RJ's epic birthday bash

Community celebrates birthday of young cancer patient

TENAFLY—Seven months ago, Richard Sy Jr., "RJ" was like most 3-year-old boys; he played with his siblings and he loved fire trucks and super heroes. His diagnosis of stage 4 Neuroblastoma, a cancer that effects young nerve cells, in September 2014 has changed what the term superhero means to all those around him.

On April 19, the community of Our Lady of Mount Carmel parish, threw an elaborate party to celebrate the brave youngster's 4th birthday.

"People ask me all the time what a Christian community should look like," Pastor Very Reverend Leonard J. Gilman, O.Carm, said. "From now on I won't have to use words, I can just point to what we saw and experienced here today."

Over 400 parishioners, two mayors and numerous entertainers and children's performers gathered at the church to celebrate.

RJ, who lives with his parents, Cheely and Richard, and two older sisters in Bergenfield, has been spending most of his time at the Ronald McDonald House near Memorial Sloan Kettering in New York City where he receives costly and, often, painful treatment. But on a beautiful spring afternoon he rode to his birthday party with a fleet of fire trucks from the Tenafly Fire Department and was greeted by well-wishers in the church parking lot along with a local TV news crew. The festivities included proclamations from Bergenfield Mayor Norman Schmelz, and Tenafly Mayor Peter Rustin, who named RJ "Birthday King for the Day."

Also on hand were the superheroes Spiderman, Wolverine and Iron Man, not to mention magicians, face painters, popcorn and hot dog vendors and a DJ all courtesy of Total Entertainment, which donated their services

David Waterman, co-owner of Total Entertainment, said 25 of his employees donated their time to the event. "RJ's story just touched them and this was their way of helping," he said.

"From pizza and soft drinks to cake and cupcakes everything at today's party was donated by parishioners or local businesses," Elliot Guerra, the parish's director of mission development, said. As a result, all proceeds from t-shirt sales and donations went toward helping the Sy Family offset RJ's mounting medical bills.

"The instinctive reaction is to ask 'why do bad things happen to great people like the Sy family," said Guerra. "But

I think the way to look at today is that RJ's struggle and sacrifice is an opportunity for us to prove that we can love each other, serve each

other and give us the opportunity to be a true Christian community. RJ's battle with cancer convinces us to be better to one another."

Caldwell University holds candlelight walk in support of Nepal

The Caldwell University community gathered for a candlelight walk April 29 to support its Nepalese students and alumni following the devastating 7.8-magnitude earthquake that struck the country on April 25. Caldwell has 33 students from Nepal and many alumni from that nation.

The evening included remarks from Nepalese students and Caldwell University staff and administration, a minute of silence, prayers, music, videos and a candlelight walk to the campus peace pole.

Sister Kathleen Tuite, O.P., vice president for Student Life, introduced the event and discussed how the earthquake has impacted the entire campus. "Tonight the Caldwell University community gathers in solidarity with our family from Nepal." she said.

Maulin Joshi, director of International Student Services and advisor of the International Student Organization, introduced a prayer and reflection and showed a video of Nepal before and after the earthquake.

Hritesh Regmi, a student from Nepal and a communication arts major, said that for the Nepalese students the extent of the trauma is incomprehensible. The places that they grew up loving, that "thousands from across the world came to visit, are now gone," he said. "The idea of walking around our hometown and nothing being the same is disorienting."

Caldwell's president, Dr. Nancy Blattner, expressed relief that as of this time, no immediate family members of students were among those who perished. "Together as a community, we mourn for the loss experienced by our students and their family members—loss of homes and personal possessions, loss of familiar landmarks in Kathmandu, loss of cultural heritage in Nepal that dates back to 300 AD," she said.

Students are raising money for

the America Nepal Medical Foundation and created a Facebook site in support of the cause.

Blattner said the university is committed to supporting the Nepalese students and alums now, and in the future. "In the days, weeks and months to come, we will work with you to raise money to be sent to Nepal for the humanitarian efforts underway to assist the survivors who already are working to rebuild."

Regmi said the response of the Caldwell University community has been incredible in helping the students process the tragedy and assist them in their outreach and fundraising efforts.

"The whole nation (of Nepal) may be disoriented, but our friends in the global community are still helping us find our feet." Regmi urged those in the audience to hold on to hope and to believe that the worst has passed and that things can get better. "Let's continue to do what we can, and let's always continue to pray for Nepal."

Immaculate Heart senior accepted to competitive NYC

WASHINGTON TOWNSHIP—Immaculate Heart Academy senior and Nutley resident Jaclyn Scerbak was recently accepted to the Ailey School/Fordham University Dance B.F.A. program.

Beginning this fall, she will live next door to Lincoln Center, train at the Alvin Ailey American Dance Theater studios, and attend classes at the Jesuit university. This competitive, the conservatory-style program only accepts 35 dancers from more than 600 students who audition. Jaclyn will major in dance with an academic minor.

'Conservatories prepare students to work as professional performers," Jaclyn explained. "Because the Ailey School is partnered with Fordham, they focus on the whole person. They want their dancers to be committed artists and scholars. That is what drew my attention to this school from the very beginning."

Jaclyn has wanted to pursue dance in college since she was three years old. Although it has been her passion since she took her first ballet class, she knew that dancing in college could be difficult. With support from her family and friends, she decided to give her dreams a chance.

Although the Fordham University program always ranked at the top of her list, she was unsure she would be accepted. "Leave it to me to fall in love with a school that has under a 9 percent acceptance rate for its dance program," Jaclyn said.

The Ailey audition was the first of five college auditions

for Jaclyn. Although her legs could not stop shaking from nervousness, she promised herself to give everything she had that day. "To dance in front of the directors of The Ailey School for just one audition was a privilege in itself," she said. "I was not going to let this incredible opportunity pass me by. In my heart, I knew that that was the only place that I wanted to be for the next four years."

When Jaclyn received the acceptance e-mail, she felt all of her hard work in both school and dance had finally paid off. "The nights when I stayed up until 2 a.m. doing homework because I had a three-hour dance rehearsal that

night as well, proved to be worth it," she said. "It is an overwhelming feeling when someone gives you the chance to follow your dreams. I am so grateful that Ailey and Fordham recognized my potential and decided to give me this amazing opportunity."

Jaclyn said that Immaculate Heart prepared her for the college application/admissions process and she is especially grateful for her guidance counselor, Geraldine Boland.

"Two years from when I began this whole college process, I can honestly say I couldn't be happier," Jaclyn said. "I am so appreciative of the people who helped me along the way and got me to where I am. I look forward to a new, exciting and challenging road ahead."

Cardinal O'Malley offers insight on immigration at Seton Hall

ardinal Sean Patrick
O'Malley said he expected Pope Francis
to address immigration issues during his
upcoming visit to the U.S. as part of
his ministry's continuing efforts to
rally the world to the poor and marginalized.

"I'm certain the Holy Father will address the immigration question on his visit," the cardinal said during an April 22 address at Seton Hall University.

One of nine cardinals who serves in Pope Francis's "kitchen cabinet," the archbishop of Boston said the pontiff"s focus on the plight of immigrants and refugees is a needed antidote to the "globalization of indifference."

In the week he spoke, 800 immigrants from Africa drowned after their boat capsized in the Mediterranean, and O'Malley noted how the pope lamented the tragic deaths of others attempting to enter Europe during a 2013 visit to the gateway Italian island of Lampedusa.

Here in the U.S., where O'Malley dedicated years of his Franciscan ministry to Hispanic immigrants, he said more programs are needed to overcome the legal, linguistic and cultural barriers that delay full assimilation.

While immigration is a divisive issue, he quoted Pope Francis's advice for finding common ground: "You must prioritize the connection – the path you walk together. After that, settling differences becomes easier."

The convocation, at which O'Malley received an honorary doctorate, celebrated the 10th anniversary of the Joseph A. Unanue Latino Institute, which trains Latinos for leadership roles in the Church and ministry to Hispanics.

"How difficult to be an immigrant in a strange land," he said, after recounting the story of a husband who came to him while he served in Washington, D.C. The man was distraught because his wife back home had written and accused him of abandoning their family.

The man could not understand because he faithfully sent home every dollar he made working two jobs and depriving himself of basic necessities. Only when O'Malley questioned how he sent the money did he learn the man had mistaken a gaudy blue trash can for a postal box.

This was but one example of how immigrants turn to the Church for help, which was no surprise in Washington, where he said the number of Catholics has doubled due to Hispanic immigration.

Nationwide, 55 percent of Catholic under 30 are Hispanic, while 70 percent 19 and younger are. Yet, O'Malley continued, Latinos comprise only three percent of enrollment in Catholic schools – where they are far outnumbered by Protestant students.

"If we are ever going to get a hearing in this world it will be because of the authenticity of our lives and our dedication to love," the cardinal said.

The address inspired many in the audience. "The way he spoke about God's special care for the poor and how I'm going to live that out in my priesthood is something I am really going to have to think about," said Deacon Thomas P. Quinn, who is to be ordained a priest this month.

"It was definitely a reminder how someone who is marginalized, or on the periphery, can be heard when people are listening," said Andrea Bartoli, dean of the School of Diplomacy and International Relations.

Archbishop Myers speaks in Rome

On May 2, Archbishop Myers addressed the audience, which included guest of honor Pope Francis, at a day of prayer and reflection on the life of the Blessed Junipero Serra at the Pontifical North American College, Rome. Born on the Spanish Mediterranean island of Majorca, Blessed Serra, a Franciscan priest, is to be canonized in September Archbishop Myers's remarks are as follows:

Holy Father,

As Chairman of the Board of Directors of the Pontifical North American College, and on behalf of the Board of Directors, our rector, faculty, staff and 310 seminarian and priest students of our College, I am honored to welcome you today.

Since your predecessor, Pope Pius IX, founded our beloved college here in Rome, it has worked hard to form wise and generous pastors capable of sharing our faith, bringing people to Jesus Christ by transmitting the Catholic faith, bringing the infinite grace of the Son of God to the weak and the lost, and making sure that the Catholics of America become the leaven of the Gospel in our nation.

In addition, we are committed to the formation of priests who are particularly devoted to the Bishop of Rome and who embrace your concern for the needs of the Church in the world, especially those who are suffering. Our seminarians come from 101 of the dioceses of our nation, truly making this college "the American seminary in Rome." This is the fourth year that we have reached our numerical limit and, thank God, we have a waiting list for admission to next year's class for the first year of study. All these signs of vitality and hope are the result of much prayer and evangelization by our bishops, priests and faithful ... We are grateful to God for these blessings.

Holiness, I hope that you will experience the same kind of vitality during your upcoming visit to Washington DC, New York and Philadelphia. Your coming to our college and your future visit to our motherland are moments of pure renewal for us. We all, together with the faithful in the United States, are full of hope for the success of your Apostolic Visitation, but we are full of sincere gratitude to your fatherly love toward us. On this occasion, we renew our commitment to a more profound conversion to the Gospel message and offer to you our support, our love and our prayers. Our people are so excited about your impending arrival. Your message of mercy and outreach to the poor have touched the deepest chords of our hearts.

Thank you for coming here today. Know that our love and our prayers are with you. We ask you to continue to pray for us and bless us, our alumni and all of our loved ones.





A dozen faithful men answer the call to priesthood


welve men are to be ordained priests of the Archdiocese of Newark on May 23, the Saturday before Pentecost.

It is the second consecutive year 12 men are to be ordained in the Cathedral Basilica of the Sacred Heart, and one week after nine other men were to enter the clerical state when they were ordained deacons. Typically they will serve in a parish before they are ordained priests next year.

This year's class of priests were mostly born overseas with five from Colombia and two from the Philippines. All but two are 30 or older and half entered the seminary after working in other jobs.

These traits reflect national trends, as measured by the survey of this year's 595 ordinands by the Center for Applied Research in the Apostolate at Georgetown University. The total is up from 477 priesthood ordinations in 2014 and 497 in 2013.

Nationwide, about 60 percent worked other jobs – mostly in education – before deciding on the priesthood. The survey found the average age is 34 but only 25 percent were born outside the U.S. and just 14 percent reported they were Hispanic or Latino. The survey had a 69 percent response rate.

has 726 priests to serve 1.2 million Catholics in Bergen, Essex, Hudson and Union counties. Their median age is 54 and 239 are retired, while 53 serve outside the diocese.

r. Betancourt, 25, knew from a young age that he was destined for the priesthood. A native of Colombia, he entered the Seminario de Cristo Sacredote immediately following high school. He credits the intercession of the Blessed Mother with helping him discern his vocation.

he middle child in a family of eight children, Fr. Diaz, 30, worked at a

nursing home in his hometown of Espinal Tolima, Colombia, prior to entering the seminary. He was encouraged by his parents Maria Argenis and Luis Alberto to join the priesthood.

"It was not easy for (my parents) but since the beginning they knew that I would do well serving Jesus as a priest. I grew up in a Catholic family where I received good life values and a good Catholic education."

It was his mother's invitation to a Charismatic Mass that led Fr. Diaz to accept his vocation. "It was an amazing encounter with Jesus in the Eucharist that night as I felt that He called me to be His disciple serving Him and His people. I thank God for His invitation through my mother."

Fr. Diaz entered the Seminario de Cristo Sacredote in his native Colombia in 2007. He will celebrate his first Mass May 23 at Saint Joseph the Carpenter Parish in Roselle, where he also served his diaconate

This inspired me greatly for I saw in her a real and living example of self-sacrifice and devotion."

To tend his flock, care for it, give it guidance and direction, and be present to it is how I desire to live and work as a priest."

published writers in person and perhaps one day envision themselves as writers," she said.

Bardhan-Quallen is the author of 42 fiction and nonfiction books, including "Duck, Duck, Moose," "Snoring Beauty," and "Chicks Run Wild," which she read aloud

at Oak Knoll.

She said that for every five or six books she's written, only one of them ends up getting published – teaching the students that no matter how bad failure feels, it is important to be able to work through it.

"When someone doesn't like

your writing, it feels really bad," she said. "You can't control what other people like to read. Just make sure whatever you write that has your name on the paper – make sure you're proud of it," she said. "I'm proud of every book I've written."
