

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Sept. 13 service at Cathedral Basilica Archdiocese lauds papal honors recipients

NEWARK-The Archdiocese of Newark, will celebrate the papal honors that Pope Benedict XVI bestowed on archdiocesan priests and men and women Religious with an evening prayer service Sunday, Sept. 13, 4 p.m. at the Cathedral Basilica of the Sacred Heart, 89 Ridge St. Archbishop John J. Myers will lead the celebration.

"I am happy for these men and women, first for their witness to the Gospel of Jesus Christ through their work and generosity, and second for their goodness and loyalty to the Church," Archbishop Myers said last June when the papal honors first were announced. "Please join me in extending congratulations, prayers and gratitude to these priests and Religious from a cross-section of the archdiocese for their dedicated service to the Church as acknowledged by our Holy Father."

Among those being recognized, Reverend Monsignor Ronald J. Rozniak, pastor, Our Lady of Mount Carmel Parish, Ridgewood, will be elevated to the rank of Protonotary Apostolic Supernumerary. He was installed as pastor of Our Lady of Mount Carmel on June 14, 1997.

san Vicar General, Missio Sui Juris, Turks and Caicos Islands, and Episcopal Vicar for Healthcare and Social Services, was born in Jersey City on Oct. 17, 1945 and ordained in Newark on June 29, 1971 by Archbishop Thomas A. Boland. Among his administrative responsibilities, he serves on the Archdiocese of Newark's Finance Council, Presbyteral Council and is the archdiocesan consultor.

The honorary title of "supernumerary" refers to all Protonotary Apostolic officials who are located "outside" of Rome, Rev. Msgr. Rozniak said. According to information on the Vatican's Web site, the Office of Magistri Caerimoniarum Apostolicarum (Masters of Apostolic Ceremonies) has a tradition that dates back to the 15th century. Regulations approved by pontiffs over the years created domestic prelates (today Prelate of Honor of His Holiness) and Apostolic Protonotary ad instar (Apostolic Protonotary Supernumerary).

Reforms introduced at the Second Vatican Council gave the Office for Papal Ceremonies a greater role in liturgical pastoral activities. Papal Masters of Ceremonies assist the pope and Cardinals during special events, solemn celebrations and religious services. Cited as Prelates of Honor are the Reverend

'Anthony is missing, but he's still with us'

he phone rang. Diane Starita held her breath and sank to the floor at her home in Westfield. The voice on the other end of the line was her husband, Anthony. He told her was trapped on the 106th floor of the North Tower of the World Trade Center, surrounded by smoke and flames, desperately trying to find a way out.

The brief conversation took place Tuesday, Sept. 11, 2001, following the deadly impact of American Airlines Flight 11 at 8:46 a.m.

"Somehow he found a working phone," she recalled. "He said: 'I'm still here,' meaning he was still in the building. He told me he loved me.' And then the line went dead.

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

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Bringing reason and morality to caustic healthcare debate

Our Archdiocese

E ver since Harry Truman introduced comprehensive healthcare for all Americans almost 65 years ago, we have struggled to attain this ideal. While there have been suc-



cesses, today's avalanche of ideological combat, misinformation, partisan positioning, public anger and confusion shows we have far to go to realize this dream.

For decades, the Catholic bishops of the United States have advocated consistently for comprehensive affordable healthcare for all, including the weakest and most vulnerable.

We bring to the debate a unique perspective. Our teaching insists healthcare is a right not dependent on where your parents work, where you live or where you were born. Our tradition insists the moral measure of healthcare reform is how it touches the weak and vulnerable, babies in their mother's womb, the very sick and old at the end of life, those without access and power.

The Catholic community provides healthcare to millions in our hospitals, clinics and nursing homes. We provide healthcare coverage for thousands of em-



ployees in our parishes, schools, charities and institutions. Our hospitals serve one out of every six patients nationally. We pick up the pieces of a failing healthcare system in our emergency rooms, shelters, schools and parishes. In many places, though, our resources and our ability to help are being overwhelmed.

People without health coverage are not abstractions for us; we see them every day, see how their lives and dignity are threatened. As this debate on healthcare reform continues, we offer the following four imperatives for fair and just healthcare reform:

- A truly universal health policy respecting the dignity of human life
- Access for all, especially the




poor and inclusion of legal immigrants

- Pursuing the common good and preserving freedom of conscience and variety of options
- Restraining costs and applying them equitably across the spectrum of payers with a view to the economic health of our country, both now and in the future.

Two criteria need special attention as Congress moves forward: respect for the dignity of life and access for all.

Respect for the dignity of life

No healthcare reform plan should compel anyone to pay for the destruction of human life, whether through govern-

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ment funding or mandatory coverage of abortion. Any such action would be morally wrong and politically unwise. We are convinced that any healthcare legislation that compels Americans to pay for or participate in abortion will not find sufficient votes to pass.

Congress traditionally has respected the right of healthcare providers to decline involvement in abortion or abortion referrals, without exception, and has respected moral and religious objections in other contexts as well.

The bishops are bringing a simple message to Congress: healthcare reform must continue to honor the American tradition of freedom of conscience. Any healthcare reform legislation should reflect longstanding and widely supported current policies on abortion funding, mandates and conscience protections; they represent sound morality, wise policy and political reality. Making the proposed healthcare reform legislation "abortion-neutral" in this sense will be essential if the "reform" has a chance to be widely accepted.

Access for all

All people need and should have access to comprehensive, quality and affordable healthcare. Many lower-income families simply lack resources to meet their healthcare expenses. For these families, significant premiums and cost-sharing charges are barriers to obtaining coverage or seeing a doctor. Therefore, Medicaid cost-sharing protections should be maintained and new coverage options should protect the lowest income enrollees from burdensome cost sharing. Congress must limit premiums or exempt families with limited means from monthly premiums, and limit co-payments and other costs that could discourage needed care. In order to move toward universal coverage, we urge Congress to maintain at least the proposed minimum national eligibility levels for Medicaid and the Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP) to ensure comprehensive coverage and to provide states with the resources to expand coverage.

Society has a responsibility to ensure that no one is left without the ability to see a doctor when he or she is sick or to obtain emergency care when his or her health is at risk. Therefore, Congress must ensure sufficient funding for safety-net clinics, hospitals and other providers serving those who will fall through the cracks of a reformed system.

Living in a state with increased numbers of immigrants, the Catholic bishops of New Jersey are renewing our appeal to provide equity for legal immigrants in access to healthcare. Immigrants pay the same taxes as citizens; their health needs cannot be ignored. Leaving them outside a reformed system is both unfair and unwise.

Healthcare is not just another issue for the Church or for a healthy society. It is a fundamental issue of human life and dignity. It is a critical component of the Catholic Church's ministry. Genuine healthcare reform that protects the life and dignity of all is a moral imperative and a vital national obligation.

Anthony M. Starita, 35, was one of 685 Cantor Fitzgerald Securities employees-and 12 Westfield residents-lost on that dreadful day. Anthony and Diane Starita had moved to Westfield from Staten Island, NY, in the late 1990s and became parishioners at Holy Trinity Parish, along with their children Kaila and Jason.

"It's a day for us to be together as a family," Diane Starita said during an emotional interview last month at Holy Trinity. "We've all gone on with our lives, but it's amazing how easily you're brought back to the memories of that day. My children and I have a good life, but there are times when it's hard for me to be 'in the moment.' He's missing, but he's still with us.'

"We've been blessed to share

Diane's burden," Rev. Msgr. Joseph P. Masiello, Holy Trinity pastor, said. "She's allowed us into her heart and her life. Anthony was a man who was dedicated to his family. Through our faith, we come to live with rather than fight against the tragedies of life, and hopefully ever more peacefully."

Holding back tears, Msgr. Masiello said the days following Sept. 11 were overwhelming. "The human side of me wanted to run away and hide," he confessed. "Everyone was afraid. The fear of the unknown was almost as devastating as the initial loss." He cited Deacon Thomas A. Pluta as being his "tower of strength" during this period of turmoil.

As he confronted his fears, Msgr. Masiello began to pray, reciting the words of Jesus found in the Gospel of Matthew: "Come to me, all you who are weary and find life burdensome, and I will refresh you. Take my

yoke upon your shoulders and learn from me, for I am gentle and humble of heart. Your souls will find rest, for my yoke is easy and my burden is light."

"I was humbled by the goodness of our people here at Holy Trinity," Msgr. Masiello said.

"The community took care of

us," Diane Starita said, expressing her gratitude. "That was the only way we survived. My brother once told me to 'learn to make friends with the demons.' I have no answers. I know some day I'll be reunited with Anthony."

Her most difficult task in the wake of Sept. 11 was to tell her

children that their father would not be coming home. Though it takes its toll, she welcomes the opportunity to tell her story as a tribute to her husband, as a solemn bearer of history.

"But then, every year, I wake up on Sept. 12 and feel relieved that I got through it again."

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

Inclusion raises faithful awareness

hen the Archdiocesan Office of Pastoral Ministry with Persons with Disabilities migrated from Catholic Charities to the Vicariate for Pastoral Life four years ago, it primarily concerned itself with some limited catechetical and sacramental preparation.

Since then, the ministry's scope has grown by leaps and bounds, as pastors, parishes, and many of the faithful have all reached out for assistance in effectively integrating those with disabilities of all kinds into the active worshipping family of the Church.

This is, of course, both the right and the responsibility of all the faithful. Everyone belongs, and everyone should be as welcoming of all others as they would be of any family member.

Without question, there are challenges for both the individual and the community. Especially in dealing with the ranges on the autism spectrum, motions and verbalizations can sometimes be distracting to the so-called "typical" person. Programs such as "Mass Buddies" strive to raise the familiarity and comfort level at Mass for the person with a disability while eventually raising the awareness of the community, too, as an agent of acceptance.

Inclusive Family Masses also provide a welcome or welcomeback atmosphere to newcomers or to those who have felt shunned by members of their local parish. The hope is to eventually reunite parishioners and parish communities.


Faith-based groups for moms now exist at Our Lady of the Blessed Sacrament Parish, Roseland, and Saint John the Evangelist, Bergenfield. These outreach groups are based on a model developed by Cherie Castellano and Sister Rie Crowley, S.S.J., of Our Lady of the Blessed Sacrament.

These monthly gatherings provide opportunities for release and refocus. I have been inspired by the heroic lives many mothers lead, and their desire to more fully engage their husbands together with them in their journey of faith. We are currently exploring the possibilities of a dad's focus group, which might best meet their own needs and interests.

New approaches for catechetical and sacramental preparation continue to be developed, and workshops can provide both general information as well as techniques tailored to the locale and the person serving or being served.

It was so wonderful during the summer to have been part of our parish moms' group's family picnic at Bergenfield's Memorial Park. Saint John the Evangelist Boy Scout Troop 139, which in-

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
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

Disobedient pupils test teacher vocations

Readings: Isa 50:4-9; Ps 116; Jas 2:14-18; Mk 8:27-35.

In a century and culture that prides itself in the development of communication technology, we still find ourselves complaining that others do not listen. "I might as well talk to the wall," shouts an exasperated mother. "Skipper (the deaf old family dog) listens better than you do!"

How many teenagers or spouses block their ears so that they ignore those closest to them? How many of us run from silence so that we won't risk hearing the voice of God or conscience?

The attitude of consciously listening to God's word is a prerequisite for true prayer and for growth into deeper union with God. For this reason the basic concession of faith and obedient love in the Jewish tradition begins with a call to attention.

"Listen, O Israel, the Lord our God is Lord alone" (Dt 6:4). The people's ears must be dug out by God (Ps 40:6) and their hearts circumcised (Dt 30:6) so that they will be capable of loving him with all their hearts and souls. From early times the liturgy called for a daily effort to respond to God's gifts. The text of Deuteronomy 6:4-9 became the nucleus of a prayer "when you lie down and when you rise" (6:7).

During the Babylonian Exile the people had ample opportunity to reflect on the loss of God's gifts of Land and Temple. Prophets in the tradition of Isaiah depicted the role of Israel's teachers as the servants of God. They needed to continue learning on a daily basis if their own instruction was to be suited to the people's true needs. "Morning by morning God wakens my ear to give heed as disciples should. The Lord God has opened my ears and I did not disobey or run away" (Is 50:4-5).

One of the reasons for the teacher to be "tuned in" to God's word constantly is the recalcitrance of those in his or her care. Children may not listen, adolescents may rebel and adults may persecute those guiding them. "I gave my back to the floggers, and my cheeks to those who pulled out the beard. I did not hide my face from insult and spittle" (Is 50:6).

Why should one put up with such insubordination? Any par-

ent, teacher or other leader who expects popularity and appreciation has not reflected on the pattern of the vocation that they accepted. The prophet offers a consoling assurance that God will never desert those dedicated to him. "The Lord God will help me!" (50:7 and 9).

The civilized way for adults to deal with "irreconcilable differences" is to bring the case to court. The prophet calls for such action. "Who will contend with me? Let us stand up together (before the judge). Indeed, the Lord God will help me! Who can get a verdict against me?" (50:8-9). An indomitable faith is essential for perseverance through the vicissitudes of one's vocation.

partly because of His deeds of healing. This Sunday's passage from the Gospel according to Mark shows how Jesus wanted to challenge His disciples as they matured in their cooperation with His Father's plan. They may have luxuriated in their intimacy with Jesus who was winning popular acclaim, but how would they react when He seemed to be a loser?

Simon Peter, already the acknowledged spokesman for the apostles, declared that Jesus is the Anointed (Christos in Greek) of God, the instrument through whom the Kingdom of God would be established. The common perception was that, as Son of David, the Messiah (Hebrew for "anointed") would be a victorious warrior-king. To offset such a military image, Jesus described the manner in which His resolute adherence to the Father's will would bring persecution and death.

The reference to Jesus' resurrection was ignored by Peter, who was certain that there should be an easier way. How could Peter be an effective servant of the Gospel if he failed to realize a fundamental truth? "For my thoughts are not your thoughts, neither are my ways your ways, says the Lord" (Is 55:8-9). The sharp rebuke of Jesus, calling Peter "satan" (adversary), is followed by an instruction indicating that all forms of discipleship must incorporate the mystery of the cross into the Christian life.

As we face disruptive response to our efforts in proclaiming the Gospel, we rest assured that the Lord God will

WEST ORANGE — What began as a solo endeavor to foster her personal spiritual growth has expanded well beyond that point to numerous faithful endeavors for Lisa G. Westheimer, volunteer artist-in-residence at Our Lady of Lourdes Parish.

Westheimer began volunteering her artistic talents at her parish last year after receiving a master's degree in Studio Art from Montclair State University. Art, she says, is "a reflection of the inner soul and spirit."

Her artistic involvement with the parish began eight years ago. Every Lent, as "an artist and faithful Catholic," Westheimer begins work on a project that lasts from Ash Wednesday until Good Friday. During that time she has made a variety of religious items including Stations of the Cross icons for the parish chapel located in the former school building that is the site of daily Mass.

Reflecting on the Stations of the Cross project in 2003, Westheimer explained that she focused on the meaning of each Station. "By the time I had finished, I felt like I had walked the Stations."

The groundwork for her faithbased artistic endeavors actually took place several years ago when Rev. Msgr. Edward G. Bradley, director of the archdiocesan Ministry to Retired Priests, gave Westheimer a bagful of broken religious items. Many of the items, came from Father Francis T. Gavin, who passed away in 2002, and Father John F. Doyle, who died the following year.

"I took these items not knowing what I would do with them at the time," Westheimer recalled. "They sat around in my studio for a few years. This year I went through the bag and came across a broken plaque. On the back was a handwritten certificate that was the ordination record of Fr. Gavin dated May 31, 1947."

The plaque proved to be her inspiration, she confessed. Describing herself as "sorrowful that the commemoration of a lifetime of service dating back to the 1940s wound up broken in a bag for so long," she decided to restore it and the other items in the bag. Doing so, she explained, "parallels the concept of death, transformation, resurrection and charity that we as Catholics reflect upon during the Lenten season."

A guiding force throughout Westheimer's unique spiritual journey has been her pastor, Rev. Msgr. Joseph A. Petrillo. Msgr. Petrillo, she pointed out, "often tells us we should share our time, talent and treasure," noting that the pastor is enthusiastic about her work.


Msgr. Petrillo convinced

Westheimer to expand her efforts, which eventually led to the creation of a parish restoration workshop. Members of the Our Lady of Lourdes workshop include George Bailey, Bud Fennell, Carol Ford, Clare Krakoviak, Marge Christiano and Jean Kubilus.

Earlier this year the workshop artisans met weekly during the Lent season. "We gathered supplies that we have at home and pooled them," Westheimer said. "During our meetings we got a sense of our individual talents and used them collectively to repair what Msgr. Bradley had given me. We also paint pictures and decorated them with objects, glitter and fabrics." Another ongoing project is restoration of religious items given to them by fellow parish-Continued on page 24

Intrepid prep group travels far to assist neighbors in Ecuador

JERSEY CITY—Ten students and two employees from Saint Peter's Prep volunteered for a twoweek program in June to assist children and the poorest of the poor in Quito, Ecuador.

The Saint Peter's Prep group served at the Working Boys Center (WBC), which was started in 1964 by Father John Halligan, S.J., to serve the young boys who earned a few coins a day shining shoes in the streets of Quito.

Recognizing that they were missing out on an education, and that their basic health and hygiene needs were uncared for, "Padre Juan" (as Fr. Halligan is known) created a school that adapted to the boys' schedules. In addition to basic skills classes, the center enlisted doctors and dentists for the students.

"I was surprised by the magnitude of the center," wrote Saint Peter's Prep senior James Kuklinski on the trip's blog, which was updated daily.

The center, which serves some 2,000 people a year, has a full educational program for children from pre-school to high school, of-







There will be seven workshop tracks: Primary Catechists (for grades Pre-K to 3); Elementary Catechists (for grades 4 to 6); Ado-

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



the Virtual Learning Community for Faith Formation; The Spirituality of the Catechist; I Can't Sing! An Easy Solution to Incorporating Music into Classroom Prayer; Thirty-Five Years of Inspiration-The Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults; The Biblical Teaching on Social Justice; Ecumenical, Interreligious, Interfaith-Knowing Your Neighbors; and Lost Generation-Reaching Adult Catholics Disconnected from the Church.

Keynote speaker Fr. Boadt, a scriptural scholar and author, is a Paulist Father and the president and publisher of Paulist Press, Mahwah. Since 1997 Fr. Boadt has served as professor emeritus of Sacred Scripture at the Washington Theological Union, Washington, D.C. He has taught at Fordham University and Saint John's University, both in New York, and is the author of "Reading the Old Testament: An Introduction."

Born and raised in Los Angeles, Fr. Boadt was ordained a priest in 1969. His academic degrees include a Master of Arts in Religious Studies from Saint Paul's College, Washington, D.C.; a licentiate in Sacred Theology and Master of Arts in Semitic Languages from the Catholic University of America; and a licentiate and doctorate in Sacred Scripture from the Pontifical Biblical Institute in Rome. He is the author of several books, including "Ezekiel's Oracles Against Egypt" (1980), a study of the poetic techniques of Ancient Near Eastern prophecy.

Spanish-language keynote speaker Fr. Ciordia was ordained as a priest on April 9, 1961 in Rome. He currently serves as the parochial vicar at Saint Augustine Parish, Union City. In addition, he has been the professor of Sacred Scripture at Centro Guadalupe, also in Union City, since 1999.

Fr. Ciordia earned a degree in Theology from the Gregorian University, Rome, in 1962, and a degree in Biblical Sciences from the Biblicum in Rome in 1965. He served as the professor of Sacred Scripture at the Center of Theology for the Augustinian Recollects from 1965 through 2005, except during the years 1990-94, when he was the pastor of Saint Monica Parish, Zaragoza, Spain.

Along with the keynote presentations, the Catechist Convocation will present workshops from a spectrum of speakers. The following is a partial list of speakers, presented in alphabetical order.

Martin J. Arsenault is the director of the Office of Catechesis for the Diocese of Trenton. He has over 30 years experience in parishes and Catholic high schools as well as an adjunct instructor in a Catholic college. He has a master's degree in Theology and serves on national committees.

Sister Adrienne Bradley, S.S.J., a Sister of Saint Joseph of Chestnut Hill, Philadelphia, is a presenter for theological, doctrinal and spiritual talks. Currently she is the director of religious education and adult spiritual formation leader at Saint Anastasia Parish, Teaneck.

Diane Carr is an adjunct professor at Immaculate Conception Seminary School of Theology, at Seton Hall University, South Orange. Carr is the co-founder and co-director of the Center for Prayerfully Speaking at the Seminary's Institute for Christian Spirituality. She holds a master's degree in Theology from Immaculate Conception Seminary.

Father Thomas A. Dente is



the director of the Office of Divine Worship for the Archdiocese of Newark. He holds a Masters of Divinity degree from Seton Hall University and a master's degree in Theology (liturgical studies) from Notre Dame University.

Catherine (Kay) Furlani is the archdiocesan director of the Office of Human Concerns. She is an activist with Bread for the World and served on its board of directors for six years.

Father John D. Gabriel is the archdiocesan vocations director and leads the Emmaus House of Discernment, Newark. She is the recipient of the National Association of Parish Catechetical Directors' 2005-06 Religious Education Excellence Award for the Mid-Atlantic Region.

Deacon Thomas M. Smith is the director of Archdiocese of Newark's Pastoral Ministry with the Deaf. He began learning sign language during his graduate studies in Communication Disorders and is an advocate for the spiritual, civil and human rights of the deaf.

Eugene V. Tozzi, Ph.D., is the associate director for adult and family catechesis at the Catechetical Office of the Archdiocese of Newark. He has 28 years experience as a parish director of religious education and has taught as an adjunct professor at Fordham University and at Immaculate Conception Seminary School of Theology.

Definitions of key terms

- Catechesis: Derived from the Greek word "katechein," which means "to teach." It is the process of teaching the Catholic faith; to "catechize."
- Catechetics: The field of religious education in which the Catholic Church's doctrinal and moral principles of faith are taught.
- Catechist: A teacher of catechetics, also known as a religious educator or CCD teacher.
- Cathedral: From the Greek word "kathedra," which means "chair or throne." The officially recognized church in a given diocese or area where the bishop "sits" or presides, symbolizing the governing authority of that bishop. In the Archdiocese of Newark, this "seat of authority" is the Cathedral Basilica of the Sacred Heart, located at 89 Ridge St.
- CCD: Confraternity of Christian Doctrine. The abbreviation typically is used to refer to Catholic, parish-based religious education.
- DRE: Director of Religious Education

PCL: Parish Catechetical Leader (Source: Saint Mary's Press Glossary of Theological Terms, by John T. Ford, C.S.C.; and The Catholic News Service Stylebook on Religion.)

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

It was during one of their gettogethers that members of the restoration workshop came up with the idea of passing along the results of their labor to men about to be ordained to the priesthood. The first presentations took place April 21 at the Archdiocesan

Center in Newark, shortly before 13 new priests—a number that led the nation-were ordained on May 23 at the Cathedral Basilica of the Sacred Heart by Archbishop John J. Myers (see The Catholic Advocate, May 20).

The restoration group did so, Westheimer said, with the feeling that "it would be a wonderful way to celebrate the many years of selfless and committed service of the retired priests while, at the same time, expressing our utmost

gratitude to the men who are about to embark on a journey of lifetime service."

Appreciative of the good work done by Westheimer and the restoration workshop members, Msgr. Petrillo praised the group's collective efforts and spirit. Referring specifically to the Stations of the Cross project, he described it as "a sign of the presence of God and a sign of the vitality of God. It would not have become a reality if Lisa had not suggested it."

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
