than simply reporting the facts.

To counteract the "facelessness" of the poor and forgotten, Christians, he said, are called to communicate the Gospel of Jesus by simple acts of kindness.

"Accompanying Catalino Guerrero was simply an act of compassion on my part," he said. "But to many it was a symbol that communicated hope and a sign that the Church does not live in some ivory tower.



it, were actions taken together that provided a lens through which others might see this event," he said.

The program also featured a panel discussion on "Fact or Fiction: Journalism's Last Stand?" and an exclusive screening of "Sacred," a new faith-based documentary, with a question and answer period with the filmmakers.

Cardinal Tobin blesses fleet

n June 2, Cardinal Joseph W. Tobin embarked on a four-hour tour via the Sandy Hook Pilot Vessel *New York* to conduct the annual blessing of the seafarers, ships and maritime industry of the ports of New Jersey and New York.

The National Day of Prayer and Remembrance for Mariners and People of the Sea was celebrated on May 22. The day is observed in conjunction with National Maritime Day in the U.S., which has been celebrated since 1933 to honor those who serve as merchant mariners and to recognize the benefits of the maritime industry.

The 182-foot vessel got underway just after 9 a.m. with Cardinal Tobin and more than 100 invited guests aboard. In attendance were representatives of shipping associations, clergy, maritime unions, trucking associations and parishio-

ners of Stella Maris Chapel in Port Newark. Once the vessel was underway from Port Newark, Cardinal Tobin presided over a concelebrated Mass with Rev. Msgr. Richard Arnhols, Rev. Msgr. Michael Andreano, Father Ernest Rush, Father Martin Vavrak and Father John Corbett. The Mass was offered for the intentions, safety and welfare of all people involved in the maritime industry. In his homily, Cardinal Tobin recalled this was his first Mass on the high seas in his 39 years of priesthood.

The *New York* sailed at a slow speed as Mass was celebrated on the upper deck of the ship. The ship cruised down Newark Bay through the Kill Van Kull into Lower New York Bay along the shore of Staten Island. The ship then proceeded northward toward the Statue of Liberty. At Ellis Island, the New York Fire Department Fireboat 343 was waiting to surprise Cardinal Tobin with its 11 water cannons spraying plumes of water (50,000 gallons per minute) high into the sky.

Following Mass, Cardinal Tobin spent the remainder of the cruise talking with guests and having his picture taken. Fr. Corbett, director of the Apostleship of the Sea, then invited the cardinal to lead the annual blessing of the fleet.

The vessel returned to Red Hook Terminal in Port Newark shortly before 1 p.m. The Sandy Hook Pilots Association donated their time and use of the vessel for the special occasion, and other volunteers donated food and logistical support for the outing.

President Trump's decision to withdraw from Paris agreement 'deeply troubling'

WASHINGTON—The U.S. bishop's conference is speaking out after President Donald Trump announced the United States will not honor the Paris agreement on climate change. The U.S. and China, the two largest carbon emitters, and 195 other nations, signed the agreement that was ratified in November 2016. The Paris agreement establishes that nations must reduce their carbon dioxide emissions in order to keep global temperatures below a two-degree Celsius increase in relation to pre-industrial levels.

"The president's decision not to honor the U.S. commitment to the Paris agreement is deeply troubling," said Bishop Oscar Cantú, chairman of the Committee on International Justice and Peace.

Bishop Cantú stressed that, although the Paris agreement is not the only possible mechanism for addressing global carbon mitigation, the lack of a current viable alternative is a serious concern.

"The United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB), along with Pope Francis and the entire Catholic Church, have consis-



tently upheld the Paris agreement as an important international mechanism to promote environmental stewardship and encourage climate change mitigation," he said.

"The Scriptures affirm the value of caring for creation and caring for each other in solidarity. The Paris agreement is an international accord that promotes these values," CNS photo/Joshua Roberts

added the bishop of Las Cruces, New Mexico. "President Trump's decision will harm the people of the United States and the world, especially the poorest, most vulnerable communities. The impacts of climate change are already being experienced in sea level rise, glacial melts, intensified storms and more frequent droughts. I can only hope that the president will propose concrete ways to address global climate change and promote environmental stewardship."

During the announcement at the White House, President Trump said the climate accord is "an agreement that disadvantages the United States to the exclusive benefit of other countries, leaving American workers and taxpayers to absorb the cost in terms of lost jobs, lower wages, shuttered factories and vastly diminished economic production."

Trump added that he "will work to ensure that America remains the world's leader on environmental issues, but under a framework that is fair and where the burdens and responsibilities are equally shared among the many nations all around the world."

The United States now joins Syria and Nicaragua in not being part of the accord.

Pope Francis has consistently voiced support for action on climate change. During their meeting at the Vatican on May 24, the pope gave President Trump a copy of his papal encyclical, *Laudato Si*.





to those at the margins of society, encouraging vocations, the Church's role in public life—especially on issues such as immigration and the environment—are common themes.

To all of these speakers, Cardinal Tobin is attentive and responsive. To one young man who asked about how to encourage participation by youth, for instance, he recalled, "Pope Paul VI once said the world will listen more today to witnesses rather than teachers. So I think the best way for you to encourage others to experience what you find in the Church is to live in a way that prompts them to ask: 'Why does he live the way he does?' Then, be ready to invite them to learn about what is happening at your parish."

Cardinal Tobin has visited with deaneries in each of the four counties of the archdiocese, and encountered tens of thousands of Catholics in his care. He has spoken about the issues they feel are important in English, Spanish, Italian and Portuguese. Following a break for the summer, the cardinal will again begin visiting the 12 remaining deaneries—a task that is expected to last until early December.

The cardinal likes to focus on the future of the archdiocese in terms of the recently-celebrated Feast of Pentecost. "There were two miracles that took place on Pentecost," he said. "The first miracle was that of people hearing the Gospel message in their own languages. And the second was that those who heard the message all maintained their own languages and cultures, and accepted and spread the faith that way."

Such diversity has always been a large part of the Church throughout the world and throughout history. "In an archdiocese as diverse as ours is," he said, "that's exactly how we, the people of the archdiocese, will continue that miracle today."

Your reactions to these defining moments will mark your existence."

Buoniconti, the son of Miami Dolphins All-Pro and Hall of Fame linebacker Nick Buoniconti, suffered a paralyzing spinal cord injury at the age of 19 while playing college football for The Citadel in 1985. He went on to co-found The Miami Project with neurosurgeon Dr. Barth A. Green to promote the collaboration between scientific



Queen of Peace High School to close June 30

NORTH ARLINGTON—Despite a valiant effort by faculty, staff and stakeholders to raise funds and set a goal to provide enrollment growth possibilities for the 2016-17 school year, projected enrollment and financial shortfalls for the 2017-18 and future school years continue to present growing challenges to the long-term viability of Queen of Peace High School.

Following an exhaustive series of meetings and conversations over the past four months with parish and school leadership and representatives of the archdiocese about progress in achieving these goals, it was announced Queen of Peace High School will cease operations as of June 30.

In announcing the decision to students, parents, faculty, administration, board members and alumni, Father Michael Donovan, pastor of Queen of Peace Parish and head of the school, said: "Those of us who have been involved in Queen of Peace High School—members of the board, the staff and faculty, parents, alumni, other supporters and the archdiocese—have weathered challenges to find a way to keep this parish high school operating during this current year. However, even with the generosity of so many, and a slight increase in the number of students this year, we remain in a declining situation that cannot be continued without severely harming Queen of Peace Parish. Consequently, it is important for us to look toward the best interests of the students now with us for the remainder of their high school years."

In spring 2016, Queen of Peace administration, joined by a dedicated and growing group of alumni volunteers, undertook a significant fundraising initiative designed to provide a long-term source of tuition assistance and financial stability for the school. With the support of several key donors, who together pledged some \$950,000, these efforts yielded more than \$1 million and an expected enrollment of 226—enough to stave off closure at the end of the 2016 school year and provide for an opening in September 2016.

However, Queen of Peace High School faces a shortfall of more than \$1.2 million by the end of June 2017. This amount can be met only partially through external fundraising efforts this year. The parish and the archdiocese are not in a financial position to absorb further obligations of the school beyond this current year. In actuality, Queen of Peace High School will require contributions of more than \$1.5 million

annually for the foreseeable future—a figure that is twice what alumni leadership feels it can raise annually.

"We truly appreciate all of the generosity of the alumni and other supporters of Queen of Peace," said Fr.

Donovan. "But given that the school was facing a number of years of continuing deficits and challenges to gaining enrollment, we could not expect that alumni would provide the same robust support every year."

He further said that "without the steady and increasing flow of development support, we would not be in a position to guarantee that incoming freshmen in September 2017 would be able to graduate from Queen of Peace in four years. Without that guarantee, we would be doing a disservice to those children and their families, as well as to students already here at Queen of Peace." School administration and the archdiocesan schools office will work

with parents of Queen of Peace students to assist with the transition to other Catholic schools within the archdiocese. Current faculty members will be placed on a preferred eligibility list for positions at other archdiocesan schools.



Sheer Joy: Celebrating 25 years of priesthood

pope Francis begins his Apostolic Exhortation, *Evangelii Gaudium*, saying, "The joy of the Gospel fills the hearts and lives of all who encounter Jesus." The Holy Father goes on to demonstrate how this core truth enables us to be the missionary disciples the Lord calls all of us to be, despite the challenges, difficulties and set-backs we can so readily encounter in our lives.

In all honesty, when I think of these past 25 years of priesthood, the first thought my mind goes to is incredulity: How can 25 years have passed so quickly? In speaking with many of my classmates—22 of us were ordained at the Cathedral Basilica of the Sacred Heart on May 30, 1992—that is the universal response when we contemplate our silver jubilee. I cannot tell you how many times we've said to each other, "Can you believe it?"

Nonetheless, I can only characterize these past 25 years as a priest with one word: "sheer joy." Well, that's two words, but meant to convey the complete and utter joy that the priesthood has brought to my life and the men with whom I was ordained. While all life is fraught with challenges, when all is said and done, I look back and give thanks to Almighty God for the profound gift of being called to the priesthood and serving him and his people in this special way.

Formation in the seminary is very challenging. It asks those pre-

paring for the priesthood not only to learn the theology and the praxis of the priesthood but to look at oneself truly, not only as you are but as we want to be and the Lord calls us to be. What we see is not always the best. I've often said the most difficult years of my life were those in the seminary. But I've also said they were the best. And I walked through it with others, doing the same, and, in the end, found the joy that the Lord wants for all of us.

Serving as a priest has brought with it a variety of assignments: pastoral, formational and administrative. While I've experienced so much personally in each of these assignments, a single truth has always stood out: the joy of the priesthood is found in serving the people of God. Of course, fundamentally, the joy comes from the Lord, himself, whom we encounter, and doing his will. And we encounter him most clearly in service to his people, the Church. My service of the people of God has been both direct and indirect but, whether one or the other, it is the people whose lives we've touched, those of whom we are cognizant and even those of whom we are unaware, that brings the joy—a joy that comes from our own encounter with the Lord who asks us to help his people experience that same encounter. We rejoice with a smile!

I thank God for these 25 years and the joy of serving him and his people. I pray for 25 more ... and then some.

RENEW jubilarian a 'visionary and pioneer'

600 adults to join small Christian communities—weekly faith-sharing gatherings in parishioners' homes, a model that would become the centerpiece of RENEW.

In 1973, Father Tom became administrator of Saint Ann Parish in Newark. At his first Sunday Mass there, only one parishioner attended, but Father Tom persevered, and the community grew. By 1979, parishioners who had joined small groups successfully lobbied the city government on behalf of their community—succeeding, for example, in getting drug-infested, abandoned buildings demolished.

With the blessing of Archbishop Peter L. Gerety, Father Tom and Father (now Rev. Msgr.) Thomas Ivory, collaborated on what was to become the original RENEW process for small groups. The two priests envisioned a renewed Church—with laypersons deeply involved in parish, civic and global issues—and the parish as a community made up of many small communities. RENEW was so successful in the archdiocese that by 1980 inquiries came from dioceses across the country.

In 1981, 14 dioceses in Canada began RENEW. Interest spread to countries in Europe, Asia, Africa and Central America, and Father Tom personally visited many of the places where RENEW would have its impact.

Six years later, what had begun as an office of the archdiocese became a freestanding Catholic association headquartered in Plainfield with Father Tom as president and executive director. His work there was characterized by creative energy and bold ideas. Over four decades, this endeavor has ultimately resulted in 160 dioceses in the United States participating in a RENEW parish process and millions of Catholics using the many resources RENEW has provided, in multiple languages, ever since.

Many people have described Father Tom as a visionary and pioneer. Among them is Sister Terry Rickard, O.P., president and executive director of RENEW International, who said, "Father Tom has always been the heart and soul of RENEW International. He has approached his priesthood with a determination to make the world a better place. From his early days as a priest, he always felt it was important for a priest to be a part of his people."

Cardinal Theodore E. McCarrick, former archbishop of Newark, has affirmed that RENEW should be considered a gift from the Archdiocese of Newark to the global Church.

Since his retirement in 2009, Father Tom has continued to support and advise the RENEW staff as it continues to turn his dream into reality. RENEW International's newest program for parish evangelization, Be My Witness, is being implemented in select parishes across the archdiocese in collaboration with the Office for Evangelization.
