

Close call—student departs from Haiti before deadly quake

AREA—It was only a matter of minutes.

At around 4:53 in the afternoon on Jan. 12, Barbara Pacuad, a student at the College of Saint Elizabeth (CSE) in Morristown, was 30,000 feet in the air over Haiti's Toussaint Louverture International Airport after visiting family members for winter break with her sister.

Meanwhile, on the ground, lasting just 35 seconds, a magnitude-7 earthquake struck the island nation, devastating Pacuad's home country, claiming hundreds of thousands of lives and creating billions of dollars in damage. It took about an hour for the CSE student—en route to the United States—to realize the chaos she narrowly escaped.

"The airplane had personal televisions and the man sitting next to my sister was watching CNN. Across the screen, there was the title "Breaking News" and that is when I first learned about the earthquake," Pacuad explained.

The panic that shook Pacuad was overwhelming as she wondered if her friends and family members were alive. "My first reaction was to think of my grandparents. They live by themselves and I wondered who would come for them. I had friends that attended the University of Haiti in Port-au-Prince and they would be taking their placement exams. Would they be safe?"

Unfortunately, most of Pacaud's friends perished due to their close proximity to the epicenter of the earthquake. Immediately after her flight landed in the United States, she was able to contact her family. Luckily, although there was severe property damage, her family was safe outside of the capital in the town of Thomassin.

A native of West Orange, Pacaud is in her junior year studying biology at CSE. She immigrated to the United States seven years ago with her parents. The Pacaud's are parishioners at Our Lady Help of Christians, East Orange. Her uncle, a priest in Haiti, stays at the East Orange parish when he visits.

Pacaud is aware that she is fortunate to hear from family members. "Some of my friends at school still cannot contact their friends and family in Haiti. They are hoping their loved ones are still alive in the countryside," she said.

From Jan. 20 to Jan. 22, the campus community at CSE collected donations for relief efforts in Haiti that will be forwarded to Catholic Relief Services and the Sisters of Charity.

Archbishop picks Sister Joanne to serve Religious communities

NEWARK—Archbishop John J. Myers has appointed Sister Joanne Bednar, S.C.C., as the new archdiocesan Delegate for Religious, effective June 1.

Sister Joanne will serve as the liaison between Archbishop Myers and the communities of Religious men and women and those belonging to Secular Institutes within the Church of Newark. She succeeds Sister Margaret Thomas McGovern, O.P., of the Dominican Sisters of Caldwell who served some seven years prior to resigning for health reasons.

"Sister Joanne brings to the important work of being my delegate to the great Religious of this archdiocese both strong leadership and collaborative qualities and the unique charism of the Sisters of Christian Charity—a group of dedicated and faith-filled women who have embraced the mission of furthering the educational opportunities for women Religious so that they may serve the Lord in missions and schools throughout the world," Archbishop Myers stated, commenting on the appoint-

ment. "Her knowledge of the needs and challenges of Religious communities in the 21st century will be most helpful here in the archdiocese."

A member of the North American Eastern Province of the Sisters of Christian Charity, Mendham, Sister Joanne is development coordinator at Susquehanna Health, Williamsport, PA. At Susquehanna Health, she previously served as president of Providence Health System Foundation, vice president of Mission Effectiveness, and vice president of general services. She also has worked as patient accounts manager, business office manager, and accountant at Holy Spirit Hospital, Camp Hill, PA.

Sister Joanne previously was director of sponsorship for the Sisters of Christian Charity and served six years on her community's leadership team. She has taught high school mathematics at various Catholic high schools in Pennsylvania.

A Boonton native, Sister Joanne is a graduate of Morris Catholic High School, Denville; Assumption College for Sisters, Mendham; Marillac College, St.

An outward sign reflects an inner essence of faith

n life we sometimes take things for granted. There are small things that we say and do just as a matter of course. Yet they make a statement to those around us. I have been thinking about the Sign of the Cross. For many Catholics it is a reflex action, yet it is a symbol so relevant to our profession of faith that in some countries that simple action can put a Roman Catholic in danger.

When we say "In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit," it is a sign of our consecration to the Trinity. In the East a name is not just an appellation, a tag put on someone. It is a

sign of that person's inner identity.

Jewish people do not say the word "God." Instead they say "shem," which denotes "name" and is used in place of "God." You may hear a devout Jewish person say "baruk ha shem"—"Blessed be the name"—in conversation when he or she wishes to praise the Lord. The angel said to Joseph, You will call Him Jesus (Savior) for He will save His people from their sins." (Matt 2:21) Later Jesus said to Peter, "You are Rock (Cephas). On this rock I shall build my Church." The name signified his function and role.

Years ago, when we were brought to church to be baptized,

some of the first words that the priests uttered were: "Receive the mark of the cross on your forehead and within your heart" as he traced the sign of the cross on our forehead and on our baby breast. The image of the cross signals that we will be saved in the blood of Our Lord Jesus Christ. Trinity and sacrifice are an inherent part of our Catholic character even from our birth.


After that, throughout the remainder of our lives, the Sign of the Cross and our consecration to God are parts of our religious world. Through the course of the years that sacred sign marks us for who we are and what we believe. Countless thousands of times we will make the Sign of the Cross at liturgies, before and after our prayers, and when we gather at wakes and funerals.

How many times, as I have

rolled down the avenue in a hearse toward a cemetery, have I seen men and women stop along the street and make the Sign of the Cross as we pass by. Before the building where I now live there is a very large crucifix. All day long, people stop, make the Sign of the Cross and say a prayer. Even some athletes on the field of play demonstrate their faith by blessing themselves

A chaplain in a hospital can attest to the fact that whenever terrible things occur—fires, shootings, accidents—Catholics instinctively make the sign of the cross. It is a habit, a reflex action.

The Sign of the Cross is the trademark, the sign of a Catholic. It is a part of our very being. Often, what Catholic people do not realize is that their devotion is more than just a habit. It is a message to the world about Our Lord Jesus

Christ. Most Catholics are unaware of their role, but almost unknowingly they are witnesses to those around them.

At the end of our lives, if we are so fortunate, a priest will be there to sign us as one did when we were baptized. We will receive the anointing of the sick that will consecrate us to our Creator and remove our sins.

My dear Catholics, you will never know what a blessing you are to me and to others by simply living a Christian life. At times faith can grow weak. The light can grow dim. Yet, hundreds of times in my own personal life, Catholics whom I do not even know have been an inspiration to me, just by using that sacred sign. Surely one day you will belong to the whiterobed army of saints in heaven. You will have been signed, sealed and delivered.



Archdiocese chooses Tom Conboy to direct Young Adult Ministries

NEWARK—Thomas Conboy, a member of Saint Leo Parish in his hometown of Elmwood Park, is the new director of the Office of Youth and Young Adult Ministries of the Archdiocese of Newark.

In his new post, Conboy, who is an Elmwood Park councilman, will be responsible for promoting, in conjunction with the pastoral moderator and staff, the pastoral plan for youth ministry in the archdiocese in accordance with the guidelines of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops. He will also direct day-to-day activities and ministry programs at the Kearny center.

Conboy brings both extensive administrative and youth ministry experience to his new position. In previous assignments with both Gareb Shamus Enterprises , Wizard Entertainment and Marvel Entertainment Group, Conboy was responsible for planning and execution of sales programs of publications in the fan/toy and comic books fields and ancillary products, management of a major distribution facility for company products, and daily training and performance of staff. He also has served for many years as director of sports at Saint Leo Parish, director of Bergen County Sports within the archdiocese's CYO program, and founder and director of the Group 4 Parochial School Basketball League in Bergen County.

Summit reviews Irish abuse scandal

VATICAN CITY (CNS)—Pope Benedict XVI said priestly sexual abuse was a "heinous crime" and a grave sin, and he urged Irish bishops to act courageously to repair their failures to deal properly with such cases. At the end of a two-day Vatican summit on the sex abuse scandal in Ireland, the Vatican said in a statement Feb. 16 that "errors of judgment and omissions" were at the heart of the crisis. It said Church leaders recognized the sense of "pain and anger" that those errors have provoked among many Irish Catholics. "All those present recognized that this grave crisis has led to a breakdown in trust in the Church's leadership," the statement said. "While realizing that the current painful situation will not be resolved quickly, he challenged the bishops to address the problems of the past with determination and resolve, and to face the present crisis with honesty and courage." The Vatican said the pope expressed hope that the Vatican summit would help the bishops unify and 'speak with one voice' as they identify concrete steps to bring healing to those who have been abused and restore the Church's moral credibility. Cardinal Sean Brady, president of the Irish bishops' conference, cited "a failure of leadership" on the part of the Irish hierarchy.





Pontiff addresses Rome seminarians

ROME (CNS)—Christianity is not a set of moral rules, but a path to a relationship with God, who is love, Pope Benedict XVI told 190 seminarians studying at seminaries run by the Diocese of Rome. Christians are not so much called to obedience as to accepting God's love in Jesus and acting in a way that demonstrates how God's love has transformed them, the pope said Feb. 12 during his evening visit to Rome's major seminary. Pope Benedict led the students from five seminaries in "lectio divina," a prayerful reading of a Gospel passage. When Jesus told His disciples that they were not His servants, but His friends, the pope said, He was highlighting the fact that they were not called to a blind obedience of rules.

Time for reflection remains after ashes fade away

hile merchants have been promoting Valentine's Day since the day after Christmas, the Church has been more subtly preparing us through the readings of the Sundays in Ordinary Time for our annual observance of Lent. Through a period of more concentrated prayer, personal sacrifice, and considered almsgiving, we are called to reflect on our lives and to conform them more fully to the example and teachings of Jesus.

Most know Lent began on Ash Wednesday (Feb. 17). Although not a holy day of obligation, this feast attracts thousands of Catholics to parish churches to receive the cross of ashes on their foreheads.

At Saint John's in Bergenfield, we added two masses to the three we usually have, and included an additional Service of the Word in church (and others at two seniors' facilities in our parish), which served standing-room-only crowds from morning 'til night.


Priests can recount stories of people who may approach with a tissue or an envelope to bring ashes to a homebound relative. We try to explain that ashes are not mandatory and should only be given in the

context of a liturgy. Others show up late, and end up on the Communion line, only to be disappointed when they reach the front. I remember once holding the consecrated host and saying "The Body of Christ" to someone on the end of the Communion line, only to hear the response: "Oh, I don't want that; I came for the ashes."

Happily most Catholics have their eucharistic priorities in order. Even their penitential awareness improves during Lent. People tend to maintain a greater sensitivity of the implications of their words and deeds during these 40 days, perhaps helped by the specially chosen Scripture readings at Mass, Lenten faith-sharing groups like "Why Catholic?" and "Disciples in Mission," (see *The Catholic Advocate*, Jan. 13), public Stations of the Cross, the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA), communal penance services and practical programs like Operation Rice Bowl.



To date, the college has raised close to \$5,200. "Hope for Haiti" wristbands are also being sold to students, faculty and staff.

Pacaud plans to return to her native country in March, when commercial flights have resumed. She encourages everyone to continue to donate to Haiti. "Since Haiti has already suffered poverty and political corruption before the

earthquake, now more than ever we need the support."

The archdiocese joined the relief effort and has raised \$1.2 million to help aid the troubled nation (see The Catholic Advocate, Feb. 10). On March 6, at 11 a.m., Archbishop John J. Myers will celebrate a Mass for the people of Haiti at the Cathedral Basilica of the Sacred Heart. Rev. Msgr. Beaubrun Ardouin, the pastor of Saint Leo Parish, Irvington, who also serves as head of the archdiocesan Haitian Apostolate, will be the homilist.

"The generosity of the people is unheard of. Everyone is willing to give and their hearts are open," Msgr. Ardouin said. His own parish in Irvington has raised \$8,600 for Haitian relief. The parish of 650 families is comprised of Latino, Haitian and English-speaking parishioners.

'It is a beautiful thing to give," Msgr. Ardouin continued. "We are in a selfish world and through this disaster there is an opportunity to reach out to my neighbor. People opened their hearts and when generosity happens, there is a place for God.'

Msgr. Ardouin, who came to the United States in the 1980's, has family members still living in Haiti. His brother-in-law went to visit the country just one day before the earthquake struck and luckily survived. An aunt, who had part of her home destroyed, is still alive. However, the priest knows loved ones and friends of his parishioners who perished. "Everyone knows somebody who died," he lamented.

Through all the suffering and destruction, Msgr. Ardouin believes there is hope. "Without Good Friday, there would be no Easter Sunday. God brings good out of evil and suffering. I believe there will be a deep spiritual renewal in Haiti," he explained.

At Christ the King Preparatory School in Newark, students are doing their part to raise money for relief efforts. A "poetry slam" fund-raiser is planned for March 26 and a talent show will be organized in May. At the school, there are 30 students with families in Haiti (see The Catholic Advocate, Jan. 27).

Three of the families have relatives who died in the earthquake. Some students have injured family members, others are waiting to hear from back home, and there are those who have loved ones trying to immigrate to the United States," Father Robert Sandoz, O.F.M., school president, said.

There are group counseling services available at the school and the student body came together in prayer two days after the earthquake. "The students have already raised \$450 for Catholic Relief Services. The relief response here has been amazing," Fr. Sandoz explained.

The school's president calls the people of the Archdiocese of Newark "exceedingly generous" and is not surprised by the flood of donations following the disaster. "Everyone viewed the devastation and heard the Gospel in their hearts. As generous as we are, God is more generous. It is the great irony- the more I give away, the more I have. The human tendency is to be covetous but generosity begets generosity," he declared.

Fr. Sandoz believes the tremendous suffering of the Haitian people should not be forgotten, as rebuilding and continuing aid is important. "Things will not be restored quickly. We must keep the devastation foremost in our minds and hearts. Sustained relief is our challenge.'

NCIAL SUMMARY

My Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

am pleased to present to you summaries of the financial information of the Archdiocese of Newark for the fiscal years ended June 30, 2009 and June 30, 2008.

Every one of us has dealt with the significant challenges affecting the economies of our nation, region, state and local communities. Yet, I have been heartened this year by the caring that you continue to demonstrate for the Church and its work even as you face challenges in your own households. The results published today show very clearly that, despite the economic difficulties of the day, you, the people of this great Archdiocese, continue to provide critical financial support to both your local parish and the wider Church. Two key indicators of this support – assessments and the Archbishop's Annual Appeal - showed slight gains in 2009. Similarly, other areas such as interest and investment income and other revenues also increased, thus allowing us to provide key outreach and support to programs that serve our parishes and schools.

Ever mindful of the fact that the Archdiocese must meet an ever-growing and ever-changing set of needs of the Catholic community of Bergen, Essex, Hudson and Union Counties, we carefully embraced a strategy of paring expenses and operations so that our costs would be more in line with our available revenues. I think you will see from the pages that follow that we made great progress in this area. Still, our operating expenses for 2009 exceeded our available support and revenue for the year. Because the current economic climate remains uncertain, strategic analysis and paring of expenses in all of our vital and important ministries will remain part of our operation for the foreseeable future.

There still is much for us to face in the months ahead. However, I know full well the depth of your faith and the love that you express for this local Church. I also know that your generosity also will be there, thus enabling us to continue to spread the Gospel of Jesus Christ both in Word and in deed in the year ahead.

The Living Church

Yes, you can judge 'Lenten Journey' by its cover

ather John "Jack" F. Russell is a Carmelite priest who was ordained in 1960 and has served on the faculty of Immaculate Conception Seminary, South Orange, for more than 25 years. He is a familiar figure to many of the younger priests of the archdiocese and is well loved as a gifted preacher, inspiring teacher and insightful spiritual director.

"A Lenten Journey with Jesus Christ and St. Therese of Lisieux' (Christus Publishing), written by Fr. Russell, is a book distinguished by an exceptionally attractive cover portrait of this beloved saint, which captures both her inner beauty and the childlike quality of her soul. This is one of those rare instances when the wisdom of the old adage is disproved, because despite the beauty of its cover, the reader will not be disappointed by the content of this book. Instead, the text will serve as a marvelous companion for the Lenten season.

Too often, the prayers and penances that we promise for the duration of Lent fare no better than our New Years' resolutions and disappear under the daily pressure of our obligations and responsibilities. Fr. Russell's work

is an antidote to spiritual indifference and a tonic for the soul who desires to develop or restore an intimacy with the Lord. It is arranged in a format that uses the Gospel reading from the Mass for each day of Lent, beginning with Ash Wednesday and continuing through Easter Sunday.

The author offers the reader a very appealing but simple structure for prayer and reflection on each day of the penitential season. The Gospel passage is followed by a paragraph or two taken from the writings of Therese,

many of which are excerpts from her "Story of a Soul," her letters and poems. After the words of Saint Therese, Fr. Russell provides the reader a brief but pointed reflection and a simple prayer.

Fr. Russell has a profound appreciation for this saint and her "little way" of sanctity.


He is himself a world-renowned authority on the life and teachings of this Carmelite saint. He has been a member of the Carmelite order for more than 50 years and his words convey the deep connection between the beloved

saint's personal innocence and the human condition and clarifying

depth of her spirit. One of the reasons for her never-fading popularity among Catholics is the warm humanity that comes across in her work, making her an attractive model to one generation after another of the faithful. Nevertheless, despite the

ities that her





Therese was a woman of deep conviction whose faith and hope and love were tested in a crucible of anguish that often hovered very

close to the abyss of despair.

The genius of this doctor of the Church was intuitive rather than intellectual. Therese did not attempt to analyze her experience but went straight to the heart of it, reaching to the depths of our

our understanding of the dark



for those who want to follow Jesus in their daily lives.

There is a tradition in the Church that traces its origin to the Gospel of John and the Pauline Epistles. Rather than placing the hope for salvation on the strict observance of the law, this ancient tradition emphasizes the unconditional love that the Father has for us. The early Fathers of the Church often have this same

focus so clearly expressed in Saint Augustine's famous reminder that God has made us for Himself and our hearts will be restless until we rest in Him.

Such has been the primary theme in the lives of so many holy souls in Christian history-Blessed Julian of Norwich, Saint Aelred, Saint Francis and Saint Dominic to name but a fewflowing down the centuries through the work of Saint Therese of Lisieux, right up to Saint Kowalska in our own day with her emphasis on Divine Mercy. My Jesus, I trust in you. Thank you for loving me. Help me to share your loving goodness with all those I meet in this world.

In the spring of 2009, Fr. Russell received papal recognition for his many years of exceptional service to the Church and her people when Pope Benedict XVI awarded him the Benemerenti Medal. This newly published text continues this Carmelite priest's history of generous and loving work for the people of God.


