Thousands attend annual NJ Catholic Youth Rally

love this song," a young man, one of nearly 3,000 faithful gathered for the May 19 NJ Catholic Youth Rally, said as he jumped to his feet in the Six Flags Great Adventure arena in Jackson.

Turning around 360 degrees, he raised his arms to encourage those around him to stand up and join the praise band in singing "Our God."

But his encouragement wasn't needed, as youth from parishes in the five dioceses in the state, their families and youth ministry leaders were already standing, hands in the air and singing, "And if our God is for us, then who could ever stop us? And if our God is with us, then what could stand against?"

The annual NJ Catholic Youth Rally, organized by the Dioceses of Trenton, Camden, Metuchen and Paterson and the Archdiocese of Newark, brought together parish youth ministries and leaders, families and faith communities for a day of fun, faith, camaraderie, Mass and a concert by Christian artist Matt Maher.

Bishop David M. O'Connell, C.M., bishop of the Diocese of Trenton, was the main celebrant of the Mass that rounded out the annual event.


a Catholic? As a Christian?" Bishop O'Connell asked in his homily. "Does your faith make a difference in the way you show yourself to others, in the way you live as a young person?

"Here's the fact: We are all created by God just as we are, and God loves us just as we are, regardless of what others may think about us. Don't let anyone tell you differently," Bishop O'Connell continued. "At every moment of our lives, God is present, offering us His love. Our strengths, our talents are God's gifts. Our weaknesses are God's gifts, too, opportunities to grow. No one is perfect. Everyone is different. We grow. We change. We mature. But right now, we are who we are.

"Gifts can come in all kinds of packages," he said. "You are God's gifts, every one of you. What's on the outside of the package is only the means to cause you to open up and find the gift, to use the gift, to share the gift—your true self. ... Love is our true self. Show your true self to everyone you meet, with all your strengths and even with all your weaknesses. That is the message of our faith."

This year's event was part of the Diocese of Trenton's Year of Youth, decreed last June by Bishop O'Connell. The diocese partnered with Six Flags Great Adventure in bringing Maher to the event. In addition, 20 tickets were given away on the diocese's social media platforms for a meet-and-greet with Maher after the concert.

Faithful of all ages roamed the park in the hours before Mass, many wearing T-shirts that represented

the parish and town from which they hailed.

After Bishop O'Connell's homily, nearly a dozen concelebrating priests from the Diocese of Trenton and beyond went out into Great Adventure's Northern Star Arena to distribute the Holy Eucharist. They were joined by more than 40 youth, young adults and volunteers who served as readers, extraordinary ministers of Holy Communion, musicians or in other ministries in support of Mass.

Sacred Heart Parish to host Eucharistic procession

Sacred Heart Parish in Bloomfield will host a Eucharistic procession on the Feast of Corpus Christi on June 23. The event will begin with a novena to the Sacred Heart at 1:45 p.m. Faithful will then walk down Bloomfield Avenue to the Cathedral Basilica of the Sacred Heart in Newark at 2 p.m., leaving from 76 Broad Street in Bloomfield.

Father Cayetano Moncada-Laguado, pastor of St. Francis Xavier Parish in Newark, will allow pilgrims to seek rest and use the facilities at his parish, about halfway along the 3.3-mile route.

Arrival at the cathedral is anticipated around 4 p.m., at which point the group will observe solemn benediction.

The procession is one of the activities Sacred Heart Parish organized for June, the month of the Sacred Heart of Jesus. The music program, under the direction of Jennifer D. Behnke, hosted a concert of

choral meditations on the 12 Promises of the Sacred Heart on June 7.

Over the past few years, the parish has increased opportunities for devotion and spiritual rebuilding. Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament, along with adoration and benediction, have been added monthly on the first Sundays. There are songs, prayer, fellowship and the public

recitation of the novena to the Sacred Heart leading up to the patronal feast day June 28.

The parish is also in the process of finalizing the acquisition of a first-class relic of St. Margaret Mary Alacoque, the French Visitation nun and mystic who is credited with the modern devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus.

The Cathedral Basilica of the Sacred Heart in Newark hosted couples marking 5 and 25 years of marriage at an anniversary Mass June 2. Cardinal Joseph W. Tobin, C.Ss.R., celebrated the liturgy, which included the blessing of rings. The Mass was organized by the Office of Family Life Ministries. Following the liturgy, the couples received a commemorative pin from Cardinal Tobin and Deacon James Detura, director of Family Life. "Jesus was praying for you on our wedding day," Cardinal Tobin said in his homily. "When you were praying for each other, He was praying for you. And He has prayed for you ever since. That your love for each other would be, as He said, a simple revelation of the love that Christ has for us. A love that is accepting, a love that is forgiving, a love that is enduring, a love that is joyful, a love that stays." Being witness to a good, healthy marriage helps Catholics "understand who we are," the cardinal explained. "Because the love that Jesus has for us is something like that love that unites the husband and wife."

U.S. bishops take action to respond to church abuse crisis

BALTIMORE (CNS)—During the June 11-13 spring assembly of the U.S. bishops in Baltimore, it was clear the bishops had to respond to the sexual abuse crisis in the church — and on the last day of their gathering they approved a series of procedures to begin this process.

On June 13, they voted to implement the document "Vos Estis Lux Mundi" (You are the Light of the World), issued by Pope Francis in May to help the Catholic Church safeguard its members from abuse and hold its leaders accountable.

The bishops also approved the document "Acknowledging Our Episcopal Commitments" and promised to hold themselves accountable to the commitments of the charter, including a zero-tolerance policy for abuse. The document says any codes of conduct in their respective dioceses regarding



clergy apply to bishop as well.

They voted in favor of the item "Protocol Regarding Available Non-Penal Restrictions on Bishops" which outlines what canonical options are available to bishops when a retired bishop resigns or is removed "due to sexual misconduct with adults or grave negligence of

CNS photo office, or where subsequent to his resignation he was found to have so acted or failed to act."

Their first action was a vote

June 12 to authorize the implementation of a third-party system that would allow people to make confidential reports of abuse complaints against bishops through a toll-free telephone number and online. The system, which would be operated by an outside vendor contracted by the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops, should be in place no later than May 31, 2020.

During the first day of the assembly, several speakers discussed the challenge ahead and the need for the bishops to be both transparent and reliant upon lay leadership. The bishops also examined their plans to vote on procedures and policies in response to the abuse crisis, including some they had put aside during their fall general assembly in November at the Vatican's request.








Six men were ordained to the priesthood May 25 for service to the Archdiocese of Newark. 



On May 19, Cardinal Joseph W. Tobin, C.Ss.R., ordained 9 men to the transitional diaconate at the Cathedral Basilica of the Sacred Heart in Newark. These seminarians will serve as deacons in the archdiocese for the next year prior to being ordained as priests. Deacons can baptize, witness marriages, perform funeral and burial services outside of Mass, distribute Holy Communion and proclaim the Gospel and preach in the liturgical assembly. During the ordination Mass, the deacon candidates made three promises: those of celibacy, prayer and obedience. The newly ordained deacons included: Reverend Mr. Diego Arce Aricapa; Reverend Mr. Kamil Jacek Belling; Reverend Mr. John Paul Ginty; Reverend Mr. Drazen Hosi; Reverend Mr. Edmond Philip Ilg; Reverend Mr. Jae H. Joo; Reverend Mr. Preston Daniel Peredo Perez; Reverend Mr. Nicholas Charles Sertich; and Reverend Mr. Darren Matthew Santo Tomas. Reverend Mr. Charles Anthony Simmons was ordained as a permanent deacon.

New Jersey Independent Victims Compensation Program now open

NEWARK - Beginning June 15, The New Jersey Independent Victim Compensation Program began accepting claims related to the sexual abuse of minors by diocesan priests of the Roman Catholic dioceses of Newark, Paterson, Metuchen, Camden and Trenton.

The program is administered by Kenneth R. Feinberg and Camille S. Biros, two noted victims' compensation experts who have designed and administered similar compensation programs for the Catholic Dioceses in New York and Pennsylvania. They also have administered similar programs for Penn State sexual abuse claims, the 9/11 Victim Compensation Fund, and the BP Gulf of Mexico Oil Spill Fund.

The compensation program has been established to pay eligible victims who were sexually abused by clergy of New Jersey Catholic dioceses while minors. This program is endorsed by all five Roman Catholic bishops who are united in supporting abuse survivors by providing them with an efficient alternative to litigation, which is both speedy and transparent, to resolve their claims with a significantly lower level of proof and corroboration than required in a court of law.

Independent Victim Compensation Program administrators Feinberg and Biros will operate independently in evaluating and compensating individual claims. Church officials will have no authority to challenge the decisions or the amount of the awards reached by the

All compensation paid pursuant to the Independent Victim Compensation Program will come from Church funds. No public money will be used to pay eligible claims. Necessary funds are expected to be provided through loans, insurance, self-insurance funds and the sale of property.

The Archdiocese of Newark will not use contributions made by parishioners of the archdiocese to support parishes, schools and charitable works, nor will it use donations for a specific ministry or apostolate.

"This program is a sign of our commitment to the continued healing of victims who were sexually abused as a minor by a member of our archdiocesan clergy," said Cardinal Joseph W. Tobin, C.Ss.R. "It is a genuine expression of our remorse and our desire to make amends for past transgressions, and I sincerely hope it will meaningfully assist victims and bring them a measure of peace."

Important features of the compensation program include: the complete independence of the two administrators in determining eligibility and the amount of compensation; the program is voluntary and no individual claimant is required to participate; all payments authorized by the administrators will come from diocese funds; no public funds will be used to compensate victims; only if the individual victim accepts the

amount offered by the administrators will a signed release be required, in which the victim agrees not to engage in any further litigation relating to the claim; the program will give first priority to claimants who previously filed a complaint directly with diocesan officials about sexual abuse, prior to the establishment of the program; beginning June 17, these claimants who previously filed a complaint directly with diocesan officials were sent a program claim packet from the administrators.

Phase II of the compensation program, which opened June 15, will permit new claimants who did not previously file a complaint with the archdiocese to register in order to be considered for eligibility to participate in the program. Their claims will similarly be reviewed and subsequently processed by the two independent administrators.

Victims of clergy sexual abuse of a minor can begin the claims process and review the program protocol and Frequently Asked Questions by going to www.NJdiocesesIVCP.com. The Independent Victim Compensation Program will conclude on Dec. 31. All individual claims must be submitted by that date.





A sabbatical of priestly fellowship

(Is 25:6a)

o ascend the Gianicolo, enter the main gate and continue to Casa O'Toole to attend the Institute for Continuing Theological Education on the campus of the Pontifical North American College in Rome is a mountain indeed! It is an ascent for which I am eternally grateful. I discerned my sabbatical as I approached the 25th anniversary of my ordination. I needed to press what I call my "renew button." Having heard many great reviews from priests who attended the Institute for Continuing Theological Education, I decided to give it a shot for all three fall modules. I have no regrets.

Yes, the Lord did provide! He provided me with the opportunity to "renew" with 28 brother priests from around the world under the direction of Father Edward Linton,



O.S.B., and assistance of Carol Salfa. Kudos to them! Formation is a lifelong journey. The presenters for every topic and journey are to be

commended. In every aspect I recognized the four pillars of formation focused upon in seminary: human, intellectual, spiritual and pastoral. Above all, it was an opportunity to renew my personal relationship with the Lord. It was also good to renew with strangers, yet brother priests, the fraternal reality of priesthood.

In the past 25 years, given the declining number of vocations and increasing number of parish closings, the pastoral care of many parishes has dwindled to a single priest. We were four priests in my first assignment, and two in my second.

As a pastor now for 15 years, there were periods of my life when I was solo. It was during the alone times when I realized the importance of priestly fraternity. The In-

stitute for Continuing Theological Education affirmed my belief that priests need priests. Despite arriving from around the world and varying in race, culture, background and serving in various roles and parishes of differing socio-economic status, we were one. We were brothers! You could experience the friendship and fraternal bonds forming as time passed. It was a blessing as well to witness the Pontifical North American College seminarians mixing and mingling in the dining room, praying in chapel and playing sports on the field.

I gave to each brother departing their sabbatical a photocopy of a quote on fraternity. It is by the great St. Augustine: "What drew me closest to my brothers was the delight of chatting and laughing together; of showing our affection for one another by kindly services; of reading together from books that spoke of pleasant things; of joking together amicably; of disputing now

and then but without resentment, as one is wont to do with himself; of awakening by rare contest the pleasure of being one in mind; of instructing one another; of longing for the absent one, and tasting the joy of his return. We loved each other with all our hearts and these marks of our friendship that were shown to our faces, by our voices, in our eyes and in a thousand other ways were among us like ardent flames that fused our souls together, and of many made but one."

It was good to be on that holy mountain, but then comes the time to descend and enter back into reality. Like Peter, James and John on the Mount of the Transfiguration of our Lord, I wanted to stay, but "there is a time for everything under the heavens." God's graces continue to unfold. May God bless and sustain the Institute for Continuing Theological Education and the Pontifical North American College for generations to come!



Felician University welcomes state attorney general at commencement

LODI—Attorney General of New Jersey Gurbir Grewal was an honorary degree recipient and keynote speaker at Felician University's commencement ceremony on May 18. Degrees were conferred to 483 graduates.

Grewal was appointed attorney general by Governor Phil Murphy and assumed the office Jan. 16, 2018. Since then, he has focused on expanding affirmative litigation, strengthening police-community relations, reducing violent crime and fighting the opioid epidemic. Before becoming New Jersey Attorney General, Grewal served as Bergen County Prosecutor, the chief law enforcement officer of the most populous county in New Jersey and home to nearly 1 million residents living in 70 municipalities.

In his address to students, Grewal reflected on his own college graduation from Georgetown University's School of Foreign Service. The son of Indian immigrants, he was born in Jersey City and raised in Fairfield. He would later earn a law degree from the College of William and Mary Marshall-Wythe Law School.

"(My parents) had driven down from New Jersey to Washington, D.C., to see their only child graduate from college. And my parents' pride during that graduation was understandable. You see they had come to this country a few years before I was born. They brought little with them except their hope for a better life and a firm belief that this country could provide it," he explained. "They took an extraordinary leap of faith across oceans and across continents. And in so many ways, their faith was rewarded. They built a family and they found a community. They raised a son and guided him through college. They got to experience their own version of the American Dream."

As immigrants, Grewal's parents taught him to love his country without compromising his identity. "They taught me that you could love where you came from and you could love where you were going, that the two were not incompatible," he explained. "And they taught me it was possible to achieve success in America, looking the way I do and believing the way I do."





St. Peter's Prep graduates embark on a new journey

JERSEY CITY—It is a daily experiment in human chemistry. More than 900 young men, hailing from nearly 150 cities and towns throughout the region, swirl together through the doors at St. Peter's Preparatory School daily. They are the reagents, Prep's faculty and staff the catalysts, and nearly a century and a half of Prep tradition establish the experimental conditions. What will happen?

St. Peter's offered the 141st iteration of its results May 23, as the 226 members of the Class of 2019 entered the Yanitelli Center at St. Peter's University as seniors and exited as newly-minted alumni. They have shared many experiences, but the result is the same: they have formed a strong bond, and emerged as something quite different from what was there at the start.

Tom Comey, the chair of the school's science department and a lifelong student of a more literal kind of chemistry, served as the faculty speaker for this year's ceremony. He related his wonder at atoms'



natural tendency to seek stability and balance by working together—sometimes with others like themselves and sometimes with atoms that are quite different. As they form bonds and create new molecules, something altogether new takes shape. "These combinations and reactions are magnificent displays of what happens when substances come together," he said. "It is only together can they achieve a purpose greater than themselves. These interactions are absolutely necessary for

growth and change of these atoms. They continually seek changes and opportunities to form stable compounds. With each change, they move toward their goal, achieving stability."

Comey encouraged students to find people who will balance them and help them be their best selves. "Friends will challenge one another to be honest, even when it is difficult.

They help one another to believe in themselves even when we can't. Friends care for one another and make you care for yourself when you've taken on too much. They help us to own our strengths while simultaneously balancing our weaknesses," he said

Student speaker Thaddeus Goratowski found in his collection of 39 monthly passes from Glen Rock to Hoboken more than just a memento of his daily commute. Just as the train crew must persevere to overcome obstacles and delays, he explained, the Class of 2019 has pushed forward through its four-year journey through personal hardships, academic challenges and more.

"We've made it to one of the largest exchanges in all of life: the transition away from high school," Goratowski said. "Each track heads toward its own destination, to many different places across the country and the world."

After 115 years of providing undergraduate education for young women, the college began accepting male students in the fall semester of 2016. The graduate and undergraduate continuing education divisions were already coed.







Bishop McDonnell: 'A priest's priest'

ometimes in life you get to meet an extraordinary and exemplary individual. My chance came in the year 2001 when I was assigned as deacon to Holy Trinity Parish in Hackensack. That individual was the Most Rev. Charles McDonnell, pastor and retired brigadier general of the United States Army and former deputy chief of chaplains, among many other titles.

Although one might be intimidated and very anxious, knowing his background and accomplishments, I found myself in a very different situation. I found a loving and caring pastor—a real shepherd filled with love for the people of God, a priest for most following in the footsteps of the High Priest Jesus Christ, a true father in many ways. While very serious, he was always very pastoral. I remember oversleeping one weekend when I was to preach at his Mass. I forgot to set my alarm. "What happened?" the bishop asked. I explained, and he replied, "Well now you should preach at the rest of the Masses. And by the way, get a second alarm, you seem to need one," he said with a smile. Since that event, I have never missed a Mass. My time with him was like that of a father and a son. I am privileged to call him a friend, priest, bishop and spiritual father.

Bishop McDonnell is affection-

ately known by many of the Knights of Columbus members and officers as "Bishop Mac." Those who know him regard him to be one of the most charitable and caring individuals. He was named state chaplain for the Knights in 2004, serving the organization faithfully as a guide and counselor and being present for all of their events to encourage the Knights. If not for his health, the bishop would continue to be present for them. He continues to attend and lend support at many of the more significant events, including the Pride in Our Priest celebration each year in the Archdiocese of Newark.

During his tenure as Knights of Columbus chaplain, Bishop McDon-

nell sacrificed much of his own time to travel throughout the state and nationally for supreme conventions. It is always a pleasure to be around him as we recall fond memories, especially assisting him at confirmations as one of his masters of ceremonies, living together when I was a deacon and his time in retirement when I served as pastor of St. Mary Parish in Nutley.


I have witnessed his generosity so many times in so many ways—spiritually, pastorally, physically and financially—to so many individuals, too many to name. Never once did he have a negative thing to say about a single person. On the contrary, he always looked to lift people up. His corrections were ministerial and compassionate. If he ever raised his

'The source of Bishop Flesey's joy comes from his love of the Lord'

he first time I met the Most Rev. John Flesey was on Dec. 8, 2006, at St. Joseph Regional High School in Montvale. As "Mr. Job," I was principal of this archdiocesan high school, and we invited Bishop Flesey to preside at our Mass for the Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception and to install and bless our newly-formed consultative board. Who knew that after completing studies at Immaculate Conception Seminary in South Orange and upon my ordination to the priesthood in 2011 that my first assignment would be to serve as his parochial vicar at the parish where he was pastor, Most Blessed Sacrament in Franklin Lakes? I continued as his parochial vicar for the next seven years, and then Cardinal Tobin appointed me to succeed Bishop Flesey as pastor in July 2018. In these years, Bishop Flesey has been a mentor, guide, adviser and friend. He is also my own personal homiletics resource. All who have heard him preach know that his homilies are all deserving of publication.

When I reflect upon my experience of working for and living with Bishop Flesey, I would use these words to describe him: compassionate, kind, humble, gentle and patient. All of these descriptors come from St. Paul's Letter to the Colossians in which St. Paul reminds us of the influence the sacrament of baptism has in a person's life. Without a doubt, Bishop Flesey has lived out his baptismal call faithfully, and all of us who have come to know him over the years are recipients of all of these gifts that the Holy Spirit so generously bestowed upon him.

In addition to all of the adjectives I listed above to describe Bishop Flesey, I would venture to add one more: joyful. Joy is not a feeling but a prism through which one views all of life. The source of Bishop Flesey's joy comes from his love of the Lord, a life deeply centered on the Eucharist and prayer, and his devotion to Mary, Our Good Mother. It is not surprising then that Bishop Flesey chose "My Spirit Rejoices" as his episcopal motto on his coat of arms. These

words, taken from Mary's Song of Praise, the Magnificat, (Lk 1:46) are Bishop Flesey's "life theme."

As I think about it, I can only imagine that growing up in Jersey City in the 1940s and 1950s and coming from a family so solidly rooted in Catholic values must have been tremendous influences on the life of the young John Flesey.

"I have many memories starting with the day John was born. He was almost always amiable and happy as a young boy and that personality accompanied him through life," Bishop Flesey's sister Barbara Flesey Eberly said. "I have to say I never doubted he chose the right path for himself

and those he has affected positively along his journey. Our family was truly blessed."

Bishop Flesey's other sister Connie Flesey Coyle echoes these sentiments. "Even as a young boy he had a strong devotion to God and to the Church, so I was not surprised when he decided to become a priest," she said. "John possesses qualities of patience, understanding and compassion, which, mixed with a great sense of humor, have made him a wonderful comforter and counselor to those seeking his help. He is truly a man of God and of the people."

Bishop Flesey's love of learning and his calling to be "a man for

others" must have been influenced by his high school year's at St. Peter's Prep and his undergraduate studies at St. Peter's College (now University) in Jersey City. Bishop's high school classmate and friend for over 70 years Dr. Eugene Galvin recalled that the future bishop was a good student who was also on the football team. "John is a caring priest who has not forgotten his own humble origins and has the common touch. He connects easily with everyone from the very poor to the exalted," Galvin said. "He is also most comfortable in his sweatshirt and slippers at home. He is the real deal."

Upon ordination to the priest-hood in 1969, Bishop Flesey's first assignment was at St. Bernard of Clairvaux Parish in Plainfield. He would serve there for 14 years. The bishop speaks with great fondness about his experiences there as he learned about the ebb and flow, the joys and the challenges of parish life. Today, Bishop Flesey baptizes and presides at the weddings of the grandchildren of many of the parishioners from his first assignment.


While Bishop Flesey retired as pastor of Most Blessed Sacrament in 2018, he continues to be in residence. This is a blessing to the church and to me. His participation in the sacramental life of our parish, his wisdom in the confessional and in spiritual direction, those wonderful thought-provoking homilies and his great sense of humor all add to the dynamic of our parish. For this we are immensely grateful.

"Encountering Bishop Flesey you feel like you are greeted by a true friend who knows and understands you immediately. That's so rare," said Dr. Lauren Longo, a lifelong Most Blessed Sacrament parishioner and executive assistant to the bishop.

Over the years, John Flesey has had many titles: associate pastor, doctor of theology, spiritual director, monsignor, rector, dean, pastor, bishop. But the title that would influence them all, and the one that John Flesey never forgot, is that of being "father."

And because of that, Bishop Flesey, for us who have been touched over these 50 years of your priesthood by your fatherly compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness and patience—well, our spirits, too, rejoice!

She later served as an administrative assistant in the congregation's development office and on the board of trustees of Link Community School in Newark.

Bishop Joseph A. Galante

Mass of Christian Burial was Acelebrated June 1 at St. Agnes

Church, Our Lady of Hope Parish in Blackwood for Bishop Joseph A. Galante, bishop emeritus of the Diocese of Camden, 80, who died May 25.



Born in Philadelphia, Bishop Galante was ordained a priest on May 16, 1964. He attended Lateran University in Rome, where he received his doctorate in canon law in 1968, and the University of St. Thomas (Angelicum) in Rome, where he received his master's degree in spiritual theology in 1991.

He served in the Archdiocese of Philadelphia until he was named by Pope John Paul II in December 1986 to be undersecretary of the Congregation for Religious in Rome. He was a member of the Pontifical Council for Social Communications and chair of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops' Committee on Communications.

In October 1992, he was named auxiliary bishop of San Antonio, Texas. Eighteen months later, he was installed as Bishop of Beaumont, Texas. He became coadjutor bishop of Dallas in January 2000.

On April 30, 2004, Bishop Galante was installed as seventh bishop of the Diocese of Camden.

For health reasons, Bishop Galante retired on Jan. 8, 2013, as bishop emeritus of the diocese.

Sister Emma Patricia Murphy, 0.P.

A member of the Sisters of St. Dominic of Caldwell for 70 years, Sister Emma Patricia entered the Dominican Sisters Feb. 2, 1949, made first profession a year later and made final profession Sept. 8, 1956.

She earned her bachelor's degree in social studies and elementary education from Caldwell University and was certified as an elementary school teacher.

Sister Emma Patricia served as a teacher at Lacordaire Academy in Upper Montclair and Mount Saint Dominic Academy Grade School in Caldwell. She was also assigned to teach throughout the state, in Massachusetts and Alabama.

Following her 27 years as an educator, Sister Emma Patricia served as receptionist at Marian Manor in Caldwell and secretary at Mount Saint Dominic Academy and Lacordaire Academy. She served her sisters at St. Catherine Infirmary and was also director of scholastics for the Sisters of Saint Dominic.

New mausoleum preserves Catholic heritage through

stained glass

ausoleums have come a long way from the simple square layouts designed to provide as many families as possible with a final resting place for their loved ones. Catholic Cemeteries, a ministry of the Archdiocese of Newark, is paving the way for a heightened spiritual approach for the new architectural and spatial experience of visitors.

The new St. Gertrude Chapel Mausoleum in Colonia will feature an interior chapel, glass cremation niche chapels, stained glass alcoves, a belfry tower and stained glass dome. The main feature, a common thread in most of the Catholic Cemeteries new mausoleums, is the inclusion of a chapel at the center of the building, which allows visitors to attend a monthly Mass and connect deeper with their faith while visiting loved ones.

"This is what differentiates us from our neighbors — the non-sectarian cemeteries," said Joseph Verzi, Assistant Executive Director at Catholic Cemeteries. "It's designed to look like a church. So it acts like a church because it serves for Mass and the committal services for the members of our faith."

"And we've tried to keep a look similar with the bell towers, similar to our Cathedral Basilica of the Sacred Heart here in Newark," Verzi added. "We aim to tie back to the architecture of the cathedral when possible. It is tradition and heritage because most of the families that go there have been going there St. Gertrude Cemetery for almost 100 years."

The St. Gertrude campus will be comprised of four mausoleums with connecting themes — The Good Shepherd, The Welcoming Christ, The Crucifixion, and The Resurrection, the newest addition.

The new building exterior will feature walls decorated with artwork saved from several churches that have closed over the years. A dome comprised of stained glass rescued from Jersey City's St. Bridget Parish will be a focal point above the altar with its sun-golden hues and paint-

ings inspired by the Holy Spirit.

"That particular dome is 100 years old. How many people prayed under that dome?" Verzi wondered, adding that visitors of St. Gertrude Mausoleum will appreciate the dome from only 15 feet away compared to St. Bridget parishioners who viewed it from approximately 50 feet above the altar.

"We don't discard the stained glass when a church closes because the communion of saints never changes, Verzi added. "Those people aren't alive anymore, but they connect to the communion of saints by keeping it alive and putting it inside the center of this building where families will be able to enjoy it and be moved by it for generations. The building is built to last till the day of

the resurrection."

Eight stained glass creations also were saved and fully restored from St. Mark Parish in Rahway.

In addition to the mausoleums, a new office building is being designed to be more accessible.

As part of a \$1.8 million facelift, several improvements will be made throughout the property including a safer entrance on Bramhall Road and

broader roadways. Improvements will include 1,700 feet of new fencing and sidewalks, with a landscape plan for the front entrance.

"We're trying to create a place where people feel safe leaving their most precious possessions," Verzi added. "Their loved ones."


