Holy Angels jubilarian receives a day in her honor

As a teenager at Bishop Kearney High School in Rochester, N.Y., Sister Mary Foley, S.S.N.D., knew she wanted to enter religious life.

"I had thought about becoming a sister for a few years, but felt it was the right thing for me between my junior and senior year of high school," she said. "I requested to enter our formation program during my senior year."

She said she was drawn to the School Sisters of Notre Dame because of the group's international connections.

"Many life events led to this decision: a strong belief in God and reflections on the fact that wealth and possessions do not make a person happy. There are more important things in life," she said.

Sister Mary, who is now celebrating 50 years as a religious sister, has traveled all over the world spreading the good news. She began her ministry as a physical education teacher and coach in Rochester and later taught girls in the West African country of Liberia.

When she returned to the United States, she served as an administrator and teacher in Roxbury, Mass. She was also a part-time counselor with Catholic Family Services in St. Louis, where her full-time ministry was the spiritual formation of women.

"The call to religious life means not marrying and having children, but I've gained relationships with many people who I would never have known if I had not become a School Sister of Notre Dame," Sister Mary explained. "I have

formed close friendships that have nourished me throughout the years. I have been able to live in another culture and visit many other countries, not as a tourist, but being with our sisters ministering with the people. I've lived in community with sisters from many cultures and have enjoyed learning a great deal from each of them."

Seeing other women heed the call to religious life is particularly rewarding for Sister Mary. "One of my most treasured memories was being in Guam when a young woman from a very small island in Micronesia took her first vows as a School Sister of Notre Dame. She had met one of our sisters at her high school and followed her home to learn more about Mother Theresa (Gerhardinger)," Sister Mary said, referring to the foundress of the religious order.

Asked if she would recommend religious life to young women, Sister Mary responded in the affirmative. "There is so much need in our world for both prayer and the ministry God calls us to. Being available to be with people in their need is very rewarding."

As a volunteer mental health worker for the American Red Cross, Sister Mary has assisted people in New Jersey and Texas. In September 2017, she traveled to Houston to help residents who were affected by Hurricane Harvey. Sister Mary is also part of the lead response team for the Traumatic Loss Coalition in Bergen County and is a disaster response crisis counselor for the state. In 2002, she joined the faculty at the Academy of the Holy Angels in Demarest where, for many years, she accompanied the school's therapy

dog, Luke, as he comforted people after traumatic events such as the Sandy Hook school shooting and the Boston Marathon bombing.

Part of her ministry at the school also involves work with Power Back, the school component of Partnership for Change that helps girls become advocates against peer dating abuse.

On May 9, Holy Angels honored Sister Mary with an afternoon prayer service followed by Mass and dinner. Sister Mary and several sisters from her congregation, including academy educators Sister Carole Tabano and Sister Kathleen Dunham, renewed their vows.

As a special surprise, Academy of the Holy Angels Principal Jean Mullooly announced that the State of New Jersey, County of Bergen, and Borough of Demarest had all declared May 9 Sister Mary Foley Day

in honor of the beloved educator's numerous contributions to people throughout the world.

During the prayer service, Sister Mary said, "This day is really not about me. It's about God, and it's about you, or maybe us. No one makes a commitment and keeps a commitment in a vacuum. You do it in relationship. It's about how you interact with me, how you interact with each other. It's that interaction that allows me to get up every day and say, 'OK, God, I'm ready for the day, what do you have in store?'"

Sister Mary also encouraged the audience to not miss the "extraordinary" in the ordinary. "Use your curiosity to find what you're supposed to do in this world to make the world better."

Cardinal Tobin blesses Port of New York and New Jersey

Cardinal Joseph W. Tobin, C.Ss.R., celebrated Mass June 8 aboard the Sandy Hook pilot vessel *New York* and blessed the Port of New York and New Jersey. The event was hosted by Stella Maris Chapel in collaboration with the Sandy Hook Pilots Association.

The 9 a.m. Mass was held on the vessel's upper deck as it cruised at a slow speed while leaving Port Newark. Father John Corbett of Stella Maris Chapel offered welcoming remarks to all attendees, which included parishioners of Stella Maris and individuals in the maritime industry.

Light refreshments were available after Mass as the vessel traveled into Upper New York Bay and offered sweeping views of the Verrazano-Narrows Bridge. It then traveled further north giving guests panoramic views of lower Manhattan and the Statue of Liberty.

Once the *New York* reached the Statue of Liberty, the FDNY fireboat *Three Forty Three* welcomed Cardinal Tobin and all guests by using its many water cannons to spray water high into the air.

The three-hour voyage concluded at noon, when the *New York* returned to Port Newark.

At meeting in Florida, U.S. bishops decry Sessions' asylum decision

FORT LAUDERDALE, Fla. (CNS)—The U.S. bishops are denouncing U.S. Attorney General Jeff Sessions' decision that asylum seekers fleeing domestic or gang violence cannot find protection in the United States.

"At its core, asylum is an instrument to preserve the right to life," the bishops' statement said. They urged the nation's policymakers and courts "to respect and enhance, not erode, the potential of our asylum system to preserve and protect the right to life."

Sessions' decision "elicits deep concern because it potentially strips asylum from many women who lack adequate protection," it said. "These vulnerable women will now face return to extreme dangers of domestic violence in their home country."

The statement from the bishops came on the first day of their June 13-14 spring assembly in Fort Lauderdale.

Just after opening prayers, Cardinal Daniel N. DiNardo of Galves-

ton-Houston, president of the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops, read the statement, and the bishops voiced their support.

Announced by Sessions at a June 11 news conference, the decision "negates decades of precedents that have provided protection to women fleeing domestic violence," it said. "Unless overturned, the decision will erode the capacity of asylum to save lives, particularly in cases that involve asylum seekers who are persecuted by private actors."

The attorney general reversed an immigration court's decision granting asylum to a Salvadoran woman who said she had been abused by her husband. He said U.S. asylum laws cannot be used to remedy "all misfortune," including violence someone suffers in another country or other reasons related to an individual's "social, economic, family or other personal circumstances."

In his remarks, Cardinal DiNardo also said he joined Bishop Joe S. Vasquez of Austin, Texas, chairman of the USCCB's Committee on Migration, "in condemning the continued use of family separation

at the U.S./Mexican border as an implementation of the administration's zero tolerance policy."

"Our government has the discretion in our laws to ensure that young children are not separated from their parents and exposed to irreparable harm and trauma," the cardinal said. "Families are the foundational ele-

ment of our society and they must be able to stay together.

"While protecting our borders is important, we can and must do better as a government, and as a society, to find other ways to ensure that safety. Separating babies from their mothers is not the answer and is immoral."

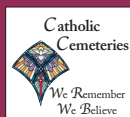

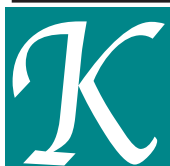

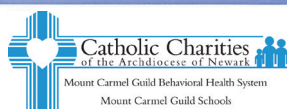

Archdiocesan schools 'extend learning beyond the classroom'

Catholic schools in the Archdiocese of Newark have a long history of providing students with academic programs that are rigorous and faith-centered. Our schools continually evaluate its academic programs to ensure students are meeting or exceeding academic standards in all subject areas. Results from annual standardized assessments show that student achievement is significantly above the national average. Since 2011, 23 of our schools have been recognized as National Blue Ribbon Schools of Excellence by the United States Department of Education. The success of students as they move on in their academic careers attests to the strong foundation provided by the Catholic schools of the archdiocese. While curriculum maps and course descriptions provide information about the learning that takes place in the classroom, it is the learning that extends beyond the classroom that I would like to highlight in this column.

In my work as the assistant superintendent for curriculum, instruction and assessment, I am continually impressed by the eagerness with which our teachers approach opportunities for their own ongoing

professional development and the many ways they seek to extend student learning beyond the classroom. Through the generosity of a benefactor, we have been able to offer the Gilder Lehrman Institute of American History's Teaching Literacy through History (TLTH) seminar series for the past six years. The TLTH program brings together teams of social studies and English language arts teachers for a series of full-day seminars. The seminars include a presentation by a noted historian on a specific topic in American history, followed by a workshop designed to help teachers develop strategies for using historical documents with students. As a result of this seminar program, several teachers have been given the opportunity to deepen

their knowledge of American history by participating in one of the many weeklong summer seminars conducted by the Gilder Lehrman Institute.

The professional development provided as part of the Archdiocesan STEM Fair program and high school engineering program has focused on supporting teachers in using the engineering design process with their students. Both of these programs have empowered teachers to utilize a problem-based approach in their classrooms, challenging students to design solutions to real-world problems. This approach not only strengthens students' content knowledge

through application, but it has the added benefit of fostering student creativity, critical thinking and empathy.

In addition to extending their learning through professional development opportunities, teachers seek to extend student learning through various extracurricular endeavors. Students from schools throughout the archdiocese have demonstrated their mathematical aptitude in state and national math contests, gained recognition in Robotics, Legos and Future Cities competitions, and de-

veloped their public speaking skills through participation in forensics competitions. Participation in these events requires the commitment of teachers who serve as moderators for afterschool study, practice and building sessions. Opportunities for involvement in the performing arts abound through school plays, choral and instrumental performances, ballroom dancing lessons and mystery theater. Essay and poetry contests give students the opportunity to express their thoughts and opinions through writing. Students are encouraged to give service to others through various community outreach

activities and programs. Artistic

ability is showcased through art exhibits and poster design contests, and athletic skills are honed through involvement in interscholastic and intramural sports.

The academic programs in the schools of the Archdiocese of Newark are truly enhanced by the many ways in which teachers and students extend their learning beyond the classroom.

Seton Hall graduates encouraged to be leaders

SOUTH ORANGE—Seton Hall University celebrated its 161st baccalaureate commencement on Monday, May 21 at the Prudential Center in Newark.

The university awarded bachelor's degrees to 1,320 students, along with master's and doctorate degrees to 1,084 graduate students.

Jovita Carranza, the 44th treasurer of the United States, delivered the commencement address. The daughter of Mexican immigrants, Carranza started her career at United Parcel Service in the 1970s as a part-time night shift box handler. More than 20 years later, she rose to the level of president of Latin American and Caribbean Operations at UPS and was the highest-ranking Latina in company history.

"Never miss an opportunity to make a difference," she told the graduates.

Appointed to her current position by President Donald Trump, Carranza's signature can now be found on U.S. paper money, warranting that "This Note is Legal Tender for All Debts, Public and Private." To commemorate the graduation ceremony at Seton Hall, each graduating student was given a \$1 bill signed, officially, by Carranza.

The treasurer, who received an honorary doctorate of humane letters

from the university, reminded the new graduates that their education came as a result of a number of sacrifices and that "to whom much is given, much is required." Carranza also challenged the students to "do more than just be an example to others. In all you think and all you do, you must now be a leader. Your goal, I will suggest, is not to create lots of followers. Your goal, obtained by inspiring others, is to create more leaders."

Seton Hall University Interim President Mary J. Meehan also encouraged the Class of 2018 to take their place as servant leaders.

"As you embark on successful lives and distinguished careers, I pray that you uphold the promise of your education. Pursue truth over personal gain. Value people more than possessions. Let your hearts be guided by compassion. Nurture those who follow you. Give without asking anything in return. And use the gifts Seton Hall has given you to champion people who have been excluded from the good fortune that many of us enjoy," she said.

Janina Andrea Alzate, whose parents emigrated from Colombia and Ecuador, delivered the valedictorian address. Alzate, from Elizabeth, graduated summa cum laude from the university's College of

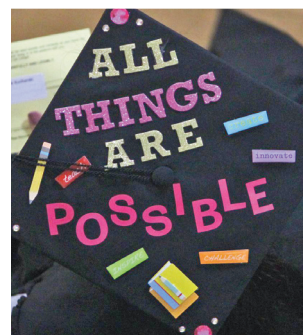

Saint Peter's University gave Morrison an honorary doctorate of humane letters.

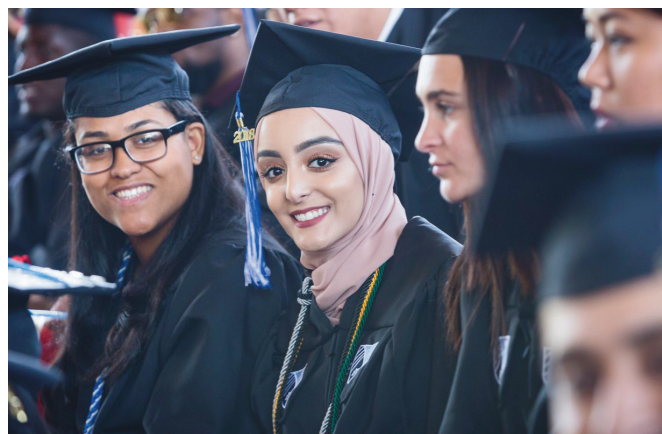
The university also bestowed an

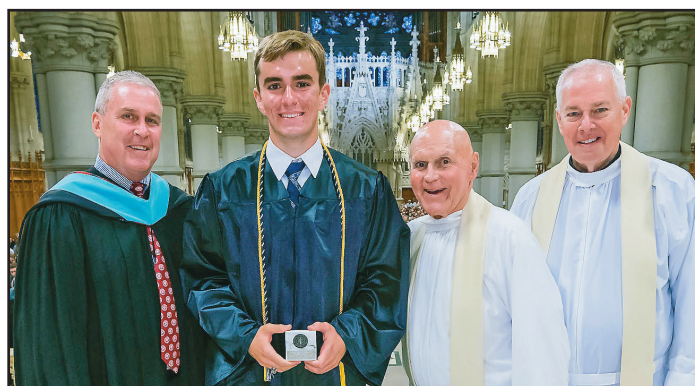

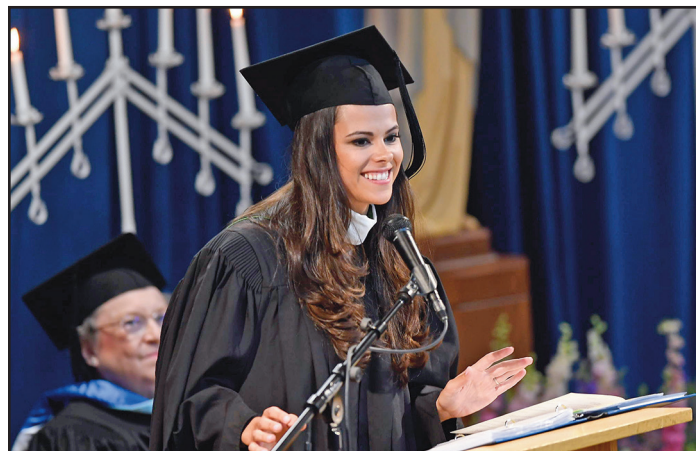

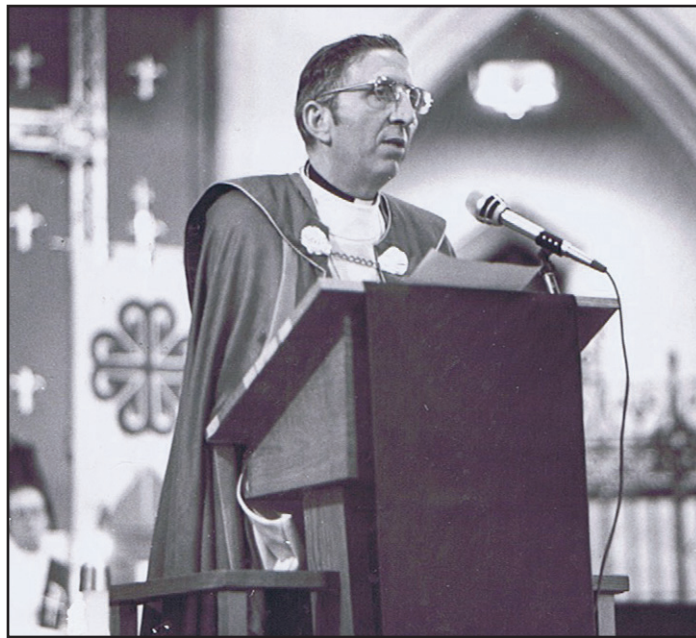
I really got to know him when, one year before entering the seminary, he asked me to assist him with the many confirmations he administered. Such was his schedule that there were usually five or six other masters of ceremonies assigned to help him.

Bishop Marconi loves administering the sacrament and he especially loves to be with the young people. As his master of ceremonies, I remember that his confirmation homilies, then, and to this day, always revolved around a movie that was playing in the theaters (he would even ask his emcees for their favorite suggestions). That alone

hit home because most, if not all, of the candidates had already seen the movie and of those who hadn't, their parents would make sure they would see it. I think Bishop Marconi's extended family—his nieces and nephews, great-nieces and great-nephews—helped him to relate to families especially well. The bishop's family is so important to him.

One of the things I admire most about Bishop Marconi is the ease with which he can shift the focus off of himself and onto someone else. Even today, when we talk on a birthday or a feast day, after the customary "How are you doing, bishop?" he quickly asks about me or my family or some other priests. That constant thinking of others comes from deep within his heart—the heart of a shepherd, a heart that is intimately conformed to the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus Christ.

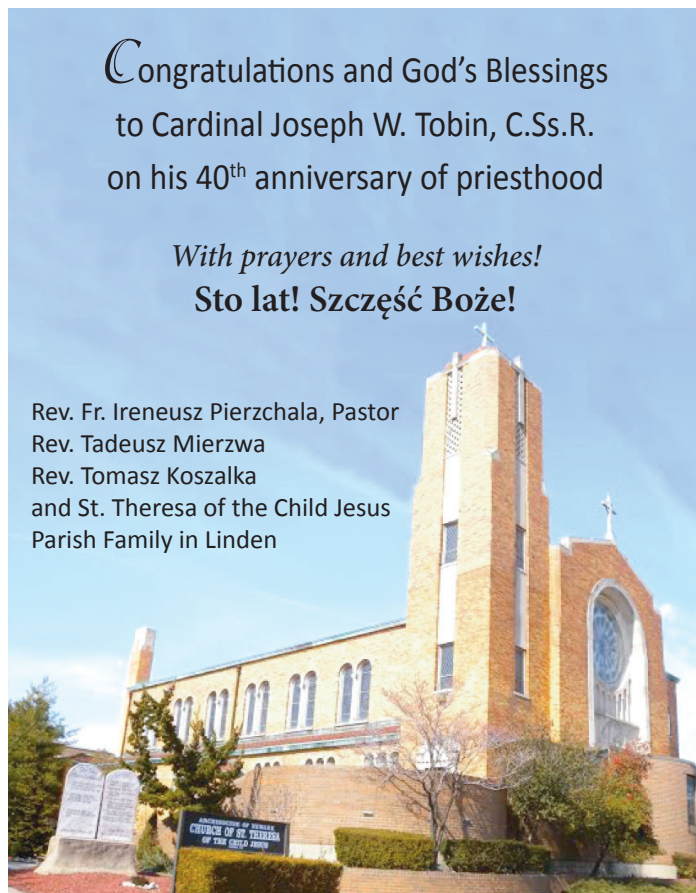

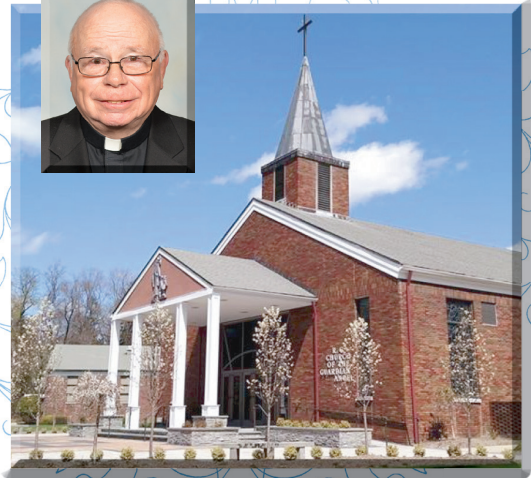

'Deeply profound' Msgr. Turro celebrates 70th jubilee

Not having been either a Divinity student or a Theology major, entering the major seminary was a bit intimidating. Enthusiasm notwithstanding, I was embarking on parts unknown. Classes were assigned with names like Biblical Criticism and Hermeneutics, Experiential Theology, Introduction to Theology and Introduction to Moral Theology with professors like then-Fathers Edward Ciuba and Richard Liddy, giants in their fields of expertise.

Another course was Synoptic Gospels. Huh? What's a Synoptic Gospel? I would soon find out from an understated, deeply profound and gentle professor named Father James Turro whose scholarly re-

search on the two Books of Samuel was published in one of our required textbooks, the 1,526-page anthology called the Jerome Biblical Commentary (JBC).

Father Turro was notorious for conducting a *schola brevis* ("brief" lecture). Anyone who has heard him preach is often in awe of the impact he makes with an economy of words. In class, he was less concerned with the amount of time we spent in session as he was with the important points he wanted to make. His lectures were never cluttered with useless detail and endless examples, but, rather, with clarity and accuracy that only geniuses can express.

Father Turro would be my professor for two more courses, and

these many years later, one of the texts he required for Wisdom Literature is on my desk together with my well-worn JBC as I prepare my Wise Ones Bible Study every month. As Christa McAuliffe said, "I touch the future, I teach." Having taught virtually every priest educated at Immaculate Conception Seminary, very few parishioners in the Archdiocese of Newark have not been affected by the wisdom of Rev. Msgr. James Turro. *I touch countless thousands, I teach priests.*

The priests on the faculty at the seminary rotated their weeks on duty. When Father Turro was the presider at Mass, we knew to pay close attention to his all-too-brief homily. I entered the seminary almost 45 years ago and I can still tell you about the time he referenced Katherine Hepburn or the legend of brotherly love that took place on

the spot where the city of Jerusalem was built.

And yet the brilliance of this Scripture scholar does not begin and end with the Bible. His seemingly endless knowledge was like tentacles. Before one of the electives Father Turro presented, I would write some seemingly erudite sentences on the chalkboard just for fun. Even when I wrote *l'amour est enfant de bohème qui n'a jamais jamais connu de loi*, he entered the classroom, turned and faced the board and looked at me and said, "That's from (the Georges Bizet opera) 'Carmen.'" He always inspired me to work harder and dig deeper.

Ad multos annos, Father Turro. Because I knew you, I have been changed for good.

Bishop Arias, *'a man for all seasons'*

Thirty-five years ago, an Augustinian priest was consecrated auxiliary bishop for our archdiocese by Archbishop Peter L. Gerety—his name was David Arias. He was ordained to the priesthood in 1952 in Barcelona, Spain, was later stationed in Mexico City and taught theology at the seminary in Kansas City, Mo. Bishop Arias' previous assignment before coming to Newark was to head the Hispanic Apostolate in the Archdiocese of New York. In Newark, he would have the same responsibility, replacing Bishop Jerome Pechillo as vicar for Hispanic Affairs.

One of the first things the new bishop did was to visit one or two Hispanic parishes every Sunday, celebrate Mass, meet with the people and get to know the diocesan and religious priests who were working in the Hispanic Apostolate. To meet future pastoral needs, Bishop Arias encouraged the study of the Spanish language in our diocesan seminary. In his early days as auxiliary bishop, he brought a number of priests from Latin America, particularly from Colombia, to the archdiocese to minister to our ever-growing Hispanic population.

In 1998, he established the Guadalupe Center for Hispanic Ministry at the previous Holy Family High School in Union City. It was staffed by Augustinian Recollect priests. Bishop Arias also promoted the Cursillo movement within the archdiocese and visited parishes to promote vocations to the priesthood. For many years, he led the recitation of the rosary on Saturdays outside a number of abortion clinics in Hudson County.

In 1994, Archbishop Theodore E. McCarrick gave Bishop Arias an additional responsibility—the pastorate of St. Joseph of the Palisades Church in West New York. It was, and I believe it still to be, the largest parish in the archdiocese both in territory and parish population. After 10 years in this pastorate, he was granted retirement by Pope John Paul II in May of 2004 having reached the mandatory retirement age of 75.

On a personal note, I have worked for Bishop Arias as one of his masters of ceremonies for confirmation for 30 years and was administrator of St. Joseph of the Palisades for five years under his leadership as pastor. I have always admired the bishop for his approachability and patience with all persons and nationalities, which he encounters at confirmations, parish meetings or, until recently, during his nightly walks after dinner. He is a man for all seasons and all peoples.

Bishop Arias you have done well! You have lived up to your motto "*Pascere populum suum*—To shepherd his people." On this 35th anniversary of your episcopal ordination, the words of the rite of priestly ordination, "May the Lord who has begun this good work in you bring it to fulfillment," are most appropriate and fitting!
